Olanga's Words

The Olashkoko Family represents one of many families who immigrated to the United States many years ago. We met with Olanga, one of five children who along with his parents left their home, Congo, seven years ago to begin their journey to the United States. The family left behind an older sister, married and a mother of three who was unable to make the journey. Olanga recalls how difficult it was to leave his sister behind; they remain in communication but have little hope of being reunited.

Due to the unrest and Civil War in Congo, his parents made the decision to leave home and pursue a sounder life for their children. They spent two difficult years living in refugee camps in Kenya. Moving from their home in Congo to living in tents was a contrast he and his siblings were not prepared for. The harsh conditions, a semi-desert environment where their tent homes were often carried away by flooding. The conditions in Kenya did not lend itself for growing their own food, only limited canned foods were available. It was here that their protector and father, who was ill grew more sick requiring medical care.

After two years in Kenya, the family began the second phase of their flight for a better life leading them to Nairobi. Here their father's health was restored. The Olashkoko Family's hope for seeking a life in the U.S.

remained with them until they made their journey 5 years later.

Today, Olanga fondly reflects on the 3 years he and his family have spent in their new home, Houston, Texas. He expresses his appreciation for the new life he now has in Houston as well as the support his teachers at Houston Independent School District have provided.

Olanga was asked if he regretted his family's choice to come to the U.S. He stated, "At the beginning I had questions of coming here. It was totally different. Could we survive here? Once living here all those fears went away. Then we met Ms. Shirin, she became our Mentor. She helped our family get on the right path."

That path led Olanga's older sister, Prista, to serve our country in the Military Branch of the National Guard. Her interest in pursuing this career began while attending one of our leading campuses, Westside HS.

Olanga's path has guided him towards a career in the medical profession as a Registered Nurse. While he dedicates himself to his studies, he does not relinquish his goal of becoming a professional dancer. He explains with such enthusiasm how he would like to be in movies and teach dance. In his own words, "Everything is possible. God really works miracles."

The immigration process for the Olashkoko Family has not come without hardships. They have been resilient and now the family is prospering; his father has fully recovered and is receiving training in farming and Ms. Abora, Olanga's mother, is continuing to develop her seamstress skills, a talent she brought from home.

When asked "what would you share with others who may have recently immigrated to the U.S.?", Olanga responds with such gratitude for the schools, teachers and district that reached out to him and his family. He welcomes others to come and experience change in a good way; to partake in the amazing schools where educational internships are available and students have access to sports clubs, community, and a caring extended family.

During the last three years, Olanga has learned a dedicated work ethic. Sharing how "hard work pays off; if you put in 100% and you are humble, you receive 100% in return."

Kindergarten to 12th Grade Students

Middle and high school students can pay with cash (on the bus only) and receive a 50 percent discount using their student ID card. Elementary students can also pay with cash (on the bus only) without having to show an ID.

Students can obtain a Student METRO Q® Fare Card or METRO Day Pass. You will need a current school ID, class schedule, enrollment form, report card (on school letterhead) or student METRO fare card registration form signed by the parent or guardian

WHEN YOU ARE NEW TO U.S. SCHOOLS...

Routines and Expectations

School-wide values, systems and routines reinforce a school's culture that fosters a positive learning environment and strong relationships. They are less about compliance with rules and more about creating an environment that is valued by everyone.

Examples of school routines and educational expectations are:

- Following a schedule and rotating classrooms or teachers
- Co-ed classes
- Raising a hand to speak
- What to do in emergency drills
- Discipline in the school context
- Lining up to leave the classroom
- Wearing or not wearing a uniform
- Importance of class attendance and report card grades
- Working independently and/or quietly
- Sitting still for periods of time (may vary, but usually between 30-to-90-minute classes)
- Changing clothes for physical education classes in an open locker room
- The roles of school personnel and who to go to with specific concerns
- How students and teachers relate to, and address, one another

Make every day as predictable and routine as you can. Follow the same schedule before and after school. It can look something like this: Wake up, wash face, eat breakfast, get dressed, brush teeth, leave for school or join online class. Planning is key to having a great day!

RAISING A BILINGUAL CHILD

How the State Monitors English Learner's Language Progress

The Texas English Language Proficiency Assessment System (TELPAS) is a yearly assessment for students in Texas public schools who are learning the English language. It evaluates the progress that each EL makes in the four domains: listening, speaking, reading, and writing to become proficient in the use of academic English.

For students to reach their full academic potential, it is important for them to make steady progress in learning English. Below you will find some activities suggested by Texas Education Agency (TEA) that may assist your child in preparing for TELPAS.

- Create an environment rich in literature
- Read together or independently
- Listen to audio books and talk about the theme, the characters, or the best parts of the book.
- Write daily.
- Tell Stories
- Talk Daily
