TIPS

- What makes a good article? Original, well-written, new. Please don't plagiarize! It's boring and illegal. Turn in your best work not a rough draft. Ask yourself, am I proud of this work? Is it worthy of being printed and sent to several thousand students, teachers, parents and grandparents?
- What makes a good interview? Ten good questions. Show your questions to me, Ms. Wood or Ms. Langston <u>before</u> you do the interview. Read previous interviews online westues.org\Monthlty Mustang. Quotes, follow-up questions. Balance between open and closed questions.
- What makes a good comic? Good artwork with a dark pencil and humor. No erasure marks or hard to read text. Draw big. Use white, unlined paper. You don't have to outline the cells. Use a page for each cell. If you can't print clearly attach the text separately to be typed in after the

drawings are scanned. If your parents have a scanner at home, you may send me the images. Otherwise turn in the paper drawings.

- Every article even comics needs a catchy title or headline and a byline. All articles need a picture. All pictures need a caption. Please don't forget. It delays publication when I have to take pictures and track down names of people in the picture.
- What makes a good picture?
 Good lighting. Outdoors is best.
 Interesting background but not
 distracting. Beware of objects behind a
 persons head. Due to size limitations,
 most pictures are head and shoulders
 only except for the front page.
- How to turn in work.
