Dear Bond Oversight Committee member:

This summer has been busier than ever for architects and construction companies working for the district. More than 60 building projects were in full swing after the school year ended on June 6, marking another milestone in the 2007 bond program, which has included more than 180 expansion, renovation and maintenance projects across the district.

When students return from summer vacation, they can expect to find renovated restrooms at Wainwright Elementary School and work continuing on additions at Southmayd Elementary School. Still, much of the work won't be immediately visible, such as the improved HVAC systems at T.H. Rogers K-8 and Revere Middle School, and new fire, PA, and security systems at Deady Middle School.

Even as many renovation projects get underway this summer, the district expects to finish two of the three new schools currently under construction within the 2007 bond program. Both Dogan and Atherton Elementary Schools are scheduled to open for students in August. Sherman Elementary will transition into its new facility during the fall semester.

In the meantime, planning and design has been moving forward within the 2012 bond program. Design firms have been selected for all schools within the first two phases of construction. Project Advisory Teams are meeting regularly, and district staff members are finalizing contract recommendations to help oversee the construction work.

Our goal is to ensure the best quality and value for HISD taxpayers while providing the optimal learning environments for our students and staff. Your leadership is vitally important to ensuring our success.

Bond Program Oversight Committee Charter

Bond Program Oversight Committee Charter

Background

The Declaration of Beliefs and Visions for the Houston Independent School District ("HISD", the "District") states the primary goal of HISD is to increase student achievement. The District's Bond Programs impact the following additional goals that exist to support the primary goal:

- Goal 3: Provide a Safe Environment—The District shall create a safe environment conducive to learning for all students and provide safety and security measures at District schools and facilities, and while attending District-related events.
- **Goal 4: Increase Management Effectiveness and Efficiency**—The District shall have a decentralized organizational structure that will promote autonomy and innovation in schools. With a districtwide commitment to performance over compliance and a shared accountability system in place, the District shall employ best practices of administrative principles to make optimal use of District resources and taxpayer dollars.
- **Goal 5: Improve Public Support and Confidence in Schools**—The schools belong to the people; hence, the board, administration, and support staff are public servants who exist to support the schools and the relationship between teachers, students, and parents. Public confidence will increase as the District increases transparency, accountability at all levels, and meaningful engagement of the community.
- **Goal 6: Create a Positive District Culture**—The District's clearly articulated purpose will serve as the catalyst for creating a powerful sense of community and a shared direction among personnel, parents, students, and the public. Because the District realizes the value of investing in human capital, the District will work to attract and retain the best teachers and staff members, and create working conditions in which their talents can flourish.

The Bond Program Oversight Committee ("Committee") plays a critical, strategic role in assisting the District while completing these goals.

Purpose of Charter

The Board of Education ("Board") for the District desires to make continual improvements to existing programs. As a result, the Bond Program Oversight Committee Charter ("Charter") is adopted to explain the mission, purpose, structure, membership, duties, responsibilities, and expectations. This Charter supersedes the previously adopted charter dated August 30, 2010.

Committee Mission

The HISD Board, in response to community interest in the effective and efficient use of bond proceeds, has established a mechanism to encourage greater accountability, transparency, public support, and confidence by creating the Committee. The Committee is an independent citizens' Committee that is responsible to the Superintendent, Board, and general public (in that order).

The Committee's charge is to monitor all applicable Bond funded construction projects and help interested Houstonians to stay informed about new construction and renovation





projects in the District. Its purpose is to monitor performance and compliance in order to confirm that HISD implements Bond Program work in conformance with the program approved by the Board and make recommendations to maximize available resources to achieve construction goals in the most effective and cost efficient manner. Its focus should be oversight rather than limited to hindsight.

Committee Structure and Membership:

- a) The Committee has up to nine voting members, including a Chairperson and Vice Chairperson, who are appointed by the Superintendent. Formal action from the Committee requires a majority vote of the quorum present. Individual members of the Committee shall not exercise authority for the Committee as a whole and shall not act independently of the Committee. Written applications will be reviewed by members of the District's Executive Leadership team for each applicant's experiences and qualifications. The Executive Leadership team will submit recommendations to the Superintendent for approval and appointment to the Committee.
- b) Appointments will be staggered for one year and two year terms. Terms may be extended for additional one or two year terms upon approval by the Superintendent.
- c) The Committee will approve meeting minutes, review and approve the reasonableness of reports from the District, and approve the issuance of status reports and other communications from the Committee.
- d) All meetings will be open to the general public.
- e) Membership on the Committee shall consist of interested persons from the following groups who can remain objective and independent with the District's best interest at heart:
 - 1. Special preference for members with expertise or knowledge in the areas of building design/engineering, construction, construction project management, and/or finance.
 - 2. Members active in a business organization representing the business community located in the District.
 - 3. Members who are parents or guardians of a child enrolled in the District and also active in a parent-teacher organization.
 - 4. Members of the community at-large.
- f) The Committee members receive no direct or indirect compensation from the District for their services as members of the Committee.
- g) The Committee members may not have an active contract or be seeking a contract with the District or with any contractor or sub-contractors associated with the Bond Programs.
- h) The Committee may not include any employee or official of the District, or any vendor, contractor or consultant of the District.
- i) A Committee member serves the general interest of the public as opposed to any personal interest or special interest group.
- j) If a Committee member moves outside of the District's geographic boundaries, resigns, violates the Ethics Policy contained herein, fails to attend two consecutive Committee meetings without reasonable excuse, or otherwise becomes unable to serve on the Committee, the Superintendent may declare the position on the Committee to be vacant and appoint another qualified person to the Committee.





