Bond Program Oversight Committee Charter

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BACKGROUND

The Declaration of Beliefs and Visions for the Houston Independent School District ("HISD", the "District") states the primary goal of HISD is to increase student achievement. The District's Bond Programs impact the following additional goals that exist to support the primary goal:

- Goal 3: Provide a Safe Environment The District shall create a safe environment conducive to learning for all students and provide safety and security measures at District schools and facilities, and while attending District-related events.
- Goal 4: Increase Management Effectiveness and Efficiency The District shall have a decentralized organizational structure that will promote autonomy and innovation in schools. With a districtwide commitment to performance over compliance and a shared accountability system in place, the District shall employ best practices of administrative principles to make optimal use of District resources and taxpayer dollars.
- Goal 5: Improve Public Support and Confidence in Schools The schools belong to the people; hence, the board, administration, and support staff are public servants who exist to support the schools and the relationship between teachers, students, and parents. Public confidence will increase as the District increases transparency, accountability at all levels, and meaningful engagement of the community.
- Goal 6: Create a Positive District Culture The District's clearly articulated purpose will serve as the catalyst for creating a powerful sense of community and a shared direction among personnel, parents, students, and the public. Because the District realizes the value of investing in human capital, the District will work to attract and retain the best teachers and staff members, and create working conditions in which their talents can flourish.

The Bond Program Oversight Committee ("Committee") plays a critical, strategic role in assisting the District while completing these goals.

PURPOSE OF CHARTER

The Board of Education ("Board") for the District desires to make continual improvements to existing programs. As a result, the Bond Program Oversight Committee Charter ("Charter") is adopted to explain the mission, purpose, structure, membership, duties, responsibilities, and expectations. This Charter supersedes the previously adopted charter dated August 30, 2010.

COMMITTEE MISSION

The HISD Board, in response to community interest in the effective and efficient use of bond proceeds, has established a mechanism to encourage greater accountability, transparency, public support, and confidence by creating the Committee. The Committee is an independent citizens' Committee that is responsible to the Superintendent, Board, and general public (in that order).

The Committee's charge is to monitor all applicable Bond funded construction projects and help interested Houstonians to stay informed about new construction and renovation projects in the District. Its purpose is to monitor performance and compliance in order to confirm that HISD implements Bond Program work in conformance with the program approved by the Board and make recommendations to maximize available resources to achieve construction goals in the most effective and cost efficient manner. Its focus should be oversight rather than limited to hindsight.

COMMITTEE STRUCTURE AND MEMBERSHIP

- a) The Committee has up to nine voting members, including a Chairperson and Vice Chairperson, who are appointed by the Superintendent. Formal action from the Committee requires a majority vote of the quorum present. Individual members of the Committee shall not exercise authority for the Committee as a whole and shall not act independently of the Committee. Written applications will be reviewed by members of the District's Executive Leadership team for each applicant's experiences and qualifications. The Executive Leadership team will submit recommendations to the Superintendent for approval and appointment to the Committee.
- b) Appointments will be staggered for one year and two year terms. Terms may be extended for additional one or two year terms upon approval by the Superintendent.
- c) The Committee will approve meeting minutes, review and approve the reasonableness of reports from the District, and approve the issuance of status reports and other communications from the Committee.
- d) All meetings will be open to the general public.
- e) Membership on the Committee shall consist of interested persons from the following groups who can remain objective and independent with the District's best interest at heart:
 - 1. Special preference for members with expertise or knowledge in the areas of building design/engineering, construction, construction project management, and/or finance.
 - 2. Members active in a business organization representing the business community located in the District.
 - 3. Members who are parents or guardians of a child enrolled in the District and also active in a parent-teacher organization.
 - 4. Members of the community at-large.
- f) The Committee members receive no direct or indirect compensation from the District for their services as members of the Committee.
- g) The Committee members may not have an active contract or be seeking a contract with the District or with any contractor or sub-contractors associated with the Bond Programs.
- h) The Committee may not include any employee or official of the District, or any vendor, contractor or consultant of the District.
- i) A Committee member serves the general interest of the public as opposed to any personal interest or special interest group.
- j) If a Committee member moves outside of the District's geographic boundaries, resigns, violates the Ethics Policy contained herein, fails to attend two consecutive Committee meetings without reasonable excuse, or otherwise becomes unable to serve on the Committee, the Superintendent may declare the position on the Committee to be vacant and appoint another qualified person to the Committee.

COMMITTEE DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

The Committee shall inform the Superintendent, Board, and general public (in that order) concerning the District's overall project management of all Bond Programs, including but not limited to:

- a) Review periodic reports produced by the District to verify effective and efficient use of bond proceeds and compliance with the purposes set forth in the Bond Programs as approved by the Board. See reports issued by the District in the "District Duties and Responsibilities" section below.
- b) Ensure that bond revenues are expended for the purpose set forth in the Bond Programs as approved by the Board of Education, and that any deferred proposals or plans where considered necessary are appropriate.
- c) Validate that no bond funds are used for any teacher or administrative salaries or other school operating expense, other than administrative salaries whose primary purpose is to manage the District's Bond Programs.
- d) Review efforts by the District to maximize bond revenues by balancing best value, quality, and efficiency in meeting the District's goals and priorities.
- e) Evaluate risks and related controls associated with the District's Bond Programs, determine focus areas and strategic approach to review, and communicate any findings and recommendations for improvement via a periodic independent report to the Superintendent, Board, and general public. To maximize these efforts, the Committee may recommend the performance of specific audit projects based on its risk assessments and communications to the Board Audit Committee and HISD Office of Inspector General.
- f) Coordinate with the Superintendent's designee to visit District facilities and grounds for which bond proceeds have been or will be expended, in accordance with any necessary access procedures.
- g) Review copies of other bond reports published by the District.
- h) Review any performance audits of the District's Bond Programs to ensure the District is taking appropriate action to remediate any deficiencies identified in such reports.
- i) Review operational audits conducted by the HISD Office of Inspector General to ensure the adequacy of scope, management action plans, and remediation efforts of the District.
- i) Review any financial audits of the District's Bond Programs to ensure the District is taking appropriate action to remediate any deficiencies identified in such reports.
- k) Provide periodic status reports and an annual report regarding the results of its activities, in addition to any Committee findings, recommendations, and management action plans, to the Superintendent and Board. These reports should include the Committee's opinion regarding the District's remediation efforts for any recommendations included in the performance audits, operational audits, or financial audits mentioned above and will be made available to the general public by inclusion on the District's website and other communication avenues.
- 1) Perform other reasonable duties requested by the Superintendent.
- m) Disclose and sign an annual conflict of interest statement for existing conflicts and re-submit if any conflicts arise during a Committee member's tenure.

BOND PROGRAM OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE CHARTER

n) Any perceived allegation of wrongdoing; potential waste, fraud, misuse or abuse; or non-compliance with Local, State, Federal laws/regulations, or District policies that becomes known to the Committee shall be communicated to the Superintendent, who shall refer such matters to the Board, Ethics and Compliance Officer, Office of Inspector General, and outside legal counsel where appropriate.

The Committee provides counsel and input to the administration and the Board, but it does not have management or policy-setting responsibilities. Also, the Committee does not have a fiduciary responsibility to the District or Board, nor are its members personally liable to the District or Board. The Committee is not responsible for:

- a) Approval of construction contracts or change orders;
- b) Appropriation of construction funds;
- c) Handling of legal matters;
- d) Approval of construction plans and schedules;
- e) Approval of the District's maintenance plan;
- f) Approval of the sale of bonds;
- g) Establishment of priorities and order of construction for the bond projects;
- h) Selection of architects, engineers, construction managers, project managers, and such other professional service firms;
- i) Approval of the design for each project including exterior materials, paint color, interior finishes, site plan and construction means or methods;
- j) Selection of independent audit firm(s), performance audit consultants and such other consultants as are necessary to support the performance of the Bond Programs;
- k) Setting or approving schedules of design and construction activities;
- I) Investigations of alleged wrongdoing; potential waste, fraud, misuse or abuse; or non-compliance with Local, State, Federal laws/regulations, or District policies.
- m) Directing the activities of staff or consultants; or
- n) Activities, roles or responsibilities that have been delegated to staff or consultants by the Superintendent or his designee.

COMMITTEE MEETINGS

- a) The Committee shall meet at least quarterly to review the District's Bond Program's status and related information, and to perform other duties as provided herein. The Superintendent, Chairperson, or Vice Chairperson may convene additional meetings, if necessary.
- b) All Committee meetings shall be held within the District's geographic boundaries.
- c) Minutes will be prepared by a representative of the District and will be distributed to the Committee within 15 business days. The minutes will be voted upon for the record at the next scheduled Committee meeting.

