Reading by Mrs. Rios, Literacy Specialist



Reading is "Fund"amental for your child to succeed in school and in life. Last month I shared ways you can help your child at home. This month I am sharing the next five .

- 6. Read from a variety of children's books, including fairy tales, song books, poems, and information books.
- 7. Set aside special reading time (and a special reading place). Setting a designated reading

- time helps in several ways. First, it allows a parent to plan their day more effectively and make time for reading. It also helps the child, especially reluctant readers, to think of reading as a normal scheduled daily activity.
- 8. Read with emotion. Reading with emotion draws a child into the story in a way that is much more memorable and enjoyable. It also helps them to better understand how words can describe something sad, happy, or exciting.

- 9. Let your child turn the pages. Besides, being enjoyable, this activity helps more active children stay focused on the book.
- 10. Take your child to the library to check out books. Most popular Children's books are available at the local library. This is an affordable way to give your child access to a wide range of books. Taking your child to the library also turns reading into a special occasion.



Math by Mr. Unger, Math Specialist



Math is an important skill that we need for our daily lives. When children have difficulty in math, parents are a great resource in helping them succeed. Here are a few ways to help them :

Be positive about math!

- 1. Let your child know that everyone can learn math.

- 2. Let your child know that you think math is important and fun.
- 3. Point out the ways in which different family members use math in their jobs.
- 4. Be positive about your own math abilities. Try to avoid saying "I was never good at math" or "I never liked math".

- 5. Encourage your child to be persistent if a problem seems difficult.
- 6. Praise your child when he or she makes an effort, and share in the excitement when he or she solves a problem or understands something for the first time.

STAAR STRATEGIES



Math:

Have your child show their work when they are solving problems. Do not let them just give you an answer.

Reading:

Have your students summarize what they have read. If they are doing STAAR passages at home they are to write on the side of each paragraph main ideas of the paragraph. They are to bag and tag evidence in the text for the answers to their questions.

Science:

Have them explain what the question is asking of them in their own words.

Remember that you child needs:

1. a good nights rest,
2. come to school on time and
3. think positive thoughts about their success on the test.
