

- RESPECT AND COOPERATE WITH THE ADULTS IN THE SCHOOL

AS THE SCHOOL STAFF, WE WILL:

- PROVIDE A SAFE ENVIRONMENT THAT IS CONDUCIVE TO LEARNING
- PROVIDE HIGHLY QUALIFIED TEACHERS THAT ARE WELL PREPARED AND EQUIPPED WITH STRATEGIES THAT HILL MAKE LEARNING INTERESTING AND EVEN FUN
- PROVIDE A MID-QUARTER PROGRESS REPORT
- PROVIDE PARENTS A HANDBOOK, NEWSLETTERS, AND NOTICES IN A LANGUAGE THAT PARENTS CAN UNDER-STAND.



The Houston Independent School District has a detailed policy for handling and recording student attendance. Please review the important points listed below and make certain that any of your child's absences fall within the guidelines for excused absences and are documented with a written excuse from you.

- The only acceptable excuses for absences and tardiness are personal illness, sickness or death in the family, quarantine, weather or road conditions making travel dangerous, such as flooding (not routine rain or cold) and participation in school activities with permission of the principal.
- <u>Students must bring a written excuse to school no later than 3</u> school days after the date of the absence or tardy.
- Unexcused absences may not be made up. The student will receive a "0" for daily assignments.
- Students are required to be in attendance for 98% of the school year. Students may have <u>no more than 8unexcused absences per</u> year to be considered for promotion.
- Students must bring a written excuse for each instance when they are tardy. Excused tardies fall under the same guidelines as excused absences. <u>Students are tardy if they are not at school at</u> <u>7:35 am when the tardy bell rings.</u>

GUIDELINES REGARDING TARDIES:

Note: Being late/tardy has been a problem for some or our students. The problem can be easily solved if every member of the family does their part to get the child to school on time. We know you want to be a part of the solution and not the problem. Students arriving after 9:00 will be counted absent for the day and be sent home.

EARLY DISMISSAL/TRUANCY VIOLATION

***Students will not be released early unless excused by TEC. Sec.25.087—State Law requires students to attend school each school day for the entire period the program of Instruction is provided. (TEC.Sec.25.085 Compulsory School Attendance) Court Warnings/Final Notices will be issued for Early Dismissal. For the safety of our students and our staff, children will not be released after 2:30 p.m.



We frequently send Communications/Notes/Flyers home to the parents/guardians. Ask your child on a daily basis about messages or papers from the school. These communications are very important and are our attempts to keep you informed of what is going on at Isaacs Elementary at all times. We often find that children leaving for the day, have dropped these notes in the courtyard, the front of the school, the hallways or on the playground. This means that you don't always get our messages. Please talk to your child about being responsible and about the importance of bringing all communications from the school home to you. Go over the notes with them, as well, so they also understand what is going on. Every child at Isaacs will be provided with a folder in which to carry messages home to their parents. Look for it and ask your child about it regularly. Intermediate students (Grades 3-5) will be provided with a "Student Planner" to log assignments and increase organizational skills. Grade Pk-2 will receive a homework folder for the year.



R.L. Isaacs Elementary School of Careers and Service Title I Parent Involvement Policy

R.L. Isaacs Elementary School of Careers and Service is committed to the goal of providing guality education for every child in this school. To this end, we want to establish partnerships with parents and with the community. It is expected that parents are to be seen as valued partners in the educational process, serving as the child's teacher in the home. All the school activities will give proper consideration to the involvement of parents. Everyone gains if the school and home work together to promote high achievement by our children. Neither home nor school can do the job alone. Parents play an extremely important role as children succeed at every step along the way. Grade level goals and expectations for the children of Isaacs Elementary are available to all parents, with the expectation that all students will work towards these goals. We recognize that some students may need extra assistance available through the Title I Program to reach these goals. Isaacs Elementary intends to include parents in all aspects of the Title I Program. The goal is school-home partnerships that will help all students in the school succeed



The 2011-2012 R.L. Isaacs Elementary School of Careers and Service Dress Guidelines are approved by the Shared Decision-Making Committee (SDMC). <u>The official school uniform is: yellow,</u> white or red polo tops or crest shirt with navy or khaki bottoms.

