Bond Program Oversight Committee Charter

Background

The Declaration of Beliefs and Visions for the Houston Independent School District ("HISD", the "District") states the primary goal of HISD is to increase student achievement. The District's Bond Programs impact the following additional goals that exist to support the primary goal:

- **Goal 3: Provide a Safe Environment**—The District shall create a safe environment conducive to learning for all students and provide safety and security measures at District schools and facilities, and while attending District-related events.
- **Goal 4: Increase Management Effectiveness and Efficiency**—The District shall have a decentralized organizational structure that will promote autonomy and innovation in schools. With a districtwide commitment to performance over compliance and a shared accountability system in place, the District shall employ best practices of administrative principles to make optimal use of District resources and taxpayer dollars.
- **Goal 5: Improve Public Support and Confidence in Schools**—The schools belong to the people; hence, the board, administration, and support staff are public servants who exist to support the schools and the relationship between teachers, students, and parents. Public confidence will increase as the District increases transparency, accountability at all levels, and meaningful engagement of the community.
- **Goal 6: Create a Positive District Culture**—The District's clearly articulated purpose will serve as the catalyst for creating a powerful sense of community and a shared direction among personnel, parents, students, and the public. Because the District realizes the value of investing in human capital, the District will work to attract and retain the best teachers and staff members, and create working conditions in which their talents can flourish.

The Bond Program Oversight Committee ("Committee") plays a critical, strategic role in assisting the District while completing these goals.

Purpose of Charter

The Board of Education ("Board") for the District desires to make continual improvements to existing programs. As a result, the Bond Program Oversight Committee Charter ("Charter") is adopted to explain the mission, purpose, structure, membership, duties, responsibilities, and expectations. This Charter supersedes the previously adopted charter dated August 30, 2010.

Committee Mission

The HISD Board, in response to community interest in the effective and efficient use of bond proceeds, has established a mechanism to encourage greater accountability, transparency, public support, and confidence by creating the Committee. The Committee is an independent citizens' Committee that is responsible to the Superintendent, Board, and general public (in that order).

The Committee's charge is to monitor all applicable Bond funded construction projects and help interested Houstonians to stay informed about new construction and renovation





projects in the District. Its purpose is to monitor performance and compliance in order to confirm that HISD implements Bond Program work in conformance with the program approved by the Board and make recommendations to maximize available resources to achieve construction goals in the most effective and cost efficient manner. Its focus should be oversight rather than limited to hindsight.

Committee Structure and Membership:

- a) The Committee has up to nine voting members, including a Chairperson and Vice Chairperson, who are appointed by the Superintendent. Formal action from the Committee requires a majority vote of the quorum present. Individual members of the Committee shall not exercise authority for the Committee as a whole and shall not act independently of the Committee. Written applications will be reviewed by members of the District's Executive Leadership team for each applicant's experiences and qualifications. The Executive Leadership team will submit recommendations to the Superintendent for approval and appointment to the Committee.
- b) Appointments will be staggered for one year and two year terms. Terms may be extended for additional one or two year terms upon approval by the Superintendent.
- c) The Committee will approve meeting minutes, review and approve the reasonableness of reports from the District, and approve the issuance of status reports and other communications from the Committee.
- d) All meetings will be open to the general public.
- e) Membership on the Committee shall consist of interested persons from the following groups who can remain objective and independent with the District's best interest at heart:
 - 1. Special preference for members with expertise or knowledge in the areas of building design/engineering, construction, construction project management, and/or finance.
 - 2. Members active in a business organization representing the business community located in the District.
 - 3. Members who are parents or guardians of a child enrolled in the District and also active in a parent-teacher organization.
 - 4. Members of the community at-large.
- f) The Committee members receive no direct or indirect compensation from the District for their services as members of the Committee.
- g) The Committee members may not have an active contract or be seeking a contract with the District or with any contractor or sub-contractors associated with the Bond Programs.
- h) The Committee may not include any employee or official of the District, or any vendor, contractor or consultant of the District.
- i) A Committee member serves the general interest of the public as opposed to any personal interest or special interest group.
- j) If a Committee member moves outside of the District's geographic boundaries, resigns, violates the Ethics Policy contained herein, fails to attend two consecutive Committee meetings without reasonable excuse, or otherwise becomes unable to serve on the Committee, the Superintendent may declare the position on the Committee to be vacant and appoint another qualified person to the Committee.





Committee Duties and Responsibilities:

The Committee shall inform the Superintendent, Board, and general public (in that order) concerning the District's overall project management of all Bond Programs, including but not limited to:

