English



 \Rightarrow **Pre-AP English I:** Students will be working on writing expository essays.

⇒ **Pre-AP English II:** Students will work to sharpen their essay skills.

⇒ English III (Morton): Students are working on elements of writing and plot analysis within *The Grapes*

of Wrath.

- ⇒ English IV (Morton): Students are continuing to read the Shakespearean tragedy, Othello, and focusing upon tragic flaws and characterization.
- ⇒ AP/Dual Credit Language and Composition: Students will read and compare the authors' purpose, techniques, and tone in different writings on the American Japanese Internment during WWII.
- ⇒ AP/Dual Credit British Literature: Students will read and analyze writings by Jonathan Swift and analyze for relevance in historical context, as well as relevant themes and characteristics of satire.
- ⇒ Business English: Students will present their groups' Student-Taught Grammar Presentation Project. Students will participate in all of the presenting groups' activities to demonstrate mastery of grammar topics.

Math



 \Rightarrow **Algebra I:** Students are continuing their study of quadratics.

⇒ Algebra II (Polley): Students will identify attributes of exponential functions.

 \Rightarrow Algebra II (Baker): Students are continuing their study of conic sections.

- \Rightarrow **Geometry:** Students will prove triangles similar by AA.
- ⇒ Pre-Calculus (Kim): Students will solve trigonometric equations quadratic in form.
- ⇒ **Pre-Calculus (Baker):** Students are continuing their study of transformations of sinusoidal functions.
- \Rightarrow **AP Calculus:** Students will calculate, interpret, and apply integrals.
- ⇒ AP Statistics: Students will construct confidence intervals for the difference of two proportions.
- ⇒ College Algebra: Students will convert quadratic equations from standard form to vertex form.

Science



 \Rightarrow **Pre-AP Biology:** Students will construct a life size human body systems poster and demonstrate the interaction among organs to help maintain homeostasis.

⇒ Pre-AP Chemistry: Students will learn Boyle's, Charles's, Avogadro's gas laws and staring preparing for

their presentation.

- \Rightarrow **AP Biology:** Students will review population ecology.
- \Rightarrow **AP Physics:** Students will study rotational motion.

Social Studies



 \Rightarrow **AP Human Geography:** Students will analyze the economic forces that influence agricultural practices.

 \Rightarrow **AP World History:** Students will be discussing the Enlightenment and how Enlightenment ideas led to the beginnings of revolutions around the world.

 \Rightarrow **US History (Morton):** Students are completing study of the Civil Rights Movement and moving into the 1970s and 1980s in US history.

Government and Economics (Morton): In government, students are continuing with government regulation with a focus on Facebook and Google. In economics, students are connecting the government curriculum, discussing the idea of bias in search engine algorithms.