When children are taught that they are representatives of their family and reflect the attitudes and training of the home, there is little need for counseling at school concerning school standards of dress. <u>Students not obeying official uniform rules will not be allowed to participate in any extra curricular activities and can be suspended from school. In-school detention for repeat offenders is also a consequence.</u>

We encourage the following guidelines:

- All students are required to wear neat, clean official school uniforms every day.
- All children must wear shoes for health and safety reasons. Footwear should be suitable for academic and physical education. (No wooden soles, open backs, cleats, slippers, shoes with skates attached, or flip-flops are allowed.) <u>SOCKS must be worn at all times.</u>
- Jewelry must be kept very simple. (Boys cannot wear earrings on campus.)
- Caps and hats may not be worn in the building.
- Shorts must be worn under skirts or dresses for physical education. Midriffs or halter tops are considered inappropriate for school.
- Hair should be groomed at home prior to coming to school. Hair rollers are not permissible.
- Shirttails should always be tucked in neatly inside pants. <u>Belts must be worn with pants.</u>
- Shirts with slogans, underwear shirts, tank tops, and shirts having suggestive alcohol or smoking advertisements are not to be worn.

Medications & Immunizations



We would like to review the policy concerning the administration of long term medication at school.

The policy of Board of Education does not authorize Houston ISD school personnel to give medication of any kind, which includes aspirin, similar preparations, or any other drugs.

The nurse and other designated school personnel, however, can and should give medicine during school hours when the physician requests in writing that there is a need for such medication. The doctor's statement must be accompanied by written permission of at least one parent.

An HISD medication form is available upon request from the school nurse.

IMMUNIZATIONS

All students are required to have proper immunization to enroll and to remain in school. Any questions regarding health related matters are to be directed to the school nurse.





The following rules and consequences should be common to all classrooms:

CLASSROOM BEHAVIOR RULES

- 1. Follow directions
- 2. Raise your hand before speaking
- 3. Keep hands, feet, and objects to yourself
- 4. Remain in your seat
- 5. Treat teachers, classmates and all adults with respect.

CONSEQUENCES

- 1. Verbal warning
- 2. Isolation/Time-out/Sent to another class
- 3. Removal of privileges (Lunch detention)
- 4. Call parents
- 5. Sent to Principal's Office or Discipline Designee
- 6. Suspension

<u>**Restroom Areas:</u>** Students will be quiet when taking restroom breaks so as not to interrupt/disturb instruction which is taking place in nearby classrooms. Classroom bathroom monitors are to be assigned by all classes.</u>

Halls: Students will be silent in the halls during instructional time.

<u>Cafeteria:</u> Students will be quiet in the cafeteria and in designated areas—walking through the lunch line, standing/walking in line and sitting at the benches.

Grades



Students will receive report cards at the end of each nine week grading period. The academic grade will reflect the class work, quizzes, and assessments/tests done for that period. Students will receive computer generated report cards again this year. <u>All</u> core subject (Reading, Lang. Arts, Math, Science, Social Studies) grades will be numerical averages rather than letter grades, with the exception of PK and K students. All students will receive a letter grade for Handwriting.

Please use the following scale for interpretation of grades:

- **90-100** Excellent quality of work through mastery of subject matter
- **80-89** Good quality of work above average with consistent effort
- 75-79 Satisfactory quality work average achievement
- 70-74 Below quality of work below average achievement
- Below 70 Unsatisfactory quality of work poor work, failing

Conduct/Letter Grades are to be interpreted as follows:

E (90-100) Excellent quality of behavior - Totally selfdisciplined

S (89-80) Satisfactory quality of behavior - Cooperates readily

P/N (79-75) Poor quality of behavior - Below average

 \mathbf{U} % (74-70) Unsatisfactory quality of behavior - Needs drastic improvement

Students must have an overall average of 70% in all core subjects to be promoted to the next grade level. District requires tests must also be passed in order to be promoted. This school year, the district is requiring all teachers to enter grades on a computerized program called *"GradeSpeed"*. Grades given on assignments and report card will reflect mastery of the District's standard-based curriculum of TEKS (Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills) objectives. Grades shall be based solely on achievement of course/grade level standards. Student attendance, effort, ability, participation, improvement, attitude, and other behaviors shall be reported separately from achievement.

Discipline

We are delighted that your child is a student at R.L. Isaacs Elementary School of Careers and Service. We want to keep Isaacs a school with high academic expectations. Remember our motto is: "Demonstrating Elements of Excellence for Our Future"

To assure academic excellence we must accept only the best discipline. This letter is to inform you of our intentions to maintain good discipline and to invite you in helping us maintain good discipline. When a student is disruptive, he knows he must be disciplined. Our teachers use many preventive measures in order to maintain a conductive environment for learning. A Discipline Review Committee has also been established ad will be in operation this year. Mandatory Parent Conferences, emergency removal of students, and suspension from school are additional measures that will be used.