- a) Review periodic reports produced by the District to verify effective and efficient use of bond proceeds and compliance with the purposes set forth in the Bond Programs as approved by the Board. See reports issued by the District in the "District Duties and Responsibilities" section below.
- b) Ensure that bond revenues are expended for the purpose set forth in the Bond Programs as approved by the Board of Education, and that any deferred proposals or plans where considered necessary are appropriate.
- c) Validate that no bond funds are used for any teacher or administrative salaries or other school operating expense, other than administrative salaries whose primary purpose is to manage the District's Bond Programs.
- d) Review efforts by the District to maximize bond revenues by balancing best value, quality, and efficiency in meeting the District's goals and priorities.
- e) Evaluate risks and related controls associated with the District's Bond Programs, determine focus areas and strategic approach to review, and communicate any findings and recommendations for improvement via a periodic independent report to the Superintendent, Board, and general public. To maximize these efforts, the Committee may recommend the performance of specific audit projects based on its risk assessments and communications to the Board Audit Committee and HISD Office of Inspector General.
- f) Coordinate with the Superintendent's designee to visit District facilities and grounds for which bond proceeds have been or will be expended, in accordance with any necessary access procedures.
- g) Review copies of other bond reports published by the District.
- h) Review any performance audits of the District's Bond Programs to ensure the District is taking appropriate action to remediate any deficiencies identified in such reports.
- i) Review operational audits conducted by the HISD Office of Inspector General to ensure the adequacy of scope, management action plans, and remediation efforts of the District.
- j) Review any financial audits of the District's Bond Programs to ensure the District is taking appropriate action to remediate any deficiencies identified in such reports.
- k) Provide periodic status reports and an annual report regarding the results of its activities, in addition to any Committee findings, recommendations, and management action plans, to the Superintendent and Board. These reports should include the Committee's opinion regarding the District's remediation efforts for any recommendations included in the performance audits, operational audits, or financial audits mentioned above and will be made available to the general public by inclusion on the District's website and other communication avenues.
- I) Perform other reasonable duties requested by the Superintendent.
- m) Disclose and sign an annual conflict of interest statement for existing conflicts and re-submit if any conflicts arise during a Committee member's tenure.
- n) Any perceived allegation of wrongdoing; potential waste, fraud, misuse or abuse; or non-compliance with Local, State, Federal laws/regulations, or District policies that becomes known to the Committee shall be communicated to the Superintendent, who shall refer such matters to the Board, Ethics and Compliance Officer, Office of Inspector General, and outside legal counsel where appropriate.



Bond Program Oversight Committee Charter

The Committee provides counsel and input to the administration and the Board, but it does not have management or policy-setting responsibilities. Also, the Committee does not have a fiduciary responsibility to the District or Board, nor are its members personally liable to the District or Board. The Committee is not responsible for:

- a) Approval of construction contracts or change orders;
- b) Appropriation of construction funds;
- c) Handling of legal matters;
- d) Approval of construction plans and schedules;
- e) Approval of the District's maintenance plan;
- f) Approval of the sale of bonds;
- g) Establishment of priorities and order of construction for the bond projects;
- h) Selection of architects, engineers, construction managers, project managers, and such other professional service firms;
- i) Approval of the design for each project including exterior materials, paint color, interior finishes, site plan and construction means or methods;
- j) Selection of independent audit firm(s), performance audit consultants and such other consultants as are necessary to support the performance of the Bond Programs;
- k) Setting or approving schedules of design and construction activities;
- Investigations of alleged wrongdoing; potential waste, fraud, misuse or abuse; or non-compliance with Local, State, Federal laws/regulations, or District policies.
- m) Directing the activities of staff or consultants; or
- n) Activities, roles or responsibilities that have been delegated to staff or consultants by the Superintendent or his designee.

Committee Meetings:

- a) The Committee shall meet at least quarterly to review the District's Bond Program's status and related information, and to perform other duties as provided herein. The Superintendent, Chairperson, or Vice Chairperson may convene additional meetings, if necessary.
- b) All Committee meetings shall be held within the District's geographic boundaries.
- c) Minutes will be prepared by a representative of the District and will be distributed to the Committee within 15 business days. The minutes will be voted upon for the record at the next scheduled Committee meeting.

District Duties and Responsibilities:

- a) The Chief Operating Officer shall act as the Superintendent's designee to the Committee.
- b) The Superintendent or his designee shall oversee management's action plan to respond to any written report from the Committee with findings or suggestions for improvement within 15 business days. All recommendations and management action plans from inception to date will be tracked and made available to the Committee and Board. The District's website and other communication avenues will also publicize the Committee's report and management's action plan for use by the general public.
- c) The District shall have a commitment to the Committee, provide open communication, and provide necessary technical and administrative assistance in a timely fashion as follows:
 - 1. Provision of a meeting room, including any necessary audio/visual equipment;

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- 2. Preparation and copies of any documentary meeting materials, such as agendas and reports; and distribution of those materials to the Committee in a timely manner;
- 3. Provision of a quarterly summary progress report covering the Bond Programs;
- 4. Access to other information to effectively perform its oversight function.
- 5. Retention of all Committee meeting records, and providing public access to such records on the District's website; and
- 6. Notify the public of Committee meeting times and locations. The meetings are open to the public.
- d) Summary progress reports will communicate and provide an explanation for the following attributes in a clear concise manner. As part of reporting, HISD will identify projects that experience a significant impact to schedule, budget, or scope of work. Detail reports can be provided upon the Committee's request.
 - 1. Project schedules with anticipated completion dates and current status.
 - 2. Project scope
 - 3. Contingency report (change allowance, encumbrances, and available budget)
 - 4. Expenditure reports
 - 5. Status of Minority/or Woman Owned Business Enterprise (MWBE)
- e) The appropriate District staff, District consultants, and/or designees shall attend all Committee proceedings in order to provide a status update for their area of responsibility as it relates to the Bond Programs and answer any questions from Committee members.
- f) The Office of Inspector General will consider the input and specific audit requests of the Committee and HISD management during its development of the Annual Audit Plan. Audit projects conducted by the Office of Inspector General will be completed by the issuance of a formal audit report, which will be provided to the Board Audit Committee and made available to the Committee. Such reports will be publicized on the District's website for use by the general public.
- g) The District acknowledges that the Committee may request certain information that is sensitive or legally privileged. The District will use the counsel of its legal advisor to comply with such requests within the limits of Texas law and the best interest of the District.