DISTRICT DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

- a) The Chief Operating Officer shall act as the Superintendent's designee to the Committee.
- b) The Superintendent or his designee shall oversee management's action plan to respond to any written report from the Committee with findings or suggestions for improvement within 15 business days. All recommendations and management action plans from inception to date will be tracked and made available to the Committee and Board. The District's website and other communication avenues will also publicize the Committee's report and management's action plan for use by the general public.
- c) The District shall have a commitment to the Committee, provide open communication, and provide necessary technical and administrative assistance in a timely fashion as follows:
 - 1. Provision of a meeting room, including any necessary audio/visual equipment;
 - 2. Preparation and copies of any documentary meeting materials, such as agendas and reports; and distribution of those materials to the Committee in a timely manner;
 - 3. Provision of a quarterly summary progress report covering the Bond Programs;
 - 4. Access to other information to effectively perform its oversight function.
 - 5. Retention of all Committee meeting records, and providing public access to such records on the District's website; and
 - 6. Notify the public of Committee meeting times and locations. The meetings are open to the public.
- d) Summary progress reports will communicate and provide an explanation for the following attributes in a clear concise manner. As part of reporting, HISD will identify projects that experience a significant impact to schedule, budget, or scope of work. Detail reports can be provided upon the Committee's request.
 - 1. Project schedules with anticipated completion dates and current status.
 - 2. Project scope
 - 3. Contingency report (change allowance, encumbrances, and available budget)
 - 4. Expenditure reports
 - 5. Status of Minority/or Woman Owned Business Enterprise (M/WBE)
- e) The appropriate District staff, District consultants, and/or designees shall attend all Committee proceedings in order to provide a status update for their area of responsibility as it relates to the Bond Programs and answer any questions from Committee members.
- f) The Office of Inspector General will consider the input and specific audit requests of the Committee and HISD management during its development of the Annual Audit Plan. Audit projects conducted by the Office of Inspector General will be completed by the issuance of a formal audit report, which will be provided to the Board Audit Committee and made available to the Committee. Such reports will be publicized on the District's website for use by the general public.

g) The District acknowledges that the Committee may request certain information that is sensitive or legally privileged. The District will use the counsel of its legal advisor to comply with such requests within the limits of Texas law and the best interest of the District.

ETHICS POLICY

This Ethics Policy provides general guidelines for Committee members to follow in carrying out their roles. Not all ethical issues that Committee members face are covered in this Policy. However, this Policy captures some of the critical areas that help define ethical and professional conduct for Committee members. The provisions of this Policy were developed from existing laws, rules, policies and procedures as well as from concepts that define generally accepted good business practices. Committee members are expected to strictly adhere to the provisions of this Ethics Policy.

POLICY

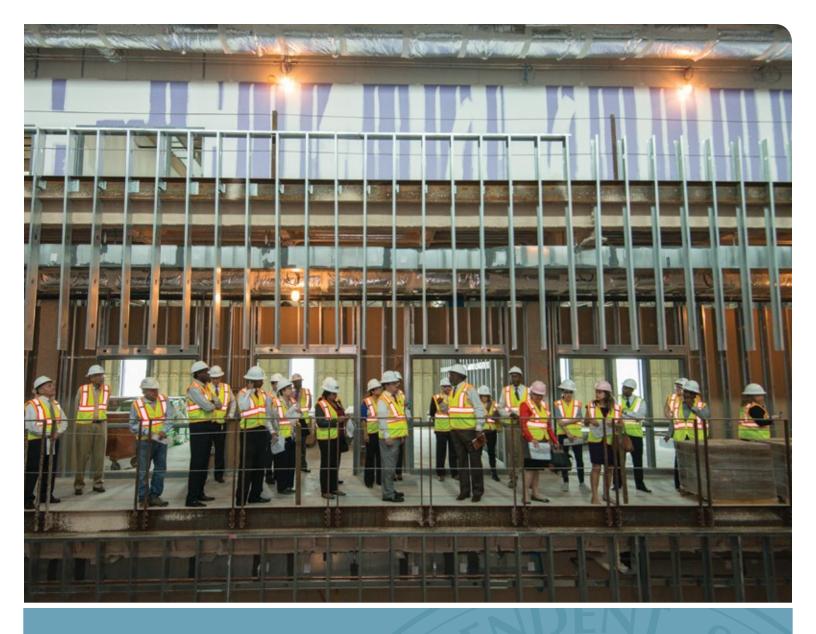
CONFLICT OF INTEREST, A Committee member shall not make or influence a District decision related to: (1) any contract funded by bond proceeds or (2) any construction project that will benefit the Committee member's outside employment, business, or provide a financial benefit to the Committee member or a family member, such as a spouse, child, parent, or sibling.

OUTSIDE EMPLOYMENT. A Committee member shall not use his or her authority over a particular matter to negotiate future employment with any person or organization that relates to: (1) any contract funded by bond proceeds; or (2) any construction project. A Committee member shall not make or influence a District decision related to any construction project involving the interest of a person with whom the member has an agreement concerning current or future employment, or remuneration of any kind. For a period of one (1) year after leaving the Committee, a former Committee member may not represent any person or organization for compensation in connection with any matter pending before the District that, as a Committee member, he or she participated in personally and substantially.

COMMITMENT TO UPHOLD LAW. A Committee member shall uphold the federal and Texas Constitutions, the laws and regulations of the United States and the State of Texas, and the policies, procedures, rules and regulations of the Houston Independent School District.

COMMITMENT TO DISTRICT. A Committee member shall place the interests of the District above any personal or business interest of the member.

MEMBER CERTIFICATION. A Committee member shall certify his or her understanding of Committee's Ethics Policy and disclose and sign an annual conflict of interest statement for existing conflicts and re-submit if any conflicts arise during their tenure.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

With construction underway at about two dozen campuses and six new school buildings scheduled to open for the start of the new school year, the second quarter has marked a significant milestone in the district's bond program.

Schools set to open in time for the start of the 2016-2017 school year include Condit and Mark White elementary schools, North Houston Early College and South Early College high schools, Mandarin Immersion Magnet School, and (non-bond) North Forest Early Childhood Center.

Students will also begin the fall semester attending classes in the new classroom wing (Phase 1) at Worthing High School. At Waltrip High School, the new main entryway, band hall, first and second story classrooms, offices and CTE space will open in August. The remaining renovation areas (third story classrooms, second gymnasium, and girls' locker room) are expected to wrap up in first quarter 2017.

Construction on Delmar Fieldhouse and Sterling Aviation High School are expected to be completed in the fall.

Rainy weather has posed an obstacle in the second quarter, especially as crews are working to finish schools set to open this August. Although some projects will be working on punchlist activities, they will be ready for students on the first day of the coming school year.

In preparation for the opening of these schools, the team has been coordinating furniture delivery and move-in details with principals and project managers. During the second quarter, furniture was placed at two schools – Worthing High School (Phase 1) and North Houston Early College High School. The months of July and August will see furniture delivered at all other schools preparing to open.

In other noteworthy events, the Yates High School project broke ground on June 2 with a ceremony that drew dozens, including local, state, and federal officials. Wisdom High School is taking shape and tracking toward an August 2017 completion date — progress that was celebrated with beam-signing and topping-out ceremonies.

During the second quarter, the board approved construction contracts on seven projects, including Kashmere High School, Eastwood Academy, Wilson Montessori, the Northside High School parking lot and three middle school restroom renovation packages. The board also authorized negotiations for a CMAR contract for Northside High School with Satterfield & Pontikes. The first CMAR contract for the project was terminated after negotiations on a guaranteed maximum weren't successful.

The goal remains to have all contracts executed by the end of the year, with the exception of Bellaire High School. That project continues to pose challenges as district officials work with the Project Advisory Team and community stakeholders to develop consensus around scope.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

In April, the finance team sold the third tranche of bonds, valued at \$560 million to ensure appropriate cash and reserves for project expenditures and commitments. With regards to the supplemental funding approved by district trustees in December 2015, the team remains committed to being good stewards of these public resources, and will not use the additional funding unless absolutely necessary.

In June, the Board of Education approved a budget that allows HISD to maintain its current maintenance and operations tax rate of \$1.0267 per \$100 of taxable value. The district also proposed an increase of 1 cent to the debt service tax rate, bringing it to \$0.18 for the repayment of the 2012 bonds. If approved, this would be just the second penny added to the debt service tax rate, which is less than the 4.85-cent rate increase that was projected in 2012. Even with this proposed increase, HISD will still boast the lowest tax rate among the two-dozen districts in Harris County. A vote on the property tax rate is planned for October.