Committee Duties and Responsibilities:

The Committee shall inform the Superintendent, Board, and general public (in that order) concerning the District's overall project management of all Bond Programs, including but not limited to:

- a) Review periodic reports produced by the District to verify effective and efficient use of bond proceeds and compliance with the purposes set forth in the Bond Programs as approved by the Board. See reports issued by the District in the "District Duties and Responsibilities" section below.
- b) Ensure that bond revenues are expended for the purpose set forth in the Bond Programs as approved by the Board of Education, and that any deferred proposals or plans where considered necessary are appropriate.
- c) Validate that no bond funds are used for any teacher or administrative salaries or other school operating expense, other than administrative salaries whose primary purpose is to manage the District's Bond Programs.
- d) Review efforts by the District to maximize bond revenues by balancing best value, quality, and efficiency in meeting the District's goals and priorities.
- e) Evaluate risks and related controls associated with the District's Bond Programs, determine focus areas and strategic approach to review, and communicate any findings and recommendations for improvement via a periodic independent report to the Superintendent, Board, and general public. To maximize these efforts, the Committee may recommend the performance of specific audit projects based on its risk assessments and communications to the Board Audit Committee and HISD Office of Inspector General.
- f) Coordinate with the Superintendent's designee to visit District facilities and grounds for which bond proceeds have been or will be expended, in accordance with any necessary access procedures.
- g) Review copies of other bond reports published by the District.
- h) Review any performance audits of the District's Bond Programs to ensure the District is taking appropriate action to remediate any deficiencies identified in such reports.
- i) Review operational audits conducted by the HISD Office of Inspector General to ensure the adequacy of scope, management action plans, and remediation efforts of the District.
- j) Review any financial audits of the District's Bond Programs to ensure the District is taking appropriate action to remediate any deficiencies identified in such reports.
- k) Provide periodic status reports and an annual report regarding the results of its activities, in addition to any Committee findings, recommendations, and management action plans, to the Superintendent and Board. These reports should include the Committee's opinion regarding the District's remediation efforts for any recommendations included in the performance audits, operational audits, or financial audits mentioned above and will be made available to the general public by inclusion on the District's website and other communication avenues.
- I) Perform other reasonable duties requested by the Superintendent.
- m) Disclose and sign an annual conflict of interest statement for existing conflicts and re-submit if any conflicts arise during a Committee member's tenure.
- n) Any perceived allegation of wrongdoing; potential waste, fraud, misuse or abuse; or non-compliance with Local, State, Federal laws/regulations, or District policies that becomes known to the Committee shall be communicated to the Superintendent, who shall refer such matters to the Board, Ethics and Compliance Officer, Office of Inspector General, and outside legal counsel where appropriate.



Bond Program Oversight Committee Charter

The Committee provides counsel and input to the administration and the Board, but it does not have management or policy-setting responsibilities. Also, the Committee does not have a fiduciary responsibility to the District or Board, nor are its members personally liable to the District or Board. The Committee is not responsible for:

- a) Approval of construction contracts or change orders;
- b) Appropriation of construction funds;
- c) Handling of legal matters;
- d) Approval of construction plans and schedules;
- e) Approval of the District's maintenance plan;
- f) Approval of the sale of bonds;
- g) Establishment of priorities and order of construction for the bond projects;
- h) Selection of architects, engineers, construction managers, project managers, and such other professional service firms;
- i) Approval of the design for each project including exterior materials, paint color, interior finishes, site plan and construction means or methods;
- j) Selection of independent audit firm(s), performance audit consultants and such other consultants as are necessary to support the performance of the Bond Programs;
- k) Setting or approving schedules of design and construction activities;
- Investigations of alleged wrongdoing; potential waste, fraud, misuse or abuse; or non-compliance with Local, State, Federal laws/regulations, or District policies.
- m) Directing the activities of staff or consultants; or
- n) Activities, roles or responsibilities that have been delegated to staff or consultants by the Superintendent or his designee.

Committee Meetings:

- a) The Committee shall meet at least quarterly to review the District's Bond Program's status and related information, and to perform other duties as provided herein. The Superintendent, Chairperson, or Vice Chairperson may convene additional meetings, if necessary.
- b) All Committee meetings shall be held within the District's geographic boundaries.
- c) Minutes will be prepared by a representative of the District and will be distributed to the Committee within 15 business days. The minutes will be voted upon for the record at the next scheduled Committee meeting.

District Duties and Responsibilities:

- a) The Chief Operating Officer shall act as the Superintendent's designee to the Committee.
- b) The Superintendent or his designee shall oversee management's action plan to respond to any written report from the Committee with findings or suggestions for improvement within 15 business days. All recommendations and management action plans from inception to date will be tracked and made available to the Committee and Board. The District's website and other communication avenues will also publicize the Committee's report and management's action plan for use by the general public.
- c) The District shall have a commitment to the Committee, provide open communication, and provide necessary technical and administrative assistance in a timely fashion as follows:
 - 1. Provision of a meeting room, including any necessary audio/visual equipment;

- 2. Preparation and copies of any documentary meeting materials, such as agendas and reports; and distribution of those materials to the Committee in a timely manner;
- 3. Provision of a quarterly summary progress report covering the Bond Programs;
- 4. Access to other information to effectively perform its oversight function.
- 5. Retention of all Committee meeting records, and providing public access to such records on the District's website; and
- 6. Notify the public of Committee meeting times and locations. The meetings are open to the public.
- d) Summary progress reports will communicate and provide an explanation for the following attributes in a clear concise manner. As part of reporting, HISD will identify projects that experience a significant impact to schedule, budget, or scope of work. Detail reports can be provided upon the Committee's request.
 - 1. Project schedules with anticipated completion dates and current status.
 - 2. Project scope
 - 3. Contingency report (change allowance, encumbrances, and available budget)
 - 4. Expenditure reports
 - 5. Status of Minority/or Woman Owned Business Enterprise (MWBE)
- e) The appropriate District staff, District consultants, and/or designees shall attend all Committee proceedings in order to provide a status update for their area of responsibility as it relates to the Bond Programs and answer any questions from Committee members.
- f) The Office of Inspector General will consider the input and specific audit requests of the Committee and HISD management during its development of the Annual Audit Plan. Audit projects conducted by the Office of Inspector General will be completed by the issuance of a formal audit report, which will be provided to the Board Audit Committee and made available to the Committee. Such reports will be publicized on the District's website for use by the general public.
- g) The District acknowledges that the Committee may request certain information that is sensitive or legally privileged. The District will use the counsel of its legal advisor to comply with such requests within the limits of Texas law and the best interest of the District.