Ethics Policy:

This Ethics Policy provides general guidelines for Committee members to follow in carrying out their roles. Not all ethical issues that Committee members face are covered in this Policy. However, this Policy captures some of the critical areas that help define ethical and professional conduct for Committee members. The provisions of this Policy were developed from existing laws, rules, policies and procedures as well as from concepts that define generally accepted good business practices. Committee members are expected to strictly adhere to the provisions of this Ethics Policy.

Policy:

CONFLICT OF INTEREST. A Committee member shall not make or influence a District decision related to: (1) any contract funded by bond proceeds or (2) any construction project that will benefit the Committee member's outside employment, business, or provide a financial benefit to the Committee member or a family member, such as a spouse, child, parent, or sibling.

OUTSIDE EMPLOYMENT. A Committee member shall not use his or her authority over a particular matter to negotiate future employment with any person or organization that relates to: (1) any contract funded by bond proceeds; or (2) any construction project. A Committee member shall not make or influence a District decision related to any construction project involving the interest of a person with whom the member has an agreement concerning current or future employment, or remuneration of any kind. For a period of one (1) year after leaving the Committee, a former Committee member may not represent any person or organization for compensation in connection with any matter pending before the District that, as a Committee member, he or she participated in personally and substantially.

COMMITMENT TO UPHOLD LAW. A Committee member shall uphold the federal and Texas Constitutions, the laws and regulations of the United States and the State of Texas, and the policies, procedures, rules and regulations of the Houston Independent School District.

COMMITMENT TO DISTRICT. A Committee member shall place the interests of the District above any personal or business interest of the member.

MEMBER CERTIFICATION. A Committee member shall certify his or her understanding of Committee's Ethics Policy and disclose and sign an annual conflict of interest statement for existing conflicts and re-submit if any conflicts arise during their tenure.







Executive Summary

As the Houston Independent School District moves forward with planning for the 2012 bond program to renovate, build, or replace 40 schools, work is underway to finish all the projects in the 2007 bond program over the next two years.

As of March 31, more than 70 percent of the approved work in the 2007 bond program was complete. Among the milestones are 20 new schools that are open and serving our students.



Although new schools are often the highlights of any bond program, the \$805 million in funding approved by voters in 2007 included more than 180 expansion and renovation projects across the district. These projects varied greatly in scope and size, from the installation of 8,800 additional security cameras on campuses across the district to an \$11 million classroom and science laboratory addition at Bellaire High School.

'Several award-winning facilities'

The overall goal of the 2007 bond program was to replace deteriorated and outdated school facilities, relieve overcrowding at various campuses, and renovate and repair aging facilities throughout the district to address safety concerns, accessibility requirements, and deferred maintenance issues.

"We really have improved the learning environment at several campuses through better comfort and fixing deferred maintenance problems," said Dan Bankhead, general manager of Facilities Design. "We're proud to have produced several award-winning facilities."

Because so much of the 2007 bond program focused on elementary schools, HISD officials decided in 2012 to ask voters to put bond dollars to work on the district's high schools.

A new bond program

The \$1.89 billion program, approved by an overwhelming majority in November, will rebuild or replace 40 schools across the city, including 29 high schools, many of which are more than 50 years old and cost-prohibitive to maintain.

As of April 11, architect contracts have been awarded for 23 projects, including middle school restroom renovations and 19 schools.

2012 Bond Program Key Facts

- \$1.89 billion in funding

Overall, the 2012 bond program is more than the dollar amount of the 2007 bond program, but the scope of work is targeted to fewer schools. Building a new high school, however, for as many as 3,100 teenagers is a decidedly different challenge than building a large elementary school, many of which serve no more than 750 K-5 students. In particular, new high schools demand more space and specialized infrastructure to support unique educational programs.

Even so, the two bond programs share some common ground, including the emphasis on providing technologically up-to-date and environmentally sustainable learning environments.

Environmental sustainability

Schools built under the 2007 bond program were designed using Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) principles and guidelines. Key features in LEED schools include measures to conserve energy and natural resources, improved indoor air quality, effective use of day lighting in interior spaces, enhanced classroom acoustics, and minimized environmental impact on the site and community infrastructure. The design of the district's new schools incorporated many of these features through the use of water-conserving plumbing fixtures, rain collection systems, low VOC-emitting materials, energy-efficient lighting, and highperformance HVAC systems and building-automation controls. They also maximize the use of natural light.