DESIGN MILESTONES

Construction documents have been completed for Askew Elementary School, Jordan High School for Careers, Young Women's College Preparatory Academy, Garden Oaks Montessori, and Wilson Montessori in second quarter 2016. Critical detailing, engineering, and design work on the remaining Group 3 and Group 4 projects is being finalized in preparation for contractor pricing in third quarter 2016. Project teams have been working diligently on completing the construction documents, and they have remained focused on creating sustainable environments for our students. Currently, 25 of the 2012 Bond Program projects are registered for LEED certifications with the U.S. Green Building Council/Green Building Council Institute. More than 60 percent of the project teams are targeting the LEED Silver rating for their projects, and the goal is that at least one of the projects will achieve the Gold rating.

Additionally, meetings were held between HISD team members and the City of Houston Permit Department to facilitate the permitting of our temporary/transportable building work scheduled to take place over the summer and to engage in lessons learned discussions with the Code Enforcement Division.

M/WBE NETWORKING ACTIVITIES

The Office of Business Assistance held and participated in multiple programs to promote HISD business and bid opportunities during the second quarter. The Supplier Diversity team sponsored three Workshop Wednesday meetings, which are held monthly to provide information to M/WBEs on topics of interest. Second quarter workshops featured: Delivering Excellent Customer Service, Achieving Your Desired Results, and Building Cyber Resilience-Being Proactive in a Reactive Cyber World.

The Business Assistance office has partnered with the City of Houston, METRO, and the Port of Houston to create the Interagency Mentor Protégé Program to strengthen effective working relationships and foster long term stability between 20 leaders of established companies and M/WBEs.

The Supplier Diversity team regularly promotes bid opportunities and pre-bid meetings to their extensive contact list of minority companies and to effectively respond to email and telephone inquiries.

COMMUNICATIONS AND COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

The Bond Communications team continues to work with project managers, school principals, and Project Advisory Teams (PATs) to provide communications support and community relations strategies to effectively engage stakeholders.

The team provided communications support for seven community meetings in the second quarter. Planning and logistical support also was provided for three groundbreaking ceremonies at Parker Elementary School and Booker T. Washington and Jack Yates high schools and two dedication ceremonies at Kate Smith Elementary School and Tanglewood Middle School.

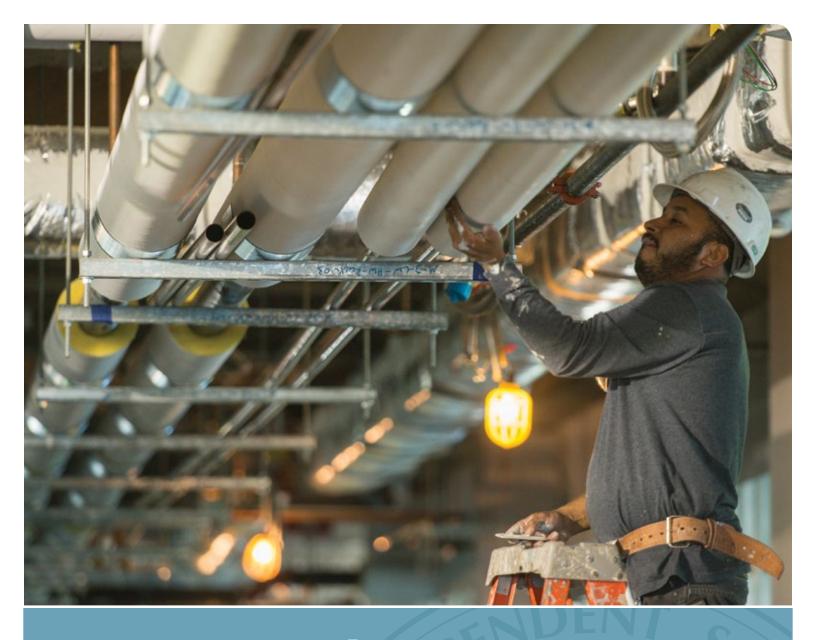
Additionally, communications support is planned for the six schools scheduled to open their doors in the third quarter for the start of 2016-2017 school year. The team has developed a Move-In/Move-Out Guide and New Facility Communications Plan to help principals as they transition into their new buildings and a Groundbreaking and Dedication Guide to help principals plan events and ceremonies that help celebrate these important milestones.

The team also continues to distribute timely and accurate information about the bond program through eNews articles, email blasts, school community meetings, fliers, community outreach events, social media, videos, and blog posts. This quarter, the team has written 37 web stories, posted 107 Twitter and 28 Facebook updates, produced nine videos, and distributed 11 press releases.

REAL ESTATE PURCHASES

The Real Estate Department has finalized the purchase of all individual properties, including residential and unimproved properties, for expansion of current school sites and new school sites as an integral part of the bond program. Real Estate currently is marketing 11 surplus properties for sale and is fielding about 20 inquiries regarding these surplus HISD properties each week. One surplus property was sold on April 15. Additionally, Real Estate is maintaining and renewing current lease agreements as needed, negotiating and developing short term parking lot leases as required for the bond program, assisting project managers with land planning issues, and searching possible sites for future development. Real Estate is also currently working on development of a centralized database of key documents for all HISD properties.

3. Program costs allocated to each project budget will be separated into various program budgets to provide better oversight and financial management, at a later date.

4. New schools / replacement projects will undergo a school site specific ed-spec development process and all schools will undergo a scope to budget process.

5. Project budgets include allocations for planning, design, construction, administration, and other related costs.

6. The current allocation for the Young Men's College Preparatory Academy (YMCPA) will allow for a demolition of the EO Smith facility, the addition of a smaller facility, and the renovation of the HP Carter facility for use by the YMCPA. An alternate plan for the project to include the demolition of both the EO Smith and HP Carter facilities and the building of a new school would cost an additional \$13,727,000.

7. Condit ES will be rebuilt and funded from surplus bond funds and/or the sale of real estate.

8. High School for Law Enforcement and Criminal Justice will be rebuilt and funded from surplus bond funds and/or the sale of real estate.

TECHNOLOGY UPGRADES AT ALL HISD SCHOOLS: \$100 MILLION

The 2012 bond allocated funding for network improvements and wireless expansion.

Project Status

The scope of this work includes the addition of wireless access points, cabling, and other infrastructure equipment, such as network switches and voice over Internet Protocol (VoIP). These improvements will allow for the expansion of digital instruction, as well as safety and security improvements like telephones in classrooms.

The VoIP project started in September 2015 with the goal of upgrading district locations according to a phased schedule. The project is broken into 10 groups or phases. Thus far, three groups of schools have been completed.

The following group of schools were completed in June: Ashford ES, Bastian ES, Browning ES, Burbank ES, Cage ES, Cornelius ES, Davila ES, Eastwood Academy, Eliot ES, Emerson ES, Gallegos ES, Garcia ES, Garden Villas ES, Tanglewood (formerly Grady) MS, Halpin ECC, Harper Alternative, Helms ES, High School Ahead Academy, Lanier MS, Looscan ES, Madison HS, Mitchell ES, Ninfa Laurenzo ECC, North Houston Early College HS, Osborne ES, Pin Oak MS, The Rice School, Tijerina ES, Tinsley ES, Walnut Bend ES, Wheatley HS, White ES, Worthing HS, and Young Women's College Preparatory Academy.

The next group of schools is in the initial phase. Equipment has been ordered and site surveys are underway. The schools in this group are Atherton ES, Bellaire HS, Blackshear ES, Burbank MS, Condit ES, Dogan ES, East Early College HS, Golfcrest ES, Gregory-Lincoln Education Center, Hines-Caldwell ES, Isaacs ES, Jones Futures Academy, Kelso ES, Love ES, Mandarin Immersion Magnet School, Mark White ES, McNamara ES, Memorial ES, Mistral ECC, North Forest ECC, Northline ES, Paige ES, Petersen ES, Revere MS, Roberts ES, Rodriguez ES, South Early College HS, B. T. Washington HS, Welch MS, West Briar MS, Westbury HS, Wharton Dual Language Academy, Whidby ES, and Williams MS. The VoIP project is on schedule to be completed by December 2017. MIDDLE SCHOOL RESTROOM RENOVATIONS: \$35 MILLION

Renovations of the restrooms in middle schools across HISD.

