- Choldenko, Gennifer. *Al Capone Does my Shirts.* Moose Flanagan, who lives on Alcatraz along with his family and the families of the other prison guards, struggles for recognition in his new environment.

- Cisneros, Sandra. *The House on Mango Street.* A young Latina girl, Esperanza Cordero, is growing up in Chicago and is determined to "say goodbye" to her impoverished Latino neighborhood. Major themes include her quest for a better life and the importance of her promise to come back for "the ones I left behind."

- Cowell, Cressida. *How to Train Your Dragon.* In this silly chapter book, the Viking boy, Hiccup Horrendous Haddock III, son of the chief, finds himself having to find and train a dragon and also becomes an unlikely hero in the process. Series.

- Dahl, Roald. *Matilda*. Matilda applies her mental powers to rid the school of the evil headmistress, Miss Trunchbull, and restore Miss Honey, her nice teacher, to financial security.

Lord, Cynthia. *Rules.* Twelve-year-old Catherine just wants a normal life which is near impossible when she has a brother with autism and a family that revolves around his disability.

- MacLachlan, Patricia. *Sarah, Plain and Tall.* This sweet prairie tale of a family's experiences with Sarah, a mail-order bride from Maine, begins with children Anna and Caleb worried that their new mother might not like being away from the sea. Series.

- Naylor, Phyllis Reynolds. *Shiloh.* Marty must make some painful decisions about returning a dog to his abusive owner. Series.

- Philbrick, Rodman. *Freak the Mighty.* Two boys – a slow learner stuck in the body of a teenage giant and a tiny Einstein in leg braces – forge a unique friendship when they pair up to create one formidable human force.

- Sonnenblick, Jordan. **Drums, Girls, and Dangerous Pie.** Thirteen-year-old Steven has a totally normal life: he plays drums in the All-Star Jazz band, has a crush on the hottest girl in the school, and is constantly annoyed by his five-year-old brother. But then his little brother is diagnosed with leukemia and his world is turned upside down.

- Swanson, James L. *Chasing Lincoln's Killer*. This is a nail-biting and detailed telling of the assassination of Lincoln and all the accompanying chaos of the struggle to catch his killer.

- Van Draanen, Wendelin. *Flipped.* This is a young adult, teen romance in a he-said/she-said style with the two protagonists alternately presenting their perspective on a shared set of events.
