Super Helpful Windows Keyboard Shortcuts



Dear Onliners, Here are some pretty cool keyboard shortcuts for teachers and students that should save you time!

Shortcuts using the CTRL key

CTRL + A = Select all

CTRL + C = Copy selected text

or item

CTRL + X = Cut selected text or item

CTRL + V = Paste CTRL + Z = Undo

CTRL + Y = Redo CTRL + B = Bold text

CTRL + U = Underline text

CTRL + I = Italicize text CTRL + F = Find

CTRL + G = Go to page / line / cell

CTRL + mouse scroll wheel = Change the size of items on the screen

CTRL + left click on mouse = Select more than one item

Shortcut using the Shift key



SHIFT + left click on mouse = Select the entire range of items from where the cursor is to where you clicked

Shortcuts using Microsoft Word

CTRL + L = Left align text or item

CTRL + E = Center text or item

CTRL + R = Right align text or item

CTRL + [= Decrease font size 1 point

CTRL +] = Increase font size 1 point

Monday, March 6, to Wednesday, April 5, 2017. A welcome change is that holistic ratings will be entered without printing test tickets. The holistic ratings will be entered using the new role "Transcribe Assistant". All CTCs were assigned this role on January 12, 2017. CTCs please remember to sign-up for the TELPAS administration mandatory training and one of the optional open labs. CTCs will train all raters and verifiers on TELPAS administration procedures before having them complete the online rater / verifier courses and calibration activities. Let's Talk STAAR Online Accommodations

Starting with the next STAAR window of March 28-31, 2017, students with disabilities and English Language Learners (ELLs) may receive those



accommodations through a new enhanced online version of STAAR. The online STAAR-A and online STAAR-L were administered for the last time in December 2016 and are now discontinued. The new enhanced online STAAR platform can be customized based on the student's needs and preferences. The online STAAR will have "Accessibility and customized "Designated Supports". Accessibility Features will not require any eligibility documentation and will be available to all students. Designated Supports, previously known accommodations, will require eligibility documentation (504, IAP, TEC §38.003, ARD, IEP, RTI, LPAC, etc., plus evidence of student use in the classroom prior to the state test). The designated supports can be entered online in TOMS. For eAssessment campuses, it is a best practice to enter the accommodations in the data file together with test and group assignments. The data file is then uploaded into TOMS by your District Online Administrator. This eAssessment best practice will help you stay organized and save you time!