These same standards will apply to all 2012 bond schools so that all new construction will be eligible for LEED certification.

Setting high goals for M/WBE participation

The two bond programs also share the goal of maximizing participation by qualified Minority and Women-Owned Business Enterprises. HISD's minimum M/WBE goal levels are 20 percent for all levels of purchasing and construction and 25 percent for professional services. In the 2007 program, the M/WBE commitment from all firms has reached nearly 34 percent. In the 2012 program, the contracts awarded to date reflect a 51% M/WBE commitment.

Outreach promotes transparency, accountability

As with the 2007 bond program, a key goal of the 2012 bond program is community engagement. The goal is to create a program that is transparent and accountable to the public.

Toward that end, a Project Advisory Team (PAT) will be formed at each of the 2012 bond campuses.

Each PAT will be comprised of stakeholders including administrators, teachers, students, parents, and community members. The PAT will meet monthly and will be actively engaged in making decisions about planning and design issues throughout the project.

In addition, the district has held two symposia on 21st century learning to help district staff and parents understand how these new facilities will deliver education in innovative ways.

The district also held Student Focus Groups and has given bond updates to HISD advisory committees, including the African American Advisory Committee; Hispanic Advisory Committee; Asian American Advisory Committee; Indo-American Advisory Committee; HISD Supplier Diversity Advisory Committee; 21st Century Schools Advisory Committee; and the Superintendent's Parent Advisory Committee.

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Financial Report

HISD 2007 Facilities Capital Program (FCP) has delivered on promises made and is in its last life cycle as we gear up for the 2012 bond program. The current overall financial status report for the 2007 Facilities Capital Program is comprised of total funding of \$1,176,130,676, actual committed of \$980,881,150 (including encumbrances of \$116,782,984 and actual expenditures of \$864,098,166). This results in an unspent funding to date balance of \$195,249,526. While this is a significant amount of money, it represents 17% of total funding. In addition, of the unspent funding, 52% is designated for Phase 4 projects and other projects that will carry forward to the new 2012 bond program. These projects are scheduled to begin construction this year.



The table below provides a summary of the school construction projects spending by funding source and outlines the actual funding, actual committed (including encumbrances and actual expenditures), and unspent funding to date from inception through March 31, 2013.

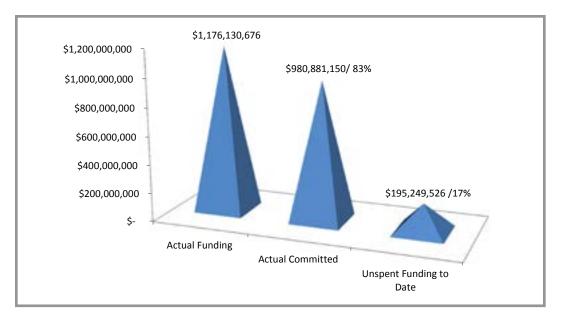

Many of the project available funds for completed projects have been transferred to the program reserve and are reflected in the detailed report. The Finance department continues to transfer available funds for completed projects since the March 31, 2013 report cutoff date.

Overall, unspent funding is 17% of total funding. This is a good indicator that the 2007 bond program work is being completed on time and within budget.

Column 5 – Pre-Encumbrance

Requisitions (request to buy) that have been entered into the accounting system and are pending approval/authorization to convert to a purchase order.

Column 6 – Encumbrance

Purchase order – also referred to as "commitment."

Column 7 – Actual

Represents total expenditures paid.

Column 8 – Available

Uncommitted funds (the difference between budget less pre-encumbrance less encumbrance less actual).

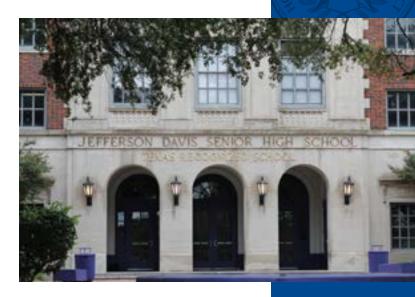

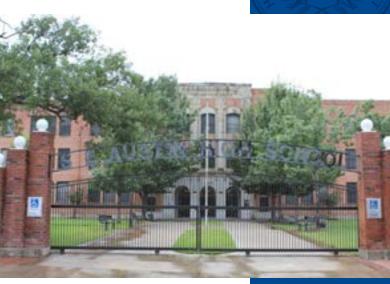

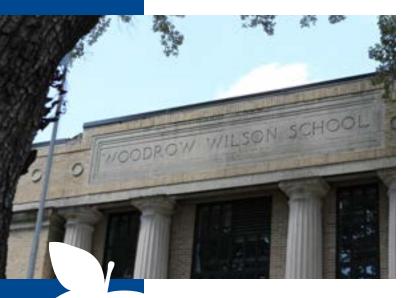

District-Wide Projects

Technology upgrades at all HISD schools (\$100,000,000)

Bond funds will allow the implementation of a robust, reliable infrastructure and appropriate technology tools that will support the expertise and knowledge of our teachers, administrators and staff to enable them to stay current with technology and applications used in academic and business environments.

