3. CREATE A 10-PANEL COMIC SUMMARIZING YOUR BOOK.

## Math Pre AP/Vanguard Summer Project

You will be tracking your time while you are summer reading. From the book you choose to read, you will fill out your progress tracker for the book. You will track 10 intervals of reading. Each interval should be 20 minutes apiece.

Now, make another reading selection of your choice (not from the included list)! You may choose from another book, newspaper, or even a magazine... As long as you have a page count, you are good! Whatever you select, read for 20 minutes and count the pages you read. (adjust page count if there are any photos to the best of your ability.)

Calculate the pages per minute you read for the book by taking the total pages you read divided by the minutes you read. Calculate the number for the reading of your choice by following the same process.

### Answer the following questions about your data:

1. Compare the 2 rates you calculated for the pages per minute you read for each book.
2. Why do you think your rates were the same/different?
3. If you were to read a 900 page book, how long do you think it would take you? EXPLAIN.

Put all data and answers to questions together in a final presentation format such as a poster, power point, or an original idea of your own! 😊

### Grading Rubric:

50%: Completing the progress tracker CORRECTLY and neatly

30%: Answers to questions in complete sentences

20%: Overall presentation/effort of your final product

Every novel has a setting, real or imaginary, within which events take place. For your science project, you will do the following:

1. **Identify** the setting of the novel you read.
2. **Research** the setting to find the biome within which the setting is located, and identify the characteristics of the biome such as: weather patterns; indigenous plants and animals; geographic formations/landscapes.
3. **Describe** an ecosystem within the setting. If the setting is imaginary, then you must imagine an ecosystem within that setting. Your description must include information about the following:
  - a. the types of **biotic** (living) and **abiotic** (nonliving) factors in the ecosystem;
  - b. the **weather patterns** in the ecosystem (highest temperature, lowest temperature, rainfall)
  - c. the **landscape** of the ecosystem
4. **Create an infographic** (graphic visual representation of information, data, or knowledge intended to present complex information quickly and clearly) to represent the information on the ecosystem you described in step 3 above.

## Definitions

**Biome:** A large geographical region whose climate produces a characteristic climax association of plants and animals.

**Ecosystem:** "An ecosystem is a complex set of relationships among the living resources, habitats, and residents of an area. It includes plants, trees, animals, fish, birds, microorganisms, water, soil and peoples."