Ethics Policy:

This Ethics Policy provides general guidelines for Committee members to follow in carrying out their roles. Not all ethical issues that Committee members face are covered in this Policy. However, this Policy captures some of the critical areas that help define ethical and professional conduct for Committee members. The provisions of this Policy were developed from existing laws, rules, policies and procedures as well as from concepts that define generally accepted good business practices. Committee members are expected to strictly adhere to the provisions of this Ethics Policy.

Policy:

CONFLICT OF INTEREST. A Committee member shall not make or influence a District decision related to: (1) any contract funded by bond proceeds or (2) any construction project that will benefit the Committee member's outside employment, business, or provide a financial benefit to the Committee member or a family member, such as a spouse, child, parent, or sibling.

OUTSIDE EMPLOYMENT. A Committee member shall not use his or her authority over a particular matter to negotiate future employment with any person or organization that relates to: (1) any contract funded by bond proceeds; or (2) any construction project. A Committee member shall not make or influence a District decision related to any construction project involving the interest of a person with whom the member has an agreement concerning current or future employment, or remuneration of any kind. For a period of one (1) year after leaving the Committee, a former Committee member may not represent any person or organization for compensation in connection with any matter pending before the District that, as a Committee member, he or she participated in personally and substantially.

COMMITMENT TO UPHOLD LAW. A Committee member shall uphold the federal and Texas Constitutions, the laws and regulations of the United States and the State of Texas, and the policies, procedures, rules and regulations of the Houston Independent School District.

COMMITMENT TO DISTRICT. A Committee member shall place the interests of the District above any personal or business interest of the member.

MEMBER CERTIFICATION. A Committee member shall certify his or her understanding of Committee's Ethics Policy and disclose and sign an annual conflict of interest statement for existing conflicts and re-submit if any conflicts arise during their tenure.







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Executive Summary

Since the Bond Oversight Committee's April 30 meeting, the Houston Independent School District has been moving forward with the 2012 bond program to renovate or replace 40 schools across the district, as well as finishing up the work within the 2007 bond program.

Here are some highlights from both programs over the past three months:

2007 Bond Program

• Dogan and Atherton elementaries are scheduled to open for students in August. Sherman Elementary will transition into its new facility during the fall semester.



• More than 60 construction projects have been underway at different campuses this summer; all 2007 bond work is slated for completion by the end of 2014.

2007 Bond Program Key Facts

- \$805 million in bond funding
- New fencing installed at 131 schools
- More than 8,800 security cameras installed
- 20 new schools open and serving students
- 3 new schools scheduled to open (Atherton, Dogan and Sherman)
- 2 schools renovated and expanded (Crockett and Valley West Elementary School)
- Renovations/repair projects completed throughout the district and others ongoing
- About 60 people turned out at Neff Elementary in southwest Houston on May 24 to dedicate the new 750-student campus built under the 2007 program. The design process was a community effort.

The school is seeking the United States Green Building Council's LEED silver certification for building practices that are environmentally sustainable and efficient.







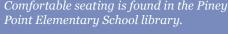
• DeChaumes Elementary School was featured in a HISD web story about crime prevention through environmental design. The school was rebuilt and opened in 2011 and highlights some of the latest security features, including access control.



At DeChaumes Elementary School, the main entrance has several safety features.

• Piney Point Elementary, rebuilt under the 2007 bond program, as well as Dogan Elementary, which is currently being rebuilt, were featured in an HISD web story about transforming schools into 21st century learning environments with flexible, modern furniture that is more comfortable and ergonomic.





2012 Bond Program

- The district has selected architects for all 24 schools in Groups 1 and 2 as of May 9. Design contracts for the renovation of the middle school restrooms and upgrades to the district's athletic facilities have also been approved.
- The Board of Education authorized the district to negotiate contracts with five firms to provide program management services for the 2012 bond program. The firms were selected from a pool of 19 that submitted statements of qualifications by the March 19 deadline.
- Architects from the global design and planning firm Gensler spoke to a crowd of about 40 people at the High School for the Performing and Visual Arts on May 30 to discuss the new campus, which will be built downtown, blocks away from Minute Maid Park. The school will provide students with more rehearsal and performance spaces and access to the city's performing arts community.



Lester Yuen, design director at Gensler, said the new school will be "an incubator for the arts."

• The Grady Middle School Project Advisory Team visited a new school in Cy-Fair ISD on June 4 to get ideas for their campus, which will receive a new addition under the bond program. The afternoon field trip featured Salyards Middle School, which boasts an open-design concept. Other PATs have taken or are planning similar field trips to help guide the design processes at their campuses. In all, there are 17 PATs among the 2012 bond campuses that are up and running.

• Companies hoping to do business with the Houston Independent School District under its 2012 bond program got an overview of upcoming bid opportunities at the Women Contractors Association's monthly luncheon on June 6.

Implementing the bond program will require businesses with expertise in everything from surveying to plumbing.

• Nearly 100 vendors and suppliers turned out June 19 to hear about HISD's latest efforts to build on the success of its program for minority and women-owned business enterprises. HISD is implementing changes that will hold firms more accountable in meeting district goals.



• HISD received 20 responses to its Request for Qualifications due May 14 from companies interested in supplying Construction Manager at Risk services on four schools being renovated under the 2012 bond program.

The projects include Waltrip High School, Worthing High School, and North Early College and South Early College high schools. Contract recommendations were being submitted to the Board of Education for review at its July 18 meeting.



- The district received five responses to its RFP from companies interested in doing safety, security, quality control and labor compliance work during the 2012 bond program.
- The district is looking for companies to handle everything from job site safety inspections to hazard controls and background checks for construction workers. The Board of Education authorized the district to negotiate contracts with five firms to provide program management services. Those firms are: Heery International, Inc., Jacobs Project Management Co., Kwame Building Group, Inc., Rice Gardner Consultants, Inc. and URS Corp.
- Construction Manager at Risk (CMAR) recommendations are being submitted to the Board of Education for consideration on July 18 for four high schools.
- HISD is partnering with the City of Houston, METRO and Port of Houston Authority on the Interagency Mentor-Protégé Program, which began in June. The goal is to create long-term relationships between mentors and protégés, through professional guidance and business support and development.