Technology needs identified in the bond proposal were prioritized to meet the requirements of an increasingly Internet-driven method of delivering instructional content. Critical projects include:

- Network Equipment Upgrades or Replacements to improve the reliability and availability of the network, so students can take advantage of the educational resources delivered through high-speed Internet. Much of the district's network equipment is more than seven years old, is obsolete, and the probability of failure is high.
- Wireless Network Expansion will allow the school community to access the Internet and create a more flexible teaching and learning environment for our students.
- **Telephony System** is over 10 years old, no longer upgradeable and has a high failure rate. A modern and reliable phone system is essential for safety across the district.
- **Instructional Delivery Devices** such as projectors, interactive displays, and instructional devices, will be integrated into classrooms to promote active student engagement. This will provide teachers with a common ground to share and collaborate through a standard, interactive learning environment.

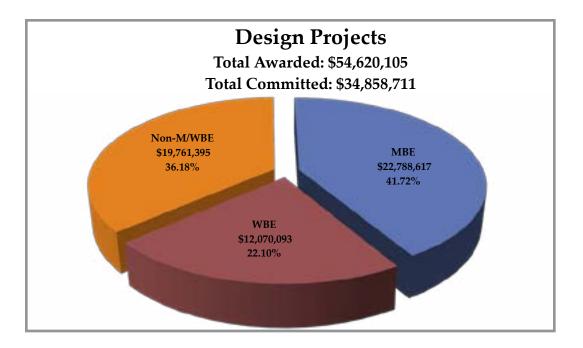

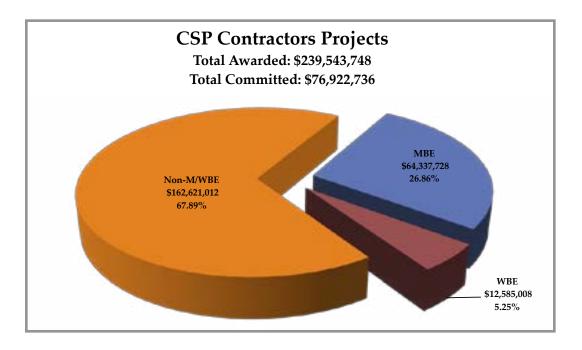




Certified Minority/Women Owned Businesses Breakdown by Project Type

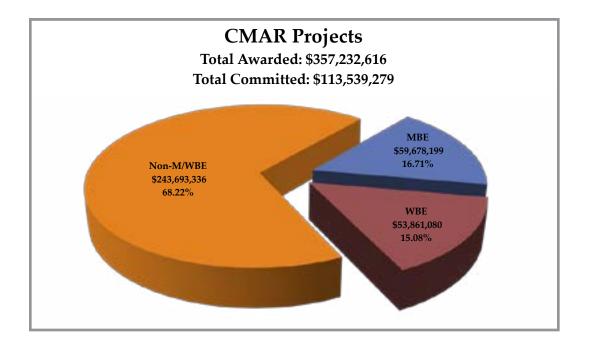


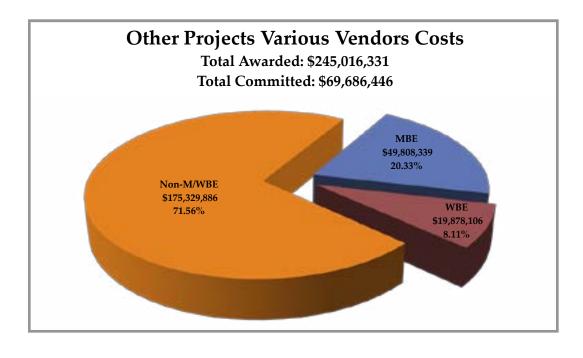




Certified Minority/Women Owned Businesses Breakdown by Project Type

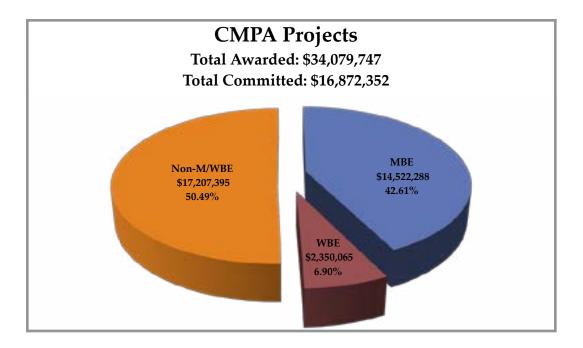


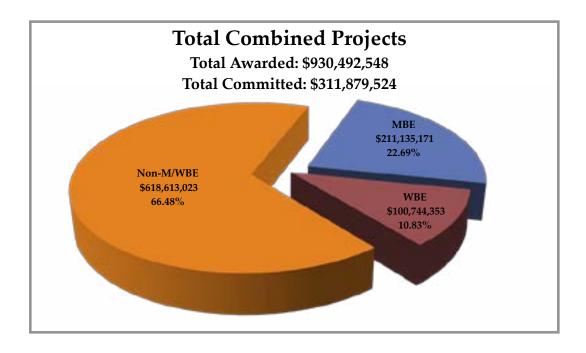

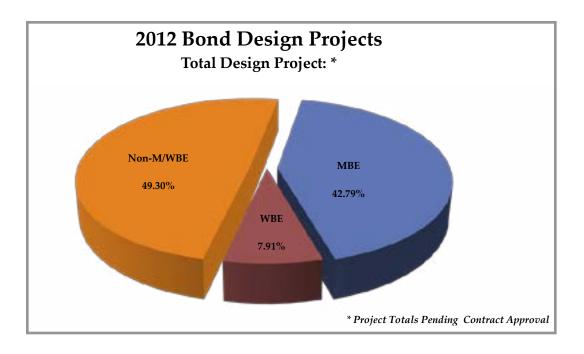

Executive Summary

On Nov. 6, 2012, Houston voters approved a \$1.89 billion bond — by a margin of nearly 2-1 — to replace and repair 40 schools across the district, including 29 high schools. Since then, the district has been vigorously planning to implement the new and renovated campuses, with design beginning in 2013 and construction slated to begin in 2014.

Schools across the country are being built and redesigned for 21st century needs, and HISD will be at the forefront of that movement by focusing on integrating innovative strategies and designs to boost student achievement in all 2012 bond campuses. Some common features include natural lighting, flexible spaces and furniture, spaces that provide opportunity for collaboration and handson learning, and green designs.



The bond program also includes work that will benefit students across the district, including \$100 million in technology upgrades, \$44.7 million to replace regional field houses and improve athletic facilities, \$35 million to renovate middle school restrooms, and \$17.3 million for safety and security improvements.

The entire program will be spread out over the next six to eight years to help control costs and allow the district to gradually phase in a 4.85-cent property tax rate increase over the next five years.