Project Status

- 1. Phase I JOC (Attucks, Deady, Fonville, Johnston, Key, McReynolds, Pershing, West Briar): Projects are 100% complete.
- 2. Phase II JOC (Johnston, Pershing, West Briar, Deady): Projects are 100% complete.
- 3. CSP Group 1 Bid package 2 & 3: (Johnston, Pershing, and West Briar) 100% construction completed. (Attucks-100%, Deady-80%, Fonville-100%, Key-80%, and McReynolds-100%) Substantial completion date scheduled for the end of the third guarter of 2016. (80% construction completed.)

- 4. CSP Group 2 Package 5: (Clifton, Henry, and Welch) 29% complete. Substantial completion date scheduled for fourth quarter of 2016; Package 6: (Fondren, Hartman and Thomas) 28% complete. Substantial completion date scheduled for first quarter of 2017.
- 5. CSP Group 2 Package 7 (Black, Lanier, Navarro [formerly Jackson], and High School Ahead Academy); Package 8 (Burbank, Edison, Hamilton, and Marshall); and Package 9 (Ortiz, Sugar Grove, Holland, Stevenson, and Williams): 100% drawings received, Construction Services plans to initiate construction on this phase in third quarter of 2016. Group 3 – Package 4: (Long, Fleming, and Pin Oak) 100% drawings received; Construction Services plans to initiate construction on this phase of the Middle School Restrooms in the third quarter of 2016.
- CSP Group 3 Package 4: (Long, Fleming and Pin Oak) Construction Services plans to initiate the bidding and construction of this phase of the Middle School Restrooms in third quarter of 2016.

SAFETY AND SECURITY IMPROVEMENTS: \$17.3 MILLION

Improvements include fencing, security cameras and access control.

Project Status

Ninety-four percent of the projects have been completed and there is \$962,208 remaining for safety and security improvements. Continued replacement of security camera devices and equipment with focus on Priority 1's is underway. Extensive focus has been given to fire alarms, audibility, emergency egress lightning and fire lanes to correct City of Houston Code Compliance issues. The following projects have been completed with 2012 Safety & Security funds:

- Controlled Access 266 campuses completed, 16 remaining
- Security Camera upgrades 100 systems upgraded
- Fire Alarm upgrades 4 complete system replacements, 60 system upgrades

LAND ACQUISITION: \$55.8 MILLION

Funds to supplement significant site/parking constraints.

Project Status

The Real Estate Department has finalized the purchase of all individual properties, including residential and unimproved properties, for expansion of current school sites and new school sites as an integral part of the bond program. Real Estate currently is marketing 11 surplus properties for sale and is fielding about 20 inquiries regarding these surplus HISD properties each week. One surplus property was sold on April 15. Additionally, Real Estate is maintaining and renewing current lease agreements as needed, negotiating and developing short term parking lot leases as required for the bond program, assisting project managers with land planning issues, and searching possible sites for future development. Real Estate is also currently working on development of a centralized database of key documents for all HISD properties.

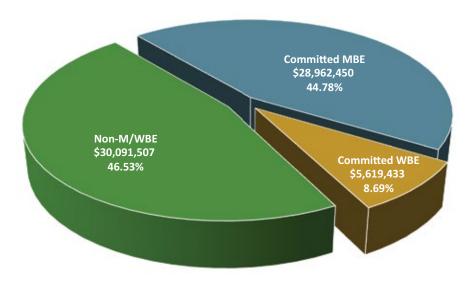

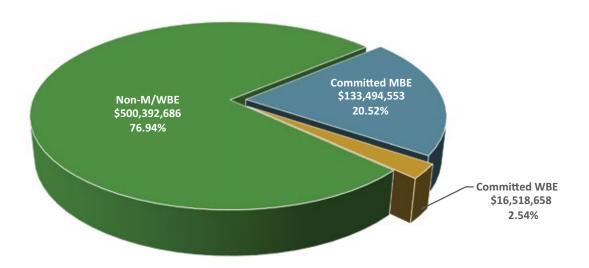
2012 BOND CONSTRUCTION M/WBE BREAKDOWN BY PROJECT TYPE

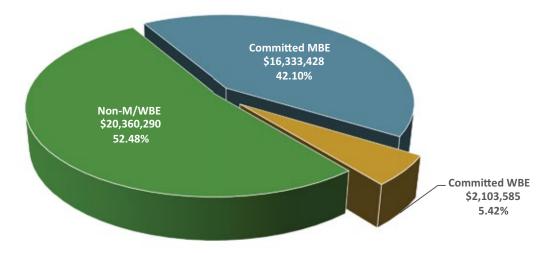


2012 BOND CONSTRUCTION M/WBE BREAKDOWN BY PROJECT TYPE

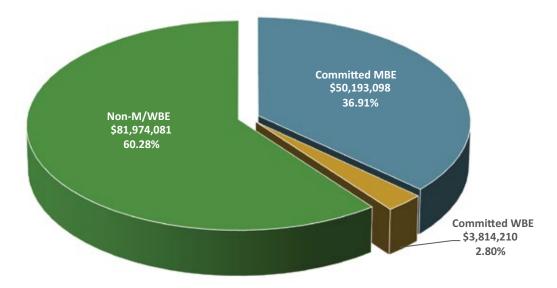

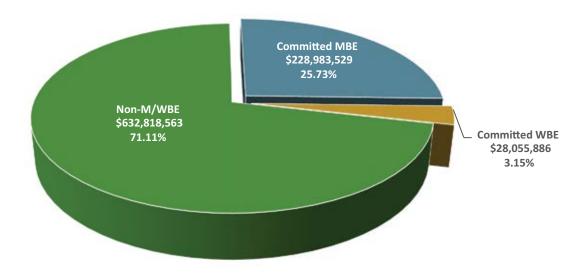

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Throughout the second quarter of 2016, the Bond Communications team worked with project managers, school principals, and Project Advisory Teams (PATs) to provide communications support and community relations strategies to effectively engage stakeholders. With many projects gearing up to start construction and six schools nearing completion, the communications team is focused on providing key support to transitioning principals. The team is developing campus-specific communications and community engagement plans for schools that are opening new facilities, as well as those that are transitioning into temporary facilities. Additionally, the team developed a Move-Out/Move-In Guide to help principals navigate the transition process, and a Groundbreaking and Dedication Guide to help principals plan celebrations around important project milestones.

The communications staff coordinated community meetings at eight schools in the second quarter. As part of the coordination efforts, the communications team handles scheduling, publicity, review of presentations, translation services, on-site check-in, and audio visual support, as well as social media and web coverage for each meeting.

Communications staff also attended PAT meetings and internal strategy meetings as needed to assess communications needs and provide coaching and advice to district leadership and project managers on strategies to engage more effectively with stakeholders.

The communications team provided planning and logistical support for three groundbreaking ceremonies held in the second guarter – Parker Elementary, Booker T. Washington High School, and Yates High School. The team also help facilitate two dedication ceremonies — Tanglewood Middle School and Kate Smith Elementary School.

At the recommendation of BOC member Jessica Diaz, the communications team is putting together a stakeholder survey to gauge community engagement around various bond projects. This online assessment will be distributed in the third quarter — after schools have updated their student and parent contact information for the 2016-2017 school year.

Additionally, the team continues to provide general information about the bond program through the production of web stories and project updates, videos and photos, social media posts, email blasts, and fliers. This information is distributed through district and bond websites and newsletters, email listservs, social media, community street teams, bond community meetings and other outreach events.

The team manages and regularly updates the extensive bond website — BuildHISD. org — to ensure it features the latest and most up-to-date information regarding future project meetings, previous meeting minutes, and construction timelines.

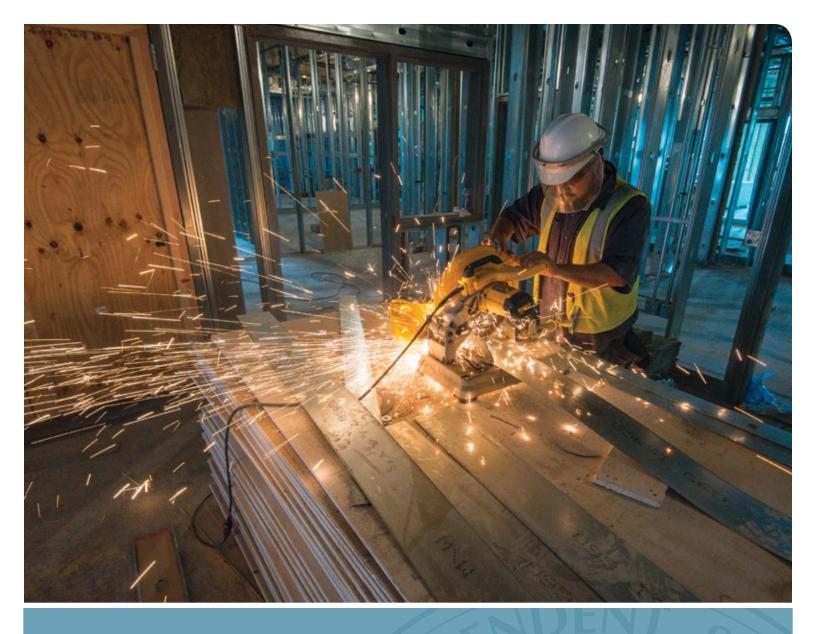

Glossary

GLOSSARY OF TERMS

BAS

Building Automation System (HVAC and lighting controls)

Change order

A modification to the original construction contract authorizing a change in the work or an adjustment in the amount of the contract or the contract time. The original contract price may not be increased by more than 25% by change order.

