











Vim, vigor, and vitality helped Sharon as she went with the photographer on his rounds.






There is one person on a publication who is responsible for everything printed—every picture. every page. every word.



From Granger the new head mentor went to TCU where he was "All SWC" his sophomore year. After graduating, Coach Bartosh played football in the Canadian Professional League.



Johnny Dansby scored the Buffs first touchdown in the second quarter, and then went over for 2 points, making the score 8-6 at the half.



The big horses for Bellaire were Bobby McGlaun, Bill Champion, and Tom Hillary.




The Bulldogs jumped back to score on a 31-yard pass from Wright to Butler with Butler kicking the extra point to make it 15-13, Milby.


The Milby Buffs volleyball team stampeded to the city championship with a 8-1 record.







May the memories of dear old Milby linger in our dreams of fondest hope. What a glorious host of fine young people and teachers wave me a fond farewell.