Over the past five months, the district has been diligently engaging the community through meetings, informational sessions, and equipping each campus with the tools to create 21st century schools that meet the needs of their students and community.

Request for Qualifications (RFQ)

The district has released a number of RFQs for services to support the 2012 Bond. HISD received 85 responses to the RFQ for Architecture and Engineering Services, and 23 selections have been approved by the Board. Recommendations for three additional projects will be made at the May Board Meeting. An advisory committee comprised of architects from each of the local architecture schools was formed to provide input and feedback to the selection committee during the process. In addition, school communities provided feedback in many of these projects.

There were 19 responses to an RFQ for Program Management services, firms have been interviewed, and the selection committee is in deliberation. An RFQ for 15 different types of professional services has also been released. There were 85 respondents, and recommendations have been approved by the Board for Environmental Services, Geotechnical Services, Real Estate Appraisal, and Surveying and Platting. Additional recommendations for other services, such as materials testing, hazardous materials consulting, etc., are expected to be made at a later date.

Community and School Outreach

Project Advisory Teams (PATs)

- PATs comprised of stakeholders, administrators, teachers, students, parents, and community members are being formed at each bond campus, and monthly meeting schedules are being established to actively engage a wide variety of stakeholders in making decisions about planning and design issues throughout the project.
- Members have received handbooks to use as a resource during the facility planning and construction phase.

'Building the Future' & 'Building 21st Century Schools' Symposia

- Events on Dec. 14 and March 6 helped attendees, including community stakeholders, school faculty, and administrators, envision the future for their new learning environments.
- Both events featured design and education experts who emphasized the importance of using the bond program to rethink instruction and move beyond traditional classroom models into 21st century learning models.

Community Meetings and Engagement

- Several Phase 1 bond campuses have held meetings to address concerns of the community regarding construction and design. Additionally, these meetings also informed community members about the district's goal for each facility.
- As planning continues, each bond campus will have at least three community meetings to discuss project parameters.

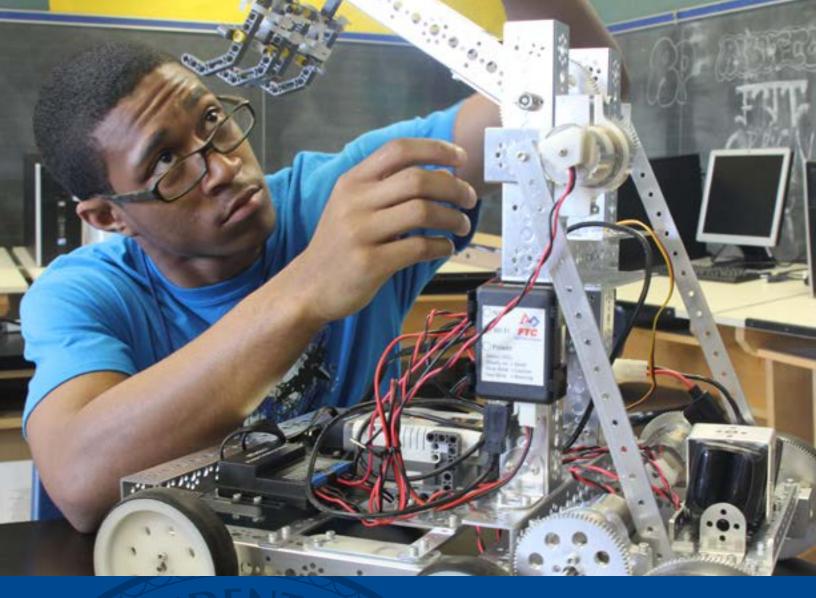

Glossary of Terms

BAS

Building Automation System (HVAC and lighting controls)

Change order

A modification to the original construction contract authorizing a change in the work or an adjustment in the amount of the contract or the contract time. The original contract price may not be increased by more than 25% by change order.

