"Houston Real Men Read," a mentoring initiative for elementary- and middle-school students chaired by Texas District XIII Senator Rodney Ellis and spearheaded by HISD Board of Education First Vice President Paula Harris (who represents District IV), is recruiting volunteers.

The HISD Police Department currently has police officers volunteering for the Houston Real Men Read. Police officers are assigned to various schools and take great pride in being a positive role model.

Just a few of our Community Outreach Partners for (Real Men Read) are Red Elementary, Bastian Elementary, and Thompson Elementary. **The following are confessions made by those partners:**

Bastian Elementary ∇

The Houston ISD Police Department has remained committed to the program every month at Bastian Elementary since the program began two years ago. Numerous officers have participated assiduously in the program over the past several years and helped solve two ongoing concerns at Bastian; the lack of visible male role models who read, and the lack of books available to young students in the home. Additionally, the police officers' presence in the classrooms has boosted the morale and confidence in our students to read. They constantly remind our students that if they work hard at achieving the skills to read, they will enjoy reading and reading will open up limitless opportunities to them. The department's continued commitment to allow officers to participate in the Real Men Read Program has the potential to change the lives of young people by reinforcing three fundamental principles: 1) reading is fun, 2) the community cares, and 3) a commitment to education and reading can ensure success. As a result of the officers' active involvement, positive attitude and leadership skills, our school as a whole has benefited and our students enjoy reading.

Red Elementary ∇

As the librarian of S.C. Red Elementary School, I am also the coordinator for the Houston Real Men Read Program sponsored by HISD. Our school has been lucky enough to have this program since it began four years ago. All second and fifth graders have the experience of men coming into their classrooms five times a year to read and discuss books with them. The children then get to keep the books to start home libraries. Red Elementary continued:

The mentors who have come to our school for the most part have been the original men. Officer Moore from the HISD police department began the program with us when we started. It has been wonderful having him. He has been with the same second grade teacher throughout the years and they have a great rapport. Having an HISD policeman come in uniform was a great asset. We moved children in with his class so they could be more involved when he taught. He counseled some children who were having behavior problems and responded well to a police officer as a mentor.

We are hoping to be awarded the program next school year and would be honored to have Officer Moore continue at Red. We encourage other officers to get involved with this program because they truly are wonderful role models for many students in HISD.