• In keeping with the mandate to advocate fair and equitable opportunities for the participation of M/WBEs in construction and professional services, HISD intends to contract staffing services, on an as-needed basis, in order to assist the HISD Business Assistance Department with assessing M/WBE participation in the Bond program.

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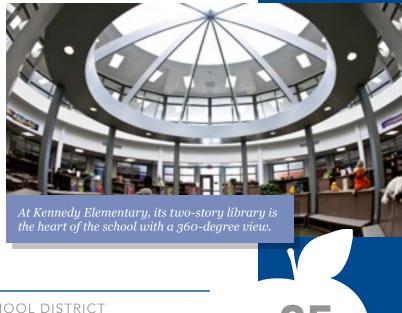
2007 Bond Financial Report

The 2007 Facilities Capital Program (FCP) has delivered on promises HISD made and is in its last lifecycle as we gear up for the 2012 Bond Program. The current overall financial status report for the 2007 Facilities Capital Program is comprised of total funding of \$1,176,130,676, with an actual committed amount of \$1,007,926,443 (including encumbrances of \$109,274,627 and actual expenditures of \$898,651,816). This results in an unspent funding to date balance of \$168,204,233 -- or 14 percent of total funding. The majority of the unspent funding is designated for Group 3 and 4 projects. The table below provides a summary of the school construction projects spending by funding source and outlines the actual funding, actual committed amount (including encumbrances and actual expenditures), and unspent funding to date from inception through June 30, 2013.

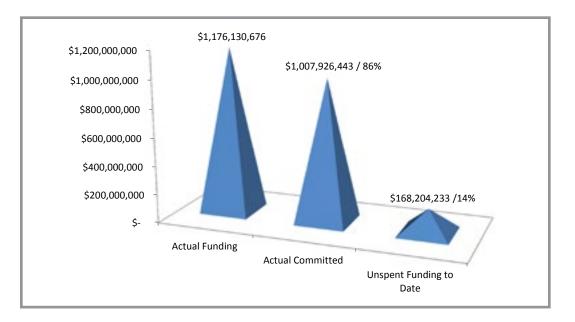

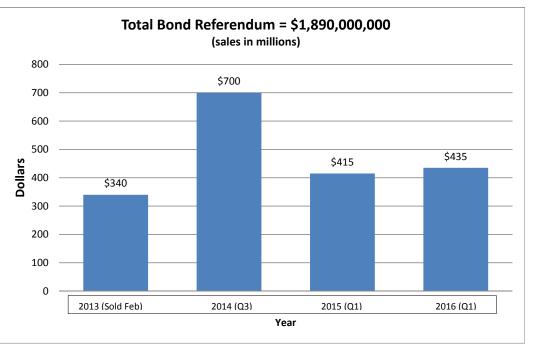


2012 Bond Financial Report

The plans for the 2012 Capital Program are to expend the \$1.89 billion over the next 8 years. As depicted in the chart below, the issuance of the bonds has been planned in four different sales. The first tranche was sold in February 2013 in the amount of \$340 million. The second tranche will be sold for \$700 million scheduled for third quarter 2014; the third tranche will be for \$415 million in the first quarter of 2015 and the final tranche for \$435 million in the first quarter of 2016.

The timing of the sale of the bonds takes into account the requirement that funds are available to encumber contracts as design and /or construction contracts are approved by the board coupled with the requirement of the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) that the district intends to expend the funds within guidelines of issuance to maintain their non-taxable status to the bondholder.

The Finance Department continues to work with the Construction Services team to allocate the first tranche of bond sales for \$340 million.

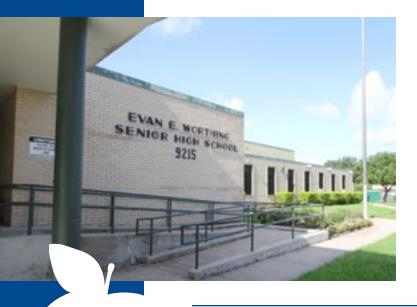

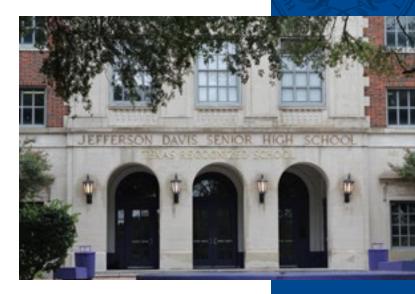

District-Wide Projects

Technology upgrades at all HISD schools: \$100 million

Bond funds will allow the implementation of a robust, reliable infrastructure and appropriate technology tools that will support the expertise and knowledge of our teachers, administrators and staff to enable them to stay current with technology and applications used in academic and business environments.

Technology needs identified in the bond proposal were prioritized to meet the requirements of an increasingly Internet-driven method of delivering instructional content. Critical projects include:

- Network Equipment Upgrades or Replacements to improve the reliability and availability of the network, so students can take advantage of the educational resources delivered through high-speed Internet. Much of the district's network equipment is more than seven years old, is obsolete, and the probability of failure is high.
- Wireless Network Expansion will allow the school community to access the Internet and create a more flexible teaching and learning environment for our students.
- **Telephony System** is over 10 years old, no longer upgradeable and has a high failure rate. A modern and reliable phone system is essential for safety across the district.
- **Instructional Delivery Devices** such as projectors, interactive displays, and instructional devices, will be integrated into classrooms to promote active student engagement. This will provide teachers with a common ground to share and collaborate through a standard, interactive learning environment.

