

Campus Online Team

- □ Supported computer image (dark grey login screen)
- ☐ Using the correct app (Version 2.47 of the STAAR Secure Browser)
- ☐ Before high stakes testing, students have

practiced with **practice tests or tutorials**, including Text to Speech (TTS). Here is the video on <u>how to use TTS</u>, courtesy of the students at Wisdom High School.


- ☐ Have **extra devices** (10% of testers) to swap for bad devices
- ☐ **Train all staff** about basic computer and secure browser troubleshooting and how to swap a malfunctioning device.
- ☐ Call the Network Operations Center (NOC) at (713) 556-8800 if the network is slow or there is a loss in connectivity.

Test Administrators

Always	double	check	"for	the	right	student	/	the	
right test" before allowing students to login.									

- ☐ **Turn off all cell phones** during cell phone collection to minimize use of bandwidth.
- ☐ Face all screens toward the test administrator.
- ☐ Place students who have laptops with low batteries along the walls or near wall plugs.

 Assessment. Do NOT assign the Pretest. Assign the

 TCEA Posttest Part 1, Part 2, and the Survey. Parts 1

- and 2 are required and both must be submitted by the student. The Survey is optional.
- ☐ Assign the required tests to your **math classes**.
- ☐ Ensure **not to test the same student twice** if he/she is in more than one Math class.
- ☐ For students who enroll in the middle of the testing window, please contact Student Assessment to check if they have already been tested at another campus.

Goodbye EdPlan!



EdPlan will be used by HISD campuses for HISD Snapshots, Pre-

Approved Assessments, and the End of Year (EOY) Benchmark Running Records until May 31, 2017. This means that all tests that need to be scored must be scanned and scored by May 31. On June 1, all EdPlan assessment access will be removed, but campuses will be able to run EdPlan reports until June 30, 2017. Learn more about the EdPlan phase-out here.

Hello OnTrack!



OnTrack, the new HISD formative assessment platform, will be used to administer the HISD Summer Post Assessments and the Summer Benchmark Running Records. All campuses were required to identify a Summer School

Campus Test Coordinator (CTC). The Summer School CTC will receive information about the Summer School Post-Assessments, OnTrack Online Courses, and is encouraged to be one the three campus personnel to attend one of the scheduled Training-of Trainer (TOT) sessions (**OneSource Course #468001**) in May-June. As of May 1, 89 campuses had at least one person registered for the TOT training. Please refer to the May 1, 2017 academic service memo for additional information.

OnTrack Online Courses



Two OnTrack online courses are currently available in OneSource.
OnTrack Navigation
Basics (Course #442001) and

OnTrack Fundamental Skills (Course #443001) are available for teachers and campus leaders to learn OnTrack basic skills, system navigation and how to

administer both a paper-based and online assessments. The best thing about the Fundamental Skills course is that the participants may choose the assessment administration (online or paper) track appropriate for them, or they may choose to learn both administration tracks. The online courses will be available for schools to use with their faculties during the August pre-service week, if desired by the campus leadership teams.