Competitive Bidding

A procurement method by which a governmental entity contracts with a contractor for the construction, alteration, rehabilitation, or repair of a facility by awarding the contract to the lowest responsible bidder.

Competitive Sealed Proposal (CSP)

A procurement method by which a governmental entity may request proposals and pricing information based on the scope of work provided, rank the offers, negotiate a contract, and then award the project to the contractor that offers the best value to the entity.

Construction commissioning

A collaborative process whose purpose is to ensure that buildings and systems perform according to contract.

Commissioning agent

An independent party, unaffiliated with the design team or contractors, that takes charge of the construction commissioning process.

Construction documents

Extremely detailed drawings and specifications showing and describing all of the details required to construct the building.

Construction Manager at Risk (CMAR)

A construction delivery method by which a governmental entity contracts with an architect or engineer for design and construction phase services and contracts separately with a construction manager-at-risk to serve as the general contractor and to provide consultation during the design and construction, rehabilitation, alteration, or repair of a facility. A CMAR is selected based upon qualifications and price proposal that would provide the best value for the governmental entity.

Daylighting

A planned energy conservation strategy that utilizes illumination from sunlight.

Design development

Process in which schematic design drawings are further developed to include more detail, including: detailed site plan; room layouts; door and window types; interior and exterior elevations; reflected ceiling plans; plumbing, mechanical, structural, and electrical drawings; and kitchen layouts.

Design team

A group of professionals from architectural and engineering firms that is engaged to design a facility.

Educational Specifications

A document that details the number of rooms required, the size of each room, how those rooms should relate to each other (adjacencies), and the elements (sinks, electrical outlets, markerboards, cabinets, etc.) that should be included in each room. Districtwide Educational Specifications will be adapted for the specific needs of the campus.

Encumbrance Accounting

The recognition of commitments that will subsequently become expenditures when goods and services are received.

FF&E

Furniture, fixtures, and equipment. This describes all contents that are not a permanent part of the structure.

Hard costs

Expenses associated with direct construction of a project.

HVAC

Heating, ventilation, and air-conditioning

Job Order Contract (JOC)

A procurement method used for maintenance, repair, alteration, renovation, remediation, or minor construction of a facility when the work is of a recurring nature, but the delivery times, type, and quantities of work required are indefinite.

Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED)

A building certification process developed by the U.S. Green Building Council (USGBC) to enhance environmental awareness among architects and building contractors and to encourage the design and construction of energy-efficient, water-conserving buildings that use sustainable or green resources and materials.

MEP

Mechanical/electrical and plumbing systems.

Program or Concept design

Single-line drawings that illustrate room adjacencies and scale

Public Facility Corporation

The PFC is a non-profit corporation, the creation of which was sponsored by the District pursuant to the Public Facility Corporation Act. The Public Facility Corporation act authorizes the creation and utilization of school district public facility corporations to issue bonds for capital renovation programs. The Houston Independent School District Public Facility Corporation (HISD-PFC) has utilized this structure to issue \$48M for four of the news schools in the 2007 Facilities Capital Program (FCP).

Schedule of values

An itemization of costs that comprises the entire contract amount.

Schematic Design

Typically includes a simple site plan, floor plans, simple building cross-sections, an outline specification with general information about building systems, a table comparing required square footages from the educational specifications with actual square footages shown on the drawings, a preliminary estimate of cost options, and three-dimensional depictions of the exterior of the building.

Schedule of values

An itemization of costs that comprises the entire contract amount.

Scope-to-Budge

An analytical review conducted by the architectural/engineering team to ensure the proposed scope of work and project requirements are aligned with the established construction budget. The approved findings from this review become the basis for the design and preparation of the construction documents.

Schematic Design

The schematic design submission typically includes a simple site plan, floor plans (simple scale drawings that show room sizes, relationships, doors, and windows), simple building cross sections, an outline specification with general information about building systems, a table comparing required square footages from the educational specifications with actual square footages shown on the drawings, a preliminary estimate of cost options, and possibly 3-dimensional depictions of the exterior of the building

Soft costs

A construction industry term, but more specifically a contractor accounting term for an expense item that is not considered direct construction cost. Soft costs include architectural, engineering, financing, legal fees, and other pre- and post-construction expenses.

Swing space

A school building or a portion of an existing school building or other facility that will house the student population and its teachers and staff during the school-construction process.

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Appendix

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Bond Oversight Committee Meeting Status Report

HISD's Bond Oversight Committee (BOC) met April 26, 2016 to review first quarter progress of the bond program. The meeting was held at Sterling High School, where committee members had the opportunity to tour the school's new construction.

The tour began with a walk through the school's airplane hangar, which serves as the centerpiece of the new building. Large viewing windows will enable the unique feature to be seen from many points throughout the facility.

Principal Justin Fuentes explained that Sterling's aviation program trains students to become airplane mechanics and pilots. The school's close proximity to Hobby Airport provides many opportunities for collaboration.

The committee toured the administrative area and learning stairs, an innovative feature that also serves as a flexible sitting area for small groups or impromptu lectures.

The tour included stops at the auditorium, the main gymnasium, and the dinning commons area, which will be open to a main hallway and feature flexible seating to support small group meetings and projectbased learning throughout the school day.

Following the tour, the committee moved to the Sterling High School library for an update on the bond program's first quarter progress. Bond team officials noted that the district had 22 active construction sites by the end of the first quarter, seven more than at the start of the first quarter. Additionally, seven construction contracts were executed, including two for districtwide projects.

The first quarter also saw the first completed bond project. The addition at Tanglewood Middle School, formerly Grady Middle School, welcomed students in February.

In addition to several project-specific questions, BOC members inquired about the timing of bond sales, the budget for maintenance of new facilities, and user training on new technology and equipment.

Finance reports and supplemental funding were also discussed. View complete quarterly bond workbook here.

Looking ahead to the next quarter, bond team officials also briefed the committee on several projects nearing completion: North Houston Early College, South Early College, and Worthing (Phase 1) high schools, Mark White and Condit elementary schools, Mandarin Immersion Magnet School and Delmar Fieldhouse.

The next quarterly meeting of the Bond Oversight Committee is scheduled for July 26, 2016.

The general purpose of the meeting was to brief the Bond Oversight Committee on the current status of the new construction and renovation projects funded through the 2012 Facilities Capital Program. Related issues, questions and activities were also discussed:

Item 1 Welcome

Construction Services Officer Derrick Sanders welcomed the participants at 8:45 a.m. to the tour at Sterling High School. The goal of the tour was to showcase 21st century learning spaces and to point out construction materials that are common throughout the bond program.

Aviation Hangar:



Facilities Design General Manager Dan Bankhead stated that Sterling HS is an aviation school. He reported the hangar door will open and allow the school to bring airplanes in and out of the building. Sterling High School Principal Justin Fuentes noted that there will be two airplanes — one for display and the other on which students will work. Mr. Bankhead also informed the participants that there will be motor labs, also known as aviation rooms, where teachers will instruct students. He also noted that there will be Career and Technical Education studios where students will get hands-on experiences.

Reception/Administration:

Mr. Bankhead noted that the administration area will be located near the secure entry to the school, where visitors must check-in before gaining access to the building. Such vestibules are being used throughout the 2012 bond program to enhance safety and security.

Learning Stairs:

Mr. Bankhead mentioned the wide learning stairway will have a dual function as both an impromptu lecture space, as well as a functional staircase providing access to the second floor. The stairs are designed to allow students to gather and work collaboratively.