Parents will be notified of disruptive behavior and their support will be expected in correcting the behavior. We have an intense curriculum planned for your child, with new textbooks in Reading and Math. Students at every grade level, including Pre-Kindergarten, have District exams/assessments they must pass. I have included a schedule of the test dates in this booklet. The test results can influence whether a student is promoted or retained at the end of the school year. There is no time available for disruptive behavior. Discuss this now with your child. It is very important that we work together to make Isaacs Elementary the most successful school it can be. It takes parents' help to accomplish this. We look forward to your continued support.



The three parent programs are PTO, PCPT and PAC. The main goal of these programs is to enhance and support the relationship of school and home and provide resources for the school. Parents are used as room mothers, chaperones on field trips and give overall support. Please support us this year.

HOMEWORK

It is every student's responsibility to complete homework on time and turn it in. As a parent, please make sure this happens. Homework will be given M-F for all students. (PK-5)

PARENT MEETINGS

Parents are invited to attend monthly parent meetings at Isaacs Elementary. Topics covered during these meetings range from testing tips to homework assistance among many others. We invite you to join us every month for these meetings.

LOST & FOUND: Office Area / Cafeteria Stage

SCHOOL MATERIALS: Students are responsible for the replacement of lost textbooks and any damaged textbook. If a book is lost, it must be paid for.

REPORT CARDS: Report cards are issued at the end of each nine week grading period. Progress reports will be sent home at the end of each four week period.

ATTENDANCE: Students must attend school regularly and be on time. A note must be sent to the teacher each time a student is absent. Eight unexcused absences will result in failure for the year pending an Attendance Committee review. Referrals will be made after three or more absences or if a pattern develops.

GRADING POLICY: Students may be promoted only on the basis of academic achievement and must have an overall average of 70 or above in Language Arts, Math, Science & Social Studies Exceptional Ed. students have off level grading. Students must pass STAAR/HFWE/Stanford/Aprenda (See HISD Promotion Standards Information).

DISCIPLINE: Teaching students to accept responsibility begins at home. Students must follow the *Student Code of Conduct.*

CELL PHONES/ELECTRONICS: The use of cellular phones or other electronic devices is prohibited during school hours. Students needing to bring cellular phones to school, must leave them in the front office before school begins and may pick it up after school. <u>Cellular</u>



phones or other electronics confiscated by the principal will only be returned to the parent/guardian and are subject to a \$15.00 fine.

GENERAL INFORMATION INSTRUCTIONAL PROGRAMS

Career and Service

The teachers will choose a career focus for each grade level. They will align the state TEKS to the career chosen. This will ensure that the instruction demonstrates the connection between theory learned in class and real-life application. As a school, we will incorporate not only the instructional background, but also expose the children to the various career fields of this present day. The students will be able to attend field experiences, meet representatives form the career world and participate in various career focused activities.

The focus on service within the school and throughout the community will set the stage to develop an awareness of service for our neighbors and colleagues. The students will be able to conduct community service projects throughout the school and community and gain community service hours per year.

Literacy

The reading program is centered on five areas of reading, phonemic awareness, phonics, fluency, vocabulary and comprehension. The students' reading levels are monitored closely by using Developmental Reading Assessments in order to see the progress of the five areas of reading. The main curriculum used for reading is called Reading Street. The Empowering Writers curriculum is used in order to incorporate writing in every content area.

Math

The math instruction is provide by EnVision Math. The Reasoning Minds Math curriculum will be used as a supplemental resource to help students strengthen their skills that need further improvement.

Science

Science instruction is hands-on and utilizes full exploration of the subject. Students will have the opportunity to discover, build and make predictions through science.

Social Studies

Students will be able to bring history to life through social studies. The social studies instruction will be project based and incorporate technology and research. The students will get the opportunity to make their own museum and highlight important historical events and people.

Response to Intervention

We offer a response to Intervention for all students on our campus. It is a three-tiered structure which helps us to meet the needs of every child at their current instructional level. Our campus will offer tutorials during and after school: along with small group instruction during class and Saturday tutorials.

Enrichment and Social Development

Our school will offer Children should not only develop instructionally but socially as well. Therefore we will offer an after school program, UIL - University Interscholastic League Clubs (number sense, spelling, and speech), Odyssey of the Mind, and Gardening. There will be a PEP Squad, Sewing, Dance, Spelling Bee, and so much more.