Competitive Bidding

A procurement method by which a governmental entity contracts with a contractor for the construction, alteration, rehabilitation, or repair of a facility by awarding the contract to the lowest responsible bidder.

Competitive Sealed Proposal (CSP)

A procurement method by which a governmental entity may request proposals and pricing information based on the scope of work provided, rank the offers, negotiate a contract, and then award the project to the contractor that offers the best value to the entity.

Construction commissioning

A collaborative process whose purpose is to ensure that buildings and systems perform according to contract.

Commissioning agent

An independent party, unaffiliated with the design team or contractors, that takes charge of the construction commissioning process.

Construction documents

Extremely detailed drawings and specifications showing and describing all of the details required to construct the building.

Construction Manager at Risk (CMAR)

A construction delivery method by which a governmental entity contracts with an architect or engineer for design and construction phase services and contracts separately with a construction manager-at-risk to serve as the general contractor and to provide consultation during the design and construction, rehabilitation, alteration, or repair of a facility. A CMAR is selected based upon qualifications and price proposal that would provide the best value for the governmental entity.

Daylighting

A planned energy conservation strategy that utilizes illumination from sunlight.



Design development

Process in which schematic design drawings are further developed to include more detail, including: detailed site plan; room layouts; door and window types; interior and exterior elevations; reflected ceiling plans; plumbing, mechanical, structural, and electrical drawings; and kitchen layouts.

Design team

A group of professionals from architectural and engineering firms that is engaged to design a facility.

Encumbrance Accounting

The recognition of commitments that will subsequently become expenditures when goods and services are received. Encumbrances are posted for documents such as purchase estimates, purchase orders, and contracts.

FF&E

Furniture, fixtures, and equipment. This describes all contents that are not a permanent part of the structure.

Hard costs

Expenses associated with direct construction of a project.

HVAC

Heating, ventilation, and air-conditioning

Job Order Contract (JOC)

A procurement method used for maintenance, repair, alteration, renovation, remediation, or minor construction of a facility when the work is of a recurring nature, but the delivery times, type, and quantities of work required are indefinite.

Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED)

A building certification process developed by the U.S. Green Building Council (USGBC) to enhance environmental awareness among architects and building contractors and to encourage the design and construction of energy-efficient, water-conserving buildings that use sustainable or green resources and materials.

MEP

Mechanical/electrical and plumbing systems.

Program or Concept design

Single-line drawings that illustrate room adjacencies and scale



Schematic Design

Typically includes a simple site plan, floor plans, simple building cross-sections, an outline specification with general information about building systems, a table comparing required square footages from the educational specifications with actual square footages shown on the drawings, a preliminary estimate of cost options, and three-dimensional depictions of the exterior of the building.

Schedule of values

An itemization of costs that comprises the entire contract amount.

Scope-to-Budget

An analytical review conducted by the architectural/engineering team to ensure the proposed scope of work and project requirements are aligned with the established construction budget. The approved findings from this review become the basis for the design and preparation of the construction documents.

Soft costs

A construction industry term, but more specifically a contractor accounting term for an expense item that is not considered direct construction cost. Soft costs include architectural, engineering, financing, legal fees, and other pre- and post-construction expenses.

Swing space

A school building or a portion of an existing school building or other facility that will house the student population and its teachers and staff during the school-construction process.

SUBJECT: APPROVAL OF PRIMARY CONSTRUCTION METHODS FOR DISTRICT CONSTRUCTION CONTRACTS, CRITERIA FOR SELECTION OF CONTRACTORS, AND DELEGATION OF EVALUATION AUTHORITY

On October 21, 1999, in response to Senate Bill 669, the Houston Independent School District (HISD) Board of Education approved competitive bidding as the primary construction delivery method for the district, while retaining the option to designate other "default methods" in the future.

On April 27, 2000, the HISD Board of Education approved competitive sealed proposals as primary construction delivery method for projects equal to and greater than \$300,000, and approved selection criteria for evaluation and ranking. On July 8, 2004, and again on November 11, 2010, the HISD Board of Education approved revisions to criteria for evaluation and selection of contracts for competitive sealed proposals.

Job order contracting was also approved on April 27, 2000, for minor recurring construction work for projects not to exceed \$200,000 per annum. On March 10, 2005, the HISD Board of Education approved a change from \$200,000 to \$300,000 per project for job order contracts.

On April 8, 2004, the HISD Board of Education approved selection criteria and evaluation method for construction manager-at-risk projects. On October 8, 2008, the HISD Board of Education approved the construction manager-at-risk construction method for new construction projects in the 2007 Facilities Capital Program.

On February 10, 2011, the HISD Board of Education approved revisions to the previously established construction delivery methods based on experience with these methods. The revisions also aligned the construction manager-at-risk selection criteria more closely with the selection criteria for a competitive sealed proposal.