Circulation/Breakout:

Mr. Bankhead noted the learning centers represent classrooms. Some large classrooms are equipped with an operable wall in the middle, allowing school officials to use the space as two standard classrooms or one large learning space. He noted that the glass hallway windows allow teachers to supervise students in the classroom, while also maintaining visibility of extended learning areas outside of the classroom. Mr. Bankhead noted that science labs are large and flexible with rolling tables to allow the space to be used for both lecture and lab. Electric, gas, and plumbing outlets will be located along the perimeter of the room for lab set up, but tables can be moved to the center or rear of the room for lectures.

East Atrium

Mr. Bankhead said this will be an open area for students and teachers to view all levels of the building.

Food Serving

Mr. Bankhead noted that the kitchen/dining area will have two serving lines, and will be set up like an airport food court area with grab and go dining options. Unlike more traditional cafeterias, the dining area will not have the long tables and there will be a patio where students can enjoy outdoor dining.

Auditorium

Mr. Bankhead stated that the auditorium is designed to seat 500 individuals.

Mr. Bankhead mentioned the main gym will have a hard surface, and enough room for two full courts. Adjacent to the main gym is an auxiliary gym. The main gym can fit up to 1,200 people and can be used for a full-school assembly, community events or town hall meetings.

Item 2 **April 26, 2016 Oversight Committee Meeting Minutes**



Mr. Sanders asked if there were any issues with the minutes. There being none noted, the committee approved the minutes as presented.

Item 3 Introduction

Interim Chief Operating Officer Lenny Schad told the committee that former Construction and Facilities Services Officer Sundaresh Kamath resigned at the end of February, and that Mr. Sanders was now in charge of the 2012 Bond Program. He noted that Mr. Sanders has extensive experience from his time in the Cy-Fair Independent School District and the construction industry. He also noted that the Bond Team's goal is to have all of the contracts, with the exception of Bellaire, signed by the end of the school year. He said Bellaire has proven to be a very challenging project, but the team is making progress. At this point in the bond program with so many projects underway, the bond team is working diligently to ensure all projects continue to move forward. He also mentioned he is pleased with project pricing because it hasn't continued to increase, and earlier numbers and projections are holding steady. He noted that HISD will continue to make changes in the construction department and organization to improve efficiency, ensure accountability, and to make sure the right people are doing the right job.

Item 4 **First Quarter Progress**

Mr. Sanders reported there are currently 22 active construction sites, up from 15 from the last quarter. Within this quarter, seven contracts have been executed, including two for district wide projects. He told the committee that Tanglewood Middle School (formerly Grady MS) is complete and students are now in the building. Mr. Sanders reiterated that the expectation is to have all contracts, with the exception of Bellaire, executed by the end of the calendar year.

Item 5 **Business Assistance (M/WBE) Report and Community Outreach**

Business Assistance General Manager Alexis Licata directed the committee to page 125 of the binder for detailed M/WBE information. Ms. Licata announced that HISD held three workshops during the first quarter as part of ongoing outreach activities, which also included events with local chambers of commerce and M/WBE organizations. Ms. Licata reported that almost 25 percent of the bond dollars awarded or committed were to minority-owned firms. while almost 4 percent were to women-owned firms. The current commitments exceed the overall 20 percent goal, and projections indicate the percentages will continue to increase. Mr. Gary White asked if that included all the money not just spent but committed at this point. Ms. Licata confirmed that was accurate.

Item 4 **Bond Financial Report**

Interim Chief Financial Officer Sherrie Robinson informed the committee that the financial report update is located on page 137. Ms. Robinson reported that as of March 31, 2016, \$818 million of the total program dollars had been committed, including \$473 million in encumbrances and \$344 million in actual expenditures. She noted that the latest bond sale was on April 12, 2016, for \$560 million, bringing the total bonds sold to almost \$1.5 billion. With more contracts to be executed, she said the next sale will be in the fourth quarter. She referred to more specific financial information on pages 143,145, 146 and 147 of the binder.

Mr. White asked about the cost-per-square-foot that the district was seeing on current construction projects. Mr. Sanders responded that the team recently received a project in the



\$230- to \$235-per-square-foot range. The team received a bid of \$206-per-square-foot on an elementary school about two months ago.

Mr. Craig Johnson asked whether the supplemental funding is being used. Mr. Sanders noted that in some cases the answer was yes and in other cases it was no. However, there have been no cases in which all the money was spent. Kashmere HS, for example, came in \$1 million under the adjusted budget, which includes the extra supplemental funding. In that case, the \$1 million will not need to be used.

Bond Communications General Manager Sylvia Wood stated that HISD is not actively promoting the supplemental funding until all contracts are executed because the district doesn't want to receive higher pricing from contractors who may think that HISD has extra money to spend.

Mr. Robert Eury clarified that on paper supplemental money is allocated to each project. But from a cash perspective, he said, HISD has to spend the entire original \$1.89 billion in bond funding before beginning to spend the supplementing funding. Accounting Senior Manager Tonya Savoie confirmed that his statement was accurate.

Of the \$212 million in supplemental funding, Ms. Robinson said \$12 million is from the 2007 bond reserves so it would be spent first. The remaining \$200 million available in the form of maintenance tax notes can only be spent on renovations. As a result, the bond team will have to evaluate the projects to determine which would be appropriate for that funding and adjust the timing of the sales.

Mr. Schad mentioned that his team meets monthly to review actual expenditures and projections for specific projects to ensure cash flow is managed properly. Again, Ms. Robinson noted that the supplemental funding will only be used if needed after using all of the original project budgets.

Mr. Sonny Flores asked if HISD would still deliver on the original commitments promised to these schools. Mr. Schad responded, "Absolutely." He noted that the "Blue Sheet" approved by voters is non-negotiable.

Item 5 **Bond Communications**

Ms. Wood reported that the big focus for the last quarter had been to visually show all the progress for the projects under construction. Specifically, the team has been providing frequent construction updates, which are posted to the district and school websites so that school stakeholders can read about their specific project. While the first quarter was busy with community meetings and a few groundbreakings, Ms. Wood said the team is gearing up for an even busier summer as campuses begin to move into their new buildings. She noted that her team is working with Construction Services to develop a checklist and guide to assist principals and staff with these moves. Ms. Wood reminded the committee that during the last quarterly meeting they discussed adjusting the Project Advisory Team meeting schedule so the groups met less often as projects moved into construction. She said school communities seemed to be responding well to that change, and there was no apparent difference in community engagement.



Ms. Jessica Diaz asked about the possibility of doing a bond survey to help measure that engagement. Ms. Wood said a survey would be a great idea and that she would investigate further.

Item 6 **Looking Ahead**

Mr. Sanders said that a number of schools are nearing completion, and the goal is to have them ready to welcome students by the start of the 2016 school year. Those schools are North Houston Early College HS, South Early College HS, Worthing HS (Phase 1), Mark White ES, Condit ES, Mandarin Immersion Magnet School, and Delmar Fieldhouse. Mr. Sanders also stated the goal is to have eight more contracts executed and five more projects in active construction by the end of the next quarter. He mentioned that the upcoming quarter will be the most important quarter for the entire program as the team will be completing some schools, beginning construction on many others and executing new construction contracts for even more schools — all at the same time. When the team later reflects back, it will be clear that the second quarter of 2016 was the most pivotal of the entire program. He added that he is looking forward to the next meeting in July to discuss all the progress.

Ms. Diaz suggested having a construction tour with the committee and trustees so they know what the bond program is doing and also can see the progress being made. Ms. Diaz noted that during the Sterling tour, she could clearly see the campus looks like a 21st century school.

Mr. White asked if the use of maintenance tax notes for the supplemental funding would impact the funds available for the district maintenance department. Ms. Robinson said the selling of the maintenance tax notes is not taking away from the current method of maintaining the facilities.

Mr. Schad added that one of the things his team is doing is implementing a preventative maintenance program similar to what refineries use. He noted that district hasn't previously had a preventative maintenance program. HISD is implementing a new ERP system, a financial system that tracks maintenance. HISD surveyed every facility in the district so the maintenance team would know what work needs to be done. He also mentioned that his team is having conversations with the finance team about having yearly maintenance evaluations to better project budget needs.

Mr. Sanders mentioned that the officer of Facility Services, who is responsible for building maintenance, has been an active participant in the designs of the new buildings. That is beneficial because he and his team will be familiar with the design and operations when the buildings are turned over to them. He also noted the facilities officer is working to identify and develop the budget needed to maintain the new schools.

Mr. Johnson asked what HISD was doing to ensure campus-based Plant Operators (POs) were trained, prepared and understood the new building and technology with which they would be working. Construction General Manager Andreas Peeples said the bond team sets up training through the construction manager or the contractor. Training on equipment is provided for POs and the maintenance staff.