Executive Summary

On Nov. 6, 2012, Houston voters approved a \$1.89 billion bond — by a margin of nearly 2 to 1 — to replace and repair 40 schools across the district, including 29 high schools. Since then, the district has been vigorously planning to implement the new and renovated campuses, with design beginning in 2013 and construction slated to begin in 2014.

Schools across the country are being built and redesigned for 21st century needs, and HISD will be at the forefront of that movement by focusing on integrating innovative strategies and designs to boost student achievement in all 2012 bond campuses. Some common features include natural lighting, flexible spaces and furniture, spaces that provide opportunity for collaboration and handson learning, and "green" designs.



In addition to the schools that will be rebuilt, the bond program also includes work that will benefit students across the district, including \$100 million in technology upgrades, \$44.7 million to replace regional field houses and improve athletic facilities, \$35 million to renovate middle school restrooms, and \$17.3 million for safety and security improvements.

The entire program will be spread out over the next six to eight years to help control costs and allow the district to gradually phase in a 4.85-cent property tax rate increase over the next five years.

Since November, the district has been diligently engaging the community through meetings, informational sessions, and Project Advisory Teams to create 21st century schools that meet the needs of their students and community.

Education and Design Standards

To ensure that all schools within the bond program are of uniform high quality, the district is developing reference guides to help shape their design and to ensure that facilities meet the needs of HISD's educational programming.

The goal is to ensure parity and equity among the schools, without diminishing the uniqueness of each campus. These documents are being developed by bond planners and designers and are being shared with the architects and the Project Advisory Teams. The standards will help ensure that a comprehensive high school, for example, has a certain amount of space for teaching, athletics and art/band or performance space. The standards will also help ensure that all the schools are designed to fit their budgets.



RFPs and RFQs

Since February, the Board of Education has awarded 29 design contracts. They include all 24 schools in the first two phases of construction, the district athletic upgrades at Delmar-Tusa Fieldhouse and the middle school restroom renovations.

Also approved were contracts with five program management firms to oversee construction within the 2012 program, as well as firms for environmental services, geotechnical services, real estate appraisal, and surveying and platting. Additional recommendations for other services, such as materials testing, hazardous materials consulting, etc., are expected to be made at a later date.

Administrators also expect to bring more contract recommendations to the board for construction manager at risk, which will help ensure a high-quality construction program that stays within budget.

Assessments

The district has been working with its program managers to further assess the needs of the middle school restrooms. The assessments that will be used to establish priorities for those projects will be complete by the end of September 2013.

Administrators have also been working with PBK Sports to identify the future needs at the Delmar-Tusa Fieldhouse.

Community and School Outreach

Project Advisory Teams (PATs)

• PATs comprised of stakeholders, administrators, teachers, students, parents, and community members are actively meeting. The monthly meeting schedules are being updated on the web to allow for as much community and school engagement as possible. For those who can't attend the meetings, the minutes are being posted to the web. As each school develops its guiding principles to help make decisions about the planning and design process, those documents are also being posted to the web.

Community Meetings and Engagement

- Several Phase 1 bond campuses have held meetings to address concerns of the community regarding construction and design. Additionally, these meetings also informed community members about the district's goal for each facility.
- As planning continues, each bond campus will have at least three community meetings to discuss project parameters.

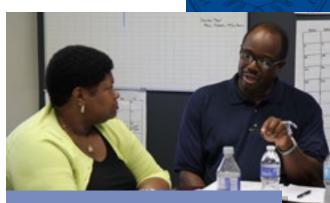


Committees

Glossary of Terms

BAS

Building Automation System (HVAC and lighting controls)

Change order

A modification to the original construction contract authorizing a change in the work or an adjustment in the amount of the contract or the contract time. The original contract price may not be increased by more than 25% by change order.

Competitive Bidding

A procurement method by which a governmental entity contracts with a contractor for the construction, alteration, rehabilitation, or repair of a facility by awarding the contract to the lowest responsible bidder.

Competitive Sealed Proposal (CSP)

A procurement method by which a governmental entity may request proposals and pricing information based on the scope of work provided, rank the offers, negotiate a contract, and then award the project to the contractor that offers the best value to the entity.

Construction commissioning

A collaborative process whose purpose is to ensure that buildings and systems perform according to contract.

Commissioning agent

An independent party, unaffiliated with the design team or contractors, that takes charge of the construction commissioning process.

Construction documents

Extremely detailed drawings and specifications showing and describing all of the details required to construct the building.

Construction Manager at Risk (CMAR)

A construction delivery method by which a governmental entity contracts with an architect or engineer for design and construction phase services and contracts separately with a construction manager-at-risk to serve as the general contractor and to provide consultation during the design and construction, rehabilitation, alteration, or repair of a facility. A CMAR is selected based upon qualifications and price proposal that would provide the best value for the governmental entity.

Daylighting

A planned energy conservation strategy that utilizes illumination from sunlight.



Design development

Process in which schematic design drawings are further developed to include more detail, including: detailed site plan; room layouts; door and window types; interior and exterior elevations; reflected ceiling plans; plumbing, mechanical, structural, and electrical drawings; and kitchen layouts.

Design team

A group of professionals from architectural and engineering firms that is engaged to design a facility.

Encumbrance Accounting

The recognition of commitments that will subsequently become expenditures when goods and services are received. Encumbrances are posted for documents such as purchase estimates, purchase orders, and contracts.

Educational Specifications

A document that details the number of rooms required, the size of each room, how those rooms should relate to each other (adjacencies), and the elements (sinks, electrical outlets, marker boards, cabinets, etc.) that should be included in each room. Districtwide Educational Specifications will be adapted for the specific needs of the campus.

FF&E

Furniture, fixtures, and equipment. This describes all contents that are not a permanent part of the structure.

Hard costs

Expenses associated with direct construction of a project.

HVAC

Heating, ventilation, and air-conditioning

Job Order Contract (JOC)

A procurement method used for maintenance, repair, alteration, renovation, remediation, or minor construction of a facility when the work is of a recurring nature, but the delivery times, type, and quantities of work required are indefinite.

Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED)

A building certification process developed by the U.S. Green Building Council (USGBC) to enhance environmental awareness among architects and building contractors and to encourage the design and construction of energy-efficient, water-conserving buildings that use sustainable or green resources and materials.





MEP

Mechanical/electrical and plumbing systems.

Program or Concept design

Single-line drawings that illustrate room adjacencies and scale

Public Facility Corporation

The PFC is a non-profit corporation, the creation of which was sponsored by the district pursuant to the Public Facility Corporation Act. The Public Facility Corporation act authorizes the creation and utilization of school district public facility corporations to issue bonds for capital renovation programs. The Houston Independent School District Public Facility Corporation (HISD-PFC) has utilized this structure to issue \$48M for four of the news schools in the 2007 Facilities Capital Program (FCP).

Schedule of values

An itemization of costs that comprises the entire contract amount.

Schematic Design

Typically includes a simple site plan, floor plans, simple building cross-sections, an outline specification with general information about building systems, a table comparing required square footages from the educational specifications with actual square footages shown on the drawings, a preliminary estimate of cost options, and three-dimensional depictions of the exterior of the building.

Schedule of values

An itemization of costs that comprises the entire contract amount.

Scope-to-Budget

An analytical review conducted by the architectural/engineering team to ensure the proposed scope of work and project requirements are aligned with the established construction budget. The approved findings from this review become the basis for the design and preparation of the construction documents.

Schematic Design

The schematic design submission typically includes a simple site plan, floor plans (simple scale drawings that show room sizes, relationships, doors, and windows), simple building crosssections, an outline specification with general information about building systems, a table comparing required square footages from the educational specifications with actual square footages shown on the drawings, a preliminary estimate of cost options, and possibly 3-dimensional depictions of the exterior of the building.

Soft costs

A construction industry term, but more specifically a contractor accounting term for an expense item that is not considered direct construction cost. Soft costs include architectural, engineering, financing, legal fees, and other pre- and post-construction expenses.





Swing space

A school building or a portion of an existing school building or other facility that will house the student population and its teachers and staff during the school-construction process.

Bond Oversight Committee – Status Report 4/30/2013

HISD's Bond Oversight Committee heard a detailed update on the district's 2012 and 2007 bond programs during its inaugural quarterly meeting on April 30 that included the latest steps in planning, renovating and building dozens of schools across the district.

The independent committee was established to monitor the district's bond programs, which includes ensuring that bond revenues are spent appropriately and evaluating the risks and controls of the bond program.

The district recently reorganized the group's charter to give it more oversight responsibility, via independent and periodic reports to the superintendent, the Board of Education and the general public.

This report is intended to fulfill that requirement.

Executive Summary

As the Houston Independent School District moves forward with planning for the 2012 bond program to renovate, build, or replace 40 schools, work is underway to finish all the projects in the 2007 bond program over the next two years.

As of March 31, more than 70 percent of the approved work in the 2007 bond program was complete. Among the milestones are 20 new schools that are open and serving students. Three additional schools are under construction, with two slated to open for students this fall.

Overall, the \$805 million in funding approved by voters in 2007 included more than 180 expansion and renovation projects across the district. These projects varied greatly in scope and size, from the installation of 8,800 additional security cameras on campuses across the district to an \$11 million classroom and science laboratory addition at Bellaire High School.

The overall goal of the 2007 bond program was to replace deteriorated and outdated school facilities, relieve overcrowding at various campuses, and renovate and repair aging facilities throughout the district to address safety concerns, accessibility requirements, and deferred maintenance issues.

Because so much of the 2007 bond program focused on elementary schools, HISD officials decided in 2012 to ask voters to put bond dollars to work on the district's high schools.

The \$1.89 billion program, approved by an overwhelming majority in November, will rebuild or replace 40 schools across the city, including 29 high schools, many of which are more than 50 years old and cost-prohibitive to maintain.

As of April 11, architect contracts have been awarded for 23 projects, including middle school restroom renovations and 19 schools.





Both the 2012 and 2007 bond programs share some common ground, including the emphasis on providing technologically up-to-date and environmentally sustainable learning environments.

The two bond programs also share the goal of maximizing participation by qualified Minority and Women-Owned Business Enterprises. HISD's minimum M/WBE goal levels are 20 percent for all levels of purchasing and construction and 25 percent for professional services. In the 2007 program, the M/WBE commitment from all firms has reached nearly 34 percent. In the 2012 program, the contracts awarded to date reflect a 51 percent M/WBE commitment.

As with the 2007 bond program, a key goal of the 2012 bond program is community engagement. The goal is to create a program that is transparent and accountable to the public.

Toward that end, a Project Advisory Team (PAT) will be formed at each of the 2012 bond campuses.

Each PAT will be comprised of stakeholders including administrators, teachers, students, parents, and community members. The PAT will meet monthly and will be actively engaged in making decisions about planning and design issues throughout the project.

In addition, the district has held two symposia on 21st century learning to help district staff and parents understand how these new facilities will deliver education in innovative ways.

The district also held Student Focus Groups and has given bond updates to HISD advisory committees, including the African American Advisory Committee; Hispanic Advisory Committee; Asian American Advisory Committee; Indo-American Advisory Committee; HISD Supplier Diversity Advisory Committee; 21st Century Schools Advisory Committee; and the Superintendent's Parent Advisory Committee.

The next steps for the district include:

- Moving forward with additional design team recommendations
- Completing site specific Ed Specs for Group 1 schools
- Meeting with Project Advisory Teams and architects to begin design work
- Holding design charettes and eco-charettes to help gather community feedback
- Making initial contractor selections
- Beginning summer work related to the 2007 bond program

In conclusion, the district's bond programs are:

- Progressing on schedule and within budget
- Promoting environmental sustainability
- Exceeding goals for M/WBE participation
- Emphasizing community engagement
- Operating with transparency and accountability

The general purpose of this meeting was to brief the Oversight Committee members on the current status of the new construction and renovation projects funded through the 2012 Facilities Capital Program and to discuss related issues, questions, and activities:

Item 1 Introduction

Mr. Leo Bobadilla called the meeting to order at 8:35 A.M. He welcomed everyone and stated that the purpose of the meeting was to discuss the 2012 and 2007 Bond implementation and maintain transparency to ensure overall accountability throughout the construction and renovation process. After the welcome, the attendees introduced themselves.