On September 13, 2012, the HISD Board of Education approved changes in criteria for evaluation and selection of contractors for the competitive sealed proposal construction delivery method.

At this time, the administration recommends revisions to approved construction delivery methods based on experience with these methods since 2000 and changes in the construction field.

The attached resolution, which has been reviewed and approved by HISD Legal Representatives, incorporates all proposed revisions to delivery methods and selection criteria and will be applicable to those projects advertised for construction after April 12, 2013, and where design efforts that are underway are not adversely affected.

It also authorizes the superintendent of schools or a designee to determine which construction/project delivery method provides best value based upon the identified delivery method selection criteria; to evaluate and rank bids, competitive sealed proposals, qualifications and proposals for construction manager-at-risk, and qualifications and proposals for design/build; to negotiate competitive sealed proposals, proposals for construction manager-at-risk with the proposed selected offeror, and proposals for design/build with the proposed selected offeror (and with the next competitive sealed proposal, construction manager-at-risk or design/build offerors in the order of selection ranking if agreement cannot be reached with prior offerors); and to recommend the final contractor selections to the HISD Board of Education for approval and award of contracts.

RECOMMENDED: That the Board of Education approve the resolution determining the construction delivery methods that provide the best value for the district, subject to subsequent board approval of other methods for designated individual or groups of construction contracts as determined by the board; approve the criteria for evaluation and ranking of offerors for construction services to the district; and authorize the superintendent of schools or a designee to evaluate and rank bids, and to negotiate with offerors for construction services as provided in the resolution, effective April 12, 2013.

HOUSTON INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE DETERMINATION OF PRIMARY CONSTRUCTION METHODS THAT PROVIDE THE BEST VALUE FOR THE DISTRICT, ESTABLISHMENT OF CRITERIA FOR SELECTION OF CONSTRUCTION CONTRACTORS, AND DELEGATION OF EVALUATION AUTHORITY.

WHEREAS, Section 2267.056(a) of the Texas Government Code provides that the board of trustees of a school district that is considering a construction contract using a method specific by Chapter 2267 must, before advertising, determine which method provides the best value for the district; and

WHEREAS, Section 2267.053(a) of the Texas Government Code provides that the board of trustees of a school district may delegate its authority under Chapter 2267 to a designated representative, committee, or other person.

WHEREAS, the HISD Board of Education has previously approved construction delivery methods based upon experience with those methods.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE HOUSTON INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT THAT:

All of the above paragraphs are incorporated and made a part of this Resolution; and

That the Board of Education determines in accordance with Chapter 2267 of the Texas Government Code, subject to the provisions hereinafter set forth, the following:

(1) That all construction/project delivery methods provided for in Chapter 2267 may be considered, and the following factors are to be used in determining which construction/project delivery method provides the best value to HISD: (a) schedule/phasing necessity; (b) scope definition; (c) project complexity; and (d) other project-specific considerations. See Attachment A.

(2) That when the Job Order Contracting (Delivery Order Contracting) construction/project delivery method is determined to be best value for the district, each project shall not exceed \$500,000 and aggregate contracts for an offeror shall not exceed \$1,000,000 per annum per campus without approval of the Board of Education.

(3) That the construction manager-at-risk may be selected using either a onestep or two-step process as proscribed in Section 2267.253 of the Texas Government Code.

(4) That the Board of Education determines and selects that the criteria listed in Attachment B hereto be designated as the criteria to be included in the request for competitive bids and be used to determine the lowest responsible bidder, that the criteria listed in Attachment B-1 hereto be designated as the criteria to be included in the competitive sealed proposals and to be used to evaluate those construction offerors, that the criteria listed in Attachment B-2 hereto be designated as the criteria to be included in requests for proposals or qualifications for construction manager-at-risk (one-step and two-step process) and be used to evaluate those construction offerors, and that the criteria listed in Attachment B-3 hereto be designated as the criteria to be included in requests for qualifications and proposal for design-build and be used to evaluate those construction offerors.

(5) That the Board of Education rescinds its prior designation of primary delivery methods for all construction contracts of the District as described in the February 11, 2011 Resolution.

(6) That the Board of Education determines and delegates to the Superintendent of Schools and his designated staff the authority to (a) determine the best value construction/project delivery methods based upon the identified criteria, (b) evaluate and rank bids, competitive sealed proposals, construction manager-at-risk qualifications and proposals, and design-build qualifications and proposals, (c) on all non-competitive bidding proposals negotiate with the proposed selected offeror and with the next offerors in the order of selection ranking if agreement cannot be reached with prior offers, (d) to recommend the final contractor selection to the Board for approval and award of contract, and (e) to perform any and all other acts deemed necessary by the Superintendent of Schools to implement and carry out the contractor selection process.

(7) That any future action to be made by the Board of Education related (a) to determinations to be made by the Board of Education on construction delivery methods for individual projects or groups of projects, or an alternative primary method of delivery, (b) to selection of criteria for evaluation of bids and proposals, and (c) to delegation of authority for evaluation of bids and proposals, all as set forth herein, may be made by approval of the Board of Education through the regular agenda approval process and without the necessity of formal resolution for any such future determination.