Mr. Bankhead noted that supplemental material, including DVDs and manuals, also are provided, in addition to hands-on training. He noted this service is part of the contract with the contractor. Mr. Sanders also noted that maintenance training is part of the contract.

Mr. Johnson asked if HISD has enough staff to take care of these new schools. Mr. Schad said that the district is facing significant budget cuts, and every department is being asked to evaluate their budget and staff. He explained that when the district is facing a \$160 million shortfall and 80 percent of the budget is staff, then staff reductions have to be made. He said he is working with the maintenance team to determine which positions are needed to keep the department running. He noted that for the first time in a very long time maintenance and facilities have a voice at the table. He agreed that it is important to ensure new buildings have proper maintenance after spending millions of dollars to build them.

Ms. Robinson informed the committee that late last fall, the board authorized an assessment to identify and inventory equipment throughout the district in order to develop a plan for maintenance. All that information, along with the new building information, will be in the plant maintenance modules of the SAP system so the finance team can determine how much money is needed for maintenance, start assessing, and then budget the funds necessary to maintain the facilities.

Mr. Johnson asked how HISD is determining what items to purchase and use in the schools. He mentioned that some schools with televisions that were so big, the schools could not find a mount strong enough to hold them. As a result, the TVs sat in a store room. He asked what HISD is doing to ensure money is spent wisely and the schools have what they need to do the best job.

Mr. Schad responded the technology department has established standards for the district that determine what pieces of technology can and should be purchased. He noted that the technology department is helping to ensure that any items purchased fit and can be supported by district infrastructure and serve a useful purpose. He explained that this year was the first year that the technology department had implemented a life-cycle replacement strategy for the district, and noted that there are campuses that have decade-old computers. Now, every campus has a list of computers that need to be replaced, and the goal is to get to a five-year replacement cycle. He said that the strategy has been well-received. Principals love it because it's helping them be more efficient with their dollars, and they will have computers that actually work.

Mr. Bankhead added that because of these standards, the bond team knows what to put on the walls and ceilings to make sure technology works with the building. Mr. Schad noted he has a technology employee working with the bond team as they plan where outlets and network drops need to be located.

Mr. White asked about the status of traffic light report. Mr. Sanders reported that at Sharpstown High School the construction team found unanticipated site conditions related to the foundation and piers for the school, which delayed the schedule. Initially, the school was scheduled to be finished in the first quarter of 2017, but that target date has shifted to the second quarter.



He noted that Dowling MS was marked as yellow in the traffic light report because the team had been discussing pricing issues with the construction manager-at-risk. However, an agreement has since been reached, and they should have the contract to move forward this week. Mr. White asked if the delay would impact the schedule. Mr. Sanders responded, explaining that it didn't affect the completion date, but did shift the start time.

Mr. Sanders noted that Bellaire High School is still marked as red, but the team believes progress is being made. At a recent Project Advisory Team (PAT) meeting, the bond team provided the PAT with a number of options for moving forward, all of which were rejected. However, the PAT came back with two alternate options, which currently are being vetted by the bond team. The team will put together cost estimates for these options, and they are hopeful the PAT will be supportive of one of them.

Ms. Diaz asked what the options are. Mr. Bankhead explained that the first option is to do a simple renovation that includes life safety and maintenance renovations. The second option involves a major renovation. He said the PAT has a strong preference for keeping students on campus during construction. Mr. Schad noted the bond team is going to listen to the PAT's opinions, comments and concerns, but that the final decision will be made by administration.

Ms. Diaz asked if the Bellaire PAT's proposed options match the scope listed on the Blue Sheet. Mr. Sanders responded that the renovation proposal is actually substantially less that what is detailed on the Blue Sheet. He explained that in order to move in this direction, the bond team will have to get board approval. He noted that such a measure brings up new questions, including what happens to the rest of the money associated with that project if not all of it is spent.

Mr. Johnson asked about the status of High School for Law and Justice. Mr. Peeples said CenterPoint is currently in the process of relocating an underground gas line that had been previously unidentified. They also started relocating the main gas line. He stated that the guaranteed maximum price proposal is currently under review, and the contract is being finalized.

There being no further questions or discussion, the committee determined there was no need to meet in executive session, and the meeting was adjourned.

The project was then issued for competitive sealed proposal (CSP) bidding and on June 11, 2015, the HISD Board of Education approved the award of a construction contract to Prime Contractors, Inc. Modifications and repackaging of the construction documents was required for the CSP procurement method. Additionally, due to the delay in the start of construction and modifications to the documents resulting from the change in procurement method, the construction documents had to be re-submitted by the A/E team for regulatory review and approval.

These activities required additional professional services from the A/E team. It is requested that the HISD Board of Education approves amending and increasing the design contract in the amount of \$254,162 to accomplish these additional services. SUBJECT: APPROVAL TO AMEND AND INCREASE THE DESIGN CONTRACT FOR THE DEBAKEY HIGH SCHOOL FOR HEALTH PROFESSIONS

The Houston Independent School District (HISD) 2012 Bond election approved the design and construction of DeBakey High School for Health Professions (DeBakey HS). On May 9, 2013, the HISD Board of Education approved the award of a design contract for DeBakev HS to WHR Architects.

On February 20, 2015, the Texas Medical Center (TMC) and HISD executed a land donation agreement to build DeBakey HS on the site of the existing Hornberger Conference Center in the heart of the TMC. On October 10, 2013, the HISD Board of Education approved the award of a construction manager-at-risk contract for this project to Tellepsen Builders, L.P.

Since the start of construction, several unforeseen and unanticipated preexisting conditions have been discovered that have impacted the project. These unforeseen conditions include conflicts between new underground stormwater and sanitary sewer lines and unmapped existing utilities, as well as modifications to the drives and ramp between an adjacent TMC parking lot (which was recently renovated) and the newly acquired DeBakey HS site. These issues could not have been reasonably anticipated prior to the start of construction. Additional services from the architectural/engineering (A/E) team are needed to address these conditions with a new design for a retaining wall at the south property line of the HISD site and a realignment of the storm and sanitary lines to avoid the subsurface obstructions.

On February 7, 2013, the Texas Education Agency (TEA) recommended the closing of North Forest Independent School District (NFISD) and annexing it into the Houston Independent School District (HISD).

On April 1, 2013, the TEA upheld its decision to close NFISD and annex it to HISD effective July 1, 2013. As part of that transition, a review and assessment of the former NFISD facilities was performed and it was determined that there was a critical need for a replacement high school. On August 8, 2013, the HISD Board of Education approved the award of a design contract for a new high school to Page Southerland Page, L.L.P.

Due to state funding provisions for this project, a phased and accelerated project delivery schedule had to be utilized. This project delivery approach required the architectural/engineering (A/E) team to provide additional services associated with staffing, documentation, team mobilization, and regulatory permitting. To facilitate the accelerated delivery of this project, adaptation of a similar prototypical design was initially proposed. However, after considerable study, investigation, and design work, it was determined the proposed prototype would have to be significantly modified to best address the academic and other needs of this campus and community; therefore, the A/E team was asked to provide additional services to incorporate these requested changes to the design.

On October 10, 2013, the HISD Board of Education approved the award of a construction manager-at-risk contract for this project to B3Ci, A Joint Venture. Since award of that contract, several unforeseen and unanticipated existing conditions have been discovered that have impacted the project. These unforeseen conditions include the discovery of an underground gas line traversing the project site as well as underground pockets of unsuitable soil. To address these conditions and prevent delay to the project schedule, the A/E team was asked to provide additional site design, foundation engineering, and A/E documentation services to address these conditions. Additionally, during the permitting process, regulatory departments modified previouslyprovided instructions and approvals regarding site drainage and other site improvement issues. Incorporating these requested modifications required revisions to previously completed documentation, additional special documentation, supplemental calculations, and an extended permitting process for the A/E team.

It is requested that the HISD Board of Education approves amending and increasing the design contract for an amount not to exceed \$500,000 to complete this additional work.

Due to the size of these projects, the district determined it would be more efficient to divide the middle-school restroom renovation projects into different packages. Texas Government Code Chapter 2269 allows school districts to utilize construction manager-at-risk (CMAR) as a delivery method for construction projects. The CMAR delivery method allows a general contractor to be selected and engaged to advise on constructability, cost savings, phasing, and scheduling during the design of a project. The preconstruction services provided by the CMAR enable the project team to make timely changes as necessary in the design based on cost information from subcontractors and product manufacturers, ensuring project efficiency and effectiveness. As the design is completed, the CMAR obtains competitive bids from subcontractors for each aspect of the work and submits a quaranteed maximum price (GMP) as the proposed construction cost. During construction, the CMAR oversees the work.