Item 2 Executive Summary

Mr. Robert Sands provided a brief overview of the 2012 Bond. Forty schools are to be built or renovated by 2020. Contracts have been awarded to Architecture/ Engineering teams for 23 projects. Restroom renovation projects for middle schools will start in 2013. Planning and design meetings already have begun. North and South Early College projects will break ground in 2013.

Item 3 Bond Planning

Sue Robertson explained the 2012 Bond Phasing Schedule :

- Group 1
- Plannⁱng and Design will begin early / mid 2013. Anticipated Construction is scheduled to begin mid / late 2014.
- Group 2 Planning and Design will begin early / mid 2014. Anticipated Construction is scheduled to begin mid / late 2015.
- Group 3 Planning and Design will begin early / mid 2015.
 Anticipated Construction is scheduled to begin mid
 - Anticipated Construction is scheduled to begin mid / late 2016.
- Group 4 Planning and Design will begin late 2015 / early 2016. Anticipated Construction is scheduled to begin mid-2017.

The committee reviewed the purpose and function of the Project Advisory Team (PAT). A PAT, comprised of stakeholders, including administrators, teachers, students, parents, and community members, will be formed at each of the 2012 Bond Schools. Meetings will take place monthly, and PAT members will be actively engaged in making decisions about planning and design issues throughout the project. PAT handbooks have been provided for the PAT at each school to clarify each individual's role and responsibility.

Community meetings are an essential part of our plan for engagement and transparency. These meetings are intended to engage neighbors as well as school participants during various phases of the project. A meeting will be held at the beginning of the project to discuss site issues, such as building orientation, entry point, car and bus queuing. The second meeting will be held during design development to provide information about the progress of the interior layout of the building and potential exterior facades. The third meeting will be held when construction is about to begin so that school staff, parents, and the community can meet the contractor and understand how the





construction process may affect their neighborhood. That meeting will provide an opportunity to reassure everyone that safety is a very high priority and that the effects of construction on neighbors will be minimized as much as possible. This approach has worked well in other districts that allowed the community to have a voice in the design, and the resulting solutions were much richer because of that collaboration.

Three planning symposiums have been held. The symposiums enabled PAT representatives from all of the 2012 bond schools to hear presentations and engage in table-top discussions. This process helps provide feedback. Symposiums were held on December 14, 2011; March 6, 2012; and April 17, 2013. Committee member David Quan asked if the symposium was offered in other languages. Mr. Bobadilla explained that he is aware that translators are needed, and translators will be provided at the principals' request.

Item 4 Bond Planning, continued

The committee discussed the concepts that form 21st century learning: collaborative, hands-on, transparent, and flexible. Spaces must provide good verbal and visual communication as well as auditory privacy. It is necessary to create opportunities to display student work. The buildings will be wireless with a robust infrastructure, and technology will be a pervasive and seamless tool. Furniture will be easily reconfigured and ergonomically appropriate for young learners as well as adults.

Building 21st century schools in HISD allows us the opportunity to change that 100-year-old model of the classroom. Small and large group learning is an essential part of 21st century learning.

These ideas around 21st century learning are following best practices for the field. We have engaged academic and technology staff in a dialog about best practices and where education is headed worldwide. In Denmark, educators focus on knowing each child's learning style and what best supports the individual learner. The class environment prepares children for life, and both children and adults are focused on the most effective individual approach to learning.

These conversations have been going on since the 1990s and are not new ideas, but the concept is continually evolving. We are working closely with the technology division during this process. Flexibility and adaptability is a high priority. When technology changes weeks and years from now, we won't have to tear down the walls; we simply unplug and move forward.

Item 5 2007 Bond Program Overview

Mr. Dillon Brady discussed facts regarding the 2007 bond:

- \$805 million in funding
- New fencing installed at 131 schools
- More than 8,800 security cameras installed
- 20 new schools open and serving students
- 3 new schools still under construction
- 2 schools renovated and expanded



- Renovations/repair projects completed throughout the district, with others ongoing
- LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) success: 2002-03 Certified; 2007-06 Certified, 3 Silver, 1 Gold. Mr. Dan Bankhead added that 3 of the last new facilities will open this summer, and while the exact level is yet to be determined, they are planned to qualify as LEED buildings.

Item 6 2007 Bond Financial Report

The 2007 Bond Financial Report was presented by Ms. Kathi Hayward. Ms. Hayward brought the committee's attention to the chart on page 23, which shows that HISD's 2007 Facilities Capital Program ("FCP") is comprised of total funding of \$1,176,130,676 and actual committed funds in the amount of \$980,881,150. Currently, the unspent funds are \$195,249,526. Mr. Bobadilla added that the 2007 bond was not fully funded until December/January 2012, and the 2012 bond will funded similarly, through a series of bond sales.

Ms. Hayward and Ms. Savoie explained the tables on pages 29-40, which provide details for each of the 2007 Bond projects. The definitions for the column headings can be found on pages 33 and 43.

The committee discussed the scope of the 2007 bond, which was to do essential repairs at a number of campuses as well as constructing new schools. There are projects that overlap between the two bonds. Some of the 2007 bond funds may be needed on those campuses to keep the building operable while planning, design, and construction for the 2012 bond are ongoing.

Item 7 Business Assistance (M/WBE) Bond Report

Next, Ms. Alexis Licata expanded on M/WBE. Currently, HISD has a minimum requirement of 20% M/WBE participation in Construction and 25% in A/E. The tables showing actual percentages of participation in the 2007 bond program (pages 228-230 in the Bond Report) were discussed. These percentages significantly exceed the district's goals.

After the 2012 bond passed, numerous networking events were held to develop interest in the upcoming RFQs for A/E services. We received 85 proposals for the 40 projects in the 2012 bond, and, as of March 29, 2013, the M/WBE participation for A/E services is anticipated to be approximately 51% (pending contract approvals).

