What is purpose? Purpose gives people a reason to do things.


What is direction? Communicating the way you want the mission accomplished

What is motivation? Motivation gives subordinates the will to do everything they can to accomplish a mission.








To motivate young people to be better citizens

The JROTC cap insignia is a wreath 1 3/16 inches in height containing the letter "ROTC" on a gold color metal panel inside the wreath. Place the insignia 1 inch from the crease on the garrison cap left curtain (all enlisted cadets).

Place the JROTC Corps insignia centered on both lapels of the coat, parallel to the inside edge of each lapel; 5/8 inch above the notch (enlisted female cadets); 1 inch above the notch (enlisted male cadets).

Center ribbons on the left side with the bottom row parallel to the bottom edge of the nameplate. Third and subsequent rows may be aligned to the left to present a better appearance (all female cadets).



Class B Uniform



United States Army Junior ROTC

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Center rank insignia on the shoulder loop 5/8 inch from the outside shoulder seam (all cadet officers).

The unit crest will be worn centered 1/4 inch above the HU, HUD or MU or 1/4 above the nameplate (all cadets).

When worn, center Special JROTC team pins (arcs) between the bottom of the pocket flap and the bottom of the pocket. If more than one team pin is worn, space them 1/8 inch between each arch (male cadets).

Male black oxford shoes are authorized for wear (all males). Place the ROTC insignia 5/8 inch above the notch on both collars, with the centerline of the insignia bisecting the notch and parallel to the inside edge of the lapel (male cadet officers).

Center Torch of Knowledge insignia on both lapels 1 1/4 inches below the ROTC insignia, with the centerline of the insignia bisecting the ROTC insignia and parallel to the inside edge of the lapel (all cadet officers).

Center ribbons 1/8 inch above the top of pocket flap. Third and subsequent rows may be aligned to the left to present a better appearance (all male cadets). The rank insignia is worn centered on the garrison cap left curtain, 1 inch from the front crease (all cadet officers).

Center the name-plate horizontally on the right side between 1 and 2 inches above the top button. Adjust placement of the nameplate to conform to individual figure differences (all females).

Black oxford shoes or black service pumps may be worn. The pump will be plain, with closed toe and heel. The heel will be between 1/2 and 3 inches high (all female cadets).



Place the ROTC insignia 5/8 inch up from the collar and lapel seam with the center line of the insignia parallel to the inside edge of the lapel (female cadet officers).

Center JROTC shoulder-sleeve insignia on the left sleeve 1/2 below the top of the shoulder seam (all cadets). The school shouldersleeve insignia may be worn in the same fashion on the right.

When worn, place Special JROTC team pins (arcs) parallel to the waistline of the coat. Placement of the team pins may be adjusted to conform to the individual figure difference, space pins 1/8 inch between each arc (all female cadets).

In Ranks Inspection Procedures

Step 1: Open Ranks, March

1st Squad takes two, 30 inch steps forward

2nd Squad takes one, 30 inch step forward

3rd Squad Stands Fast (Cadets do not move)

Step 2: Dress Right, Dress

Cadets bring their left arm to the side and parallel to the ground Head and eyes turn to the right except the squad leader Platoon leader checks alignment

Step 3: Ready, Front

All cadets return to the position of attention Right after this command the Cadets will be inspected

Once the inspection is completed the platoon is called to attention

Step 4: Close Ranks, March

1st Squad takes four, 15 inch steps backwards

2nd Squad takes two, 15 inch steps backwards

3rd Squad Stands Fast (Cadets do not move)

Step 5: Fall Out

Cadets will take one step backward and execute a "Left, face" before leaving the formation area

Note:

When conducting Steps 1 and 4 cadets must maintain alignment at all times (Dress and Cover).

The <u>three</u> most commonly displayed flags at state and federal government buildings and on military installations are the garrison, post, and storm flags.

Garrison flag – type of flag, flown on holidays and important occasions;
feet x 38 feet

- **2. Post flag** type of flag used for everyday occasions; 10 feet by 19 feet
- **3. Storm flag** type of flag flown in bad weather; 5 feet by 91/2 feet

When flying the flag at <u>half-staff</u>, raise it to its peak and then lower it to the halfstaff position. When lowering the flag for the day after it has been flown at halfstaff, raise it to its peak and then lower it ceremoniously.



History of Our National Anthem

- Francis Scott Key wrote "The Star-Spangled Banner" as a result of a mission he was on during the War of 1812.
- 117 years later, in 1931, that Congress passed an act making "The Star-Spangled Banner" the national anthem of the United States (36 USC Chap 10, Sec 170).

When Outdoors in Uniform


When you are outdoors in uniform and you <u>hear</u> the national anthem or <u>"To the Colors,"</u> face the flag (if the flag is not visible, face the source of the music), stand at attention, and render the hand salute. Begin your salute on the first note of the music and hold the salute until the last note.

When Outdoors in Civilian Clothes

When you are outdoors in civilian clothes and you <u>hear</u> the national anthem or "**To the Colors**," face the flag (if the flag is not visible, again face the source of the music), stand at attention, and place your right hand over your heart. A male must remove his hat and hold it in his right hand over his heart. A woman does not remove her hat, but she must place her right hand over her heart.

During Indoor Ceremonies

If you are attending an indoor ceremony and you <u>hear</u> the national anthem or <u>"To the Colors</u>," stand, face the flag, and assume the position of attention. If the flag is not visible, face the source of the music or to the front and assume the position of attention. Do not salute unless you are <u>under arms</u>.