Texas Government Code Section 2269.253 provides the Houston Independent School District (HISD) the option to utilize a two-step selection process in choosing a CMAR firm. Step one involves an initial request for qualifications. In step two, HISD may request firms, selected solely on the basis of qualifications, to provide proposed fees and pricing.

On April 11, 2013, the HISD Board of Education authorized the Superintendent of Schools or a designee to determine the construction delivery method for construction projects using factors approved by the HISD Board of Education, such as schedule, scope, and complexity. Following this process, the CMAR delivery method had been determined to provide the best value for the project.

On December 12, 2013, the HISD Board of Education authorized the Superintendent of Schools or a designee to negotiate, execute, and amend a contract with H.J. Russell & Company, CMAR for Northside High School (HS). In February 2016, the district elected to terminate for convenience the remaining portion of H.J. Russell & Company's pre-construction services under Section 14.4 of the General Conditions of the Agreement and Paragraph 13.01.

New qualifications for CMAR services for Northside HS were requested on April 30. 2016, and were received May 19, 2016. Information received from construction firms was evaluated and ranked using selection criteria approved by the HISD Board of Education on April 11, 2013, for this delivery method.

Based on qualifications, the construction firms were then asked to submit fee proposals. The fee proposals were comprised of costs for preconstruction services, construction phase services fees, and general conditions costs as a percentage of the GMP.

The attachment includes the recommended best value CMAR firm for this project and its Minority- and Women-Owned Business Enterprises (M/WBE) commitment for its services. The overall M/WBE participation for construction will be tabulated once the project is competitively bid by the CMAR.

Approval of this item will authorize the Superintendent of Schools or a designee to negotiate, execute, and amend contracts, including the acceptance of the GMP (or multiple GMPs in the case of phased work), in amounts not to exceed the overall project budget for this project.

However, due to the low ceiling clearances throughout the existing Waltrip campus, and to accommodate additional water pressure needed to provide water to fire-sprinkler lines on a new third-floor addition, a different sprinkler design had to be adopted by the Construction Manager-at-Risk (CMAR) and their subcontractor. This modified design also benefits the campus by minimizing creation of unsightly additional low-ceiling areas in the corridors. The CMAR contractor's fire-sprinkler sub-contractor modified the original design plan to allow for this improved design concept, but also required additional water pumps, electrical service, and water storage tanks to make the improved sprinkler system design work.

The A/E team was asked to revise previously approved design drawings and coordinate with the contractors to accommodate these changes. The architect was asked to perform this work on an accelerated basis to minimize impact on the project construction schedule while also providing the best final design for the Waltrip HS community.

These revisions require additional professional services from the A/E team. Authorization is requested to amend and increase the design contract in the amount of \$28,750 to acquire these additional services. Approval of this item will authorize the Superintendent of Schools or a designee to negotiate, execute, and amend all necessary contracts to implement the work.

SUBJECT: APPROVAL TO AMEND AND INCREASE THE DESIGN CONTRACT FOR THE HIGH SCHOOL FOR THE PERFORMING AND VISUAL ARTS

The Houston Independent School District (HISD) 2012 bond election approved the construction of the new High School for the Performing and Visual Arts (HSPVA). On November 5, 2013, the HISD Board of Education approved the award of a design contract for this project to M. Arthur Gensler, Jr., and Associates (Gensler).

The architectural-engineering (A/E) team has been asked to prepare detailed documentation for a reduction in scope of work after the final documents were completed. The reductions were required in order to deliver the project within budget. These reductions will remain in the contract as potential future additions if the budget allows. Incorporation of this information will require modifications to previously completed and approved documents, and therefore entail the performance of additional design services by the A/E team. Furthermore, this work will be accomplished on an accelerated basis in order to minimize the impact to the project schedule.

Authorization is requested to amend and increase the design contract allowance in the amount of \$60,093 to complete this additional work. Approval of this item will authorize the Superintendent of Schools or a designee to negotiate, execute, and amend all necessary contracts to implement the work.

SUBJECT: APPROVAL TO AMEND AND INCREASE THE **PROGRAM** MANAGEMENT AGREEMENTS FOR THE 2012 BOND PROGRAM

On May 9, 2013, the Houston Independent School District (HISD) Board of Education authorized the Superintendent of Schools or a designee to negotiate, execute, and amend agreements with five firms (URS Corporation; Heery International, Inc.; Rice & Gardner Consultants, Inc.; Kwame Building Group, Inc.; and Jacobs Project Management Co.) to act as Program Managers (PgMgr) for the 2012 Bond Program. On January 31, 2015, HISD terminated the contract with Jacobs Project Management Co.

Since that time, there have been changes in the scope of work and services on a number of the projects assigned to each of the PgMgr firms. Those changes include but are not limited to addressing unanticipated site and construction conditions, special regulatory requirements and procedures, modifications related to changes in project and academic requirements, community needs, adjustments in project delivery methods, and other similar scope and services modifications. These changes in scope of work and services have required the performance of additional services by each of the PgMgr firms.

Therefore, it is recommended that the Superintendent of Schools or a designee be authorized to amend and increase the agreements with each of these firms. The net changes in fees for the program will not exceed \$5.4 million dollars.

SUBJECT: APPROVAL TO AMEND AND INCREASE THE DESIGN CONTRACT FOR THE HIGH SCHOOL FOR LAW ENFORCEMENT AND CRIMINAL JUSTICE

The Houston Independent School District (HISD) 2012 bond election approved the design and construction of the High School for Law Enforcement and Criminal Justice (HSLECJ). On February 26, 2014, the HISD Board of Education approved the award of a design contract for HSLECJ.

On December 12, 2013, the HISD Board of Education approved the purchase of properties in southeast Houston for the new HSLECJ campus. For close coordination with the new high-school project, the architectural/engineering (A/E) team was asked to prepare this acquired property for the new high school. Due to the unusually lengthy real estate purchasing process, the A/E team was asked to perform the above task on an accelerated schedule to maintain the project schedule. The scope of work performed included, but was not limited to, A/E services associated with the abatement, demolition, and street abandonments as well as aggregating dozens of independently-owned and platted parcels of land.

Additionally, during the regulatory review and permitting process for the new highschool project, the City of Houston requested significant additional information regarding the acquired property and the adjacent right-of-ways/public streets, including detailed information about existing public underground utilities. To expedite the permitting process and maintain the project schedule, the A/E team was asked to provide additional services associated with these additional regulatory requests.

Further, certain site conditions were discovered after the design was complete. This required additional design, administrative, and management effort by the design team.

Authorization is requested to amend and increase the design contract in the amount of \$418,410 for compensation for these additional services. Approval of this item will authorize the Superintendent of Schools or a designee to negotiate, execute, and amend all necessary contracts to implement the work.

SUBJECT: APPROVAL TO AMEND AND INCREASE THE DESIGN CONTRACT

FOR THE RENOVATIONS AND ADDITIONS TO WESTBURY HIGH

SCHOOL

The Houston Independent School District (HISD) 2012 bond election approved the renovations and additions to Westbury High School (HS).

On October 9, 2014 the HISD Board of Education approved the award of a professional architectural and engineering (A/E) services contract for Westbury HS to Joiner Partnership (Joiner Architects).

Earlier this year, the HISD Board of Education awarded an additional \$8,000,000 for the Westbury HS bond project to fund Title IX and structural repairs needed at the campus. For this, HISD requested Joiner Architects to design and develop documents to construct baseball and softball fields at a nearby 6.9-acre tract of land to the east of the main Westbury HS campus as well as new tennis courts for the main campus site. In addition to these changes, Joiner was requested to conduct a thorough evaluation of the remaining original campus structures which had structural issues identified several years ago and were temporarily addressed. Joiner was asked to evaluate the current conditions of these original structures, make recommendations, and create construction documents for the removal of structures deemed not economically feasible for repair and/or the repair of structures deemed of value to the district and campus.

In addition to the above, as part of the district's effort to plat the entire Westbury campus as one single site and preparing for construction permitting of the planned new addition, the City of Houston (City) required that a comprehensive storm drainage plan be developed. Joiner was asked to hire a survey firm to perform this analysis for the entire site and planned detention pond system required by the City for permitting.

The above additional scope-of-work items require additional professional services from the A/E team. Authorization is requested to amend and increase the design contract in the amount of \$320,000 to acquire these additional services. Approval of this item will authorize the Superintendent of Schools or a designee to negotiate, execute, and amend all necessary contracts to implement the work.