Mr. Martin Debrovner asked about the auditing process. We confirm participation monthly, utilizing a "funds spent report," which is reviewed by an analyst to ensure accuracy. In addition to publicizing opportunities, the district makes a concerted effort to assist M/WBE firms in navigating the certification process. The district wants the best firms to do the work, and we believe we will have continued success in attracting firms that complete this complex work successfully.



Item 8 Bond Communications

Ms. Sylvia Wood discussed Bond Communications, which is a group of communications staff dedicated to support of the bond program. HISD has a new comprehensive bond website that describes various topics about the 2007 and 2012 bond programs. The district has also added a Really Simple Syndication Feed (RSS Feed) to the homepages of bond campus websites so visitors to those websites can receive timely updates on the bond. The bond communications team also publishes a monthly eNewsletter and is looking for new and better strategic ways to inform the public.

The committee and staff discussed the various social media outlets that are being pursued, such as Twitter and Facebook. The district has a good track record working with television, radio and print media as well. The committee discussed the need to reach out to the community and provide information through as many outlets as possible and in multiple languages. Much of the community may not prefer to access information electronically, and we need to provide opportunities for everyone to know what is occurring. Staff offered to connect with the various HISD departments who work in the communities throughout the district to be sure that everyone can obtain the information they need, have questions answered, and provide feedback to us.

Item 9 Additional Questions

Mr. White asked if there was a T-building manager type situation in place. The district is minimizing the use of T-buildings, which allows us to save and use permanent dollars for other necessary purposes.

SUBJECT: AUTHORITY TO NEGOTIATE, EXECUTE, AND AMEND CONTRACTS WITH DESIGN FIRMS FOR SELECTED 2012 FACILITIES CAPITAL PROGRAM PROJECTS

The Houston Independent School District's (HISD) 2012 Facilities Capital Program was approved by voters on November 6, 2012.

A request for qualifications for architectural-engineering services was issued on December 3, 2012. HISD received 85 statements of qualifications (SOQ) from design firms on January 15, 2013.

To assist the HISD selection committee, an Architectural Advisory Committee comprised of professors from the University of Houston, Rice University, and Prairie View A&M University Schools of Architecture was assembled to offer its expertise in the area of 21st century school design.

In addition to the Advisory Committee input, stakeholders from each facility were invited to attend a second round of Architectural/Engineering presentations. The list of the most highly qualified firms for selected 2012 Facilities Capital Program projects will be forthcoming is attached.

In accordance with Texas Government Code Chapter 2254, and in consultation with legal counsel, the design firm selection followed a formal qualification review process. The HISD selection committee conducted an initial review of all submitted SOQs and various firms were invited to provide oral presentations. All firms, including firms not invited to provide oral presentations, will remain under consideration for other 2012 Bond projects.

Approval of this board item will authorize the superintendent of schools or a designee to negotiate, execute, and amend contracts at a fair and reasonable fee not to exceed seven percent of the construction costs, plus a 10 percent contingency of the negotiated design fee and the actual cost of necessary consultants not included in the fee for basic design services, such as surveying, geotechnical engineering, and roof construction observation. Each contract will be established with fixed-fee compensation based on a formulated construction cost.

Furthermore, approval of this item will authorize the superintendent of schools or a designee to negotiate, execute, and amend contracts with the next most highly

qualified firm for each project should negotiations with the most highly qualified firm be unsuccessful.

A request for qualifications for Program Management Services was issued on February 26, 2013, and HISD received 19 statements of qualifications (SOQ) from management firms on March 19, 2013.

In accordance with Texas Government Code Chapter 2254, and in consultation with legal counsel, the program management firm selection followed a formal qualification review process.

The HISD selection committee conducted an initial review of all submitted SOQs, and various firms were invited to provide oral presentations. All firms, including firms not invited to provide oral presentations, will remain under consideration for 2012 Bond projects. Based on the written and oral presentations, the list of the most highly qualified program management firms for the 2012 Facilities Capital Program projects will be forthcoming is attached.

It is recommended that the superintendent of schools be authorized to negotiate, execute, and amend agreements with each of these program management firms at a fair and reasonable fee not to exceed three percent of the construction costs plus potential additional fees for supplemental professional services.

Furthermore, approval of this item will authorize the superintendent of schools or a designee to negotiate, execute, and amend agreements with the next most highly qualified firm should negotiations with the most highly qualified firm be unsuccessful.

SUBJECT: APPROVAL OF ADJUSTMENT TO THE CONSTRUCTION CONTINGENCY ALLOWANCE FOR HENRY GRADY MIDDLE SCHOOL **RENOVATION/ADDITION** AND AUTHORITY TO NEGOTIATE, EXECUTE, AMEND ALL RELATED AND **CONTRACTS**

The Houston Independent School District (HISD) 2007 bond election approved the renovation of Henry W. Grady Middle School.

On August 27, 2009, the HISD Board of Education approved \$13.5 million to be allocated to additional facility projects in each of the nine trustee districts, for a total of \$121.5 million.

On September 10, 2009, the HISD Board of Education approved the request from the District VII Trustee allotment for an incremental budget increase of \$12 million for Grady Middle School for additional renovation and construction.

On October 8, 2009, the HISD Board of Education approved a design contract for the project with Gensler Architects.

On August 12, 2010, the HISD Board of Education approved awarding a construction contract for demolition of the existing building.

On November 11, 2010, the HISD Board of Education approved a constructionmanager-at-risk contract with Satterfield & Pontikes Construction, Inc. Contract negotiations were successful and the contract was fully executed on November 15, 2010.

As part of the final close-out process for Grady Middle School's construction project and to accomplish the final reconciliation of construction cost, it has been determined HISD owes Satterfield & Pontikes Construction, Inc., an additional \$94,000. This request will not increase the overall project budget. Approval of this item will authorize the superintendent of schools or a designee to negotiate, execute, and amend all necessary contracts to implement the work.
