What: Participating campuses will be provided with a list of suggested activities to complete in the classroom or virtual (**TEAMS**).

Activity (Option 1)	What is an Upstander? Lesson #1 pgs. 19-23Circle Discussion Guide: Point of View PSA: Look at Me!Circle discussion: Prepare for effectively in a range of conversations and collaborations with 	 Students will accurately identify the warning signs shown in Point of View. Students will take the perspective of others while engaging in a discussion with peers. Students will communicate clearly and actively listen during community circle.
Activity (Option 2)	Vouth make History as Upstanders Lesson #4 pgs. 36- 41The Upstander Fishbowl: A Convening of Greatness- Pg. 39Fishbowl discussion on: Upstanders in relations to behaviors and social interactions based on 	 Students will compare the perspective of different youth upstanders by participating in and observing a fishbowl discussion. Students will examine how a culture of connection is built when more students engage in upstander actions.
Activity (Option 3)	Trusted Adults Lesson # 5 pgs. 42-47 Qualities Trusted Adults Share- Pg. 43 Brainstorm the qualities of Trusted adults using the first letter of the word T-R-U-S-T.	 Students will define the term Trusted adults. Students will identify trusted adults in the school community and home. Students will create and distribute trusted adult signs to the trusted adults in their school community and home.
Activity (Option 4)	It's Not a Joke! Lesson # 7 pgs. 52-54 Circle Discussion: Asked students if they have heard other jokes made about serious issues and to share if comfortable.	 Students will learn the serious consequences of making joes about serious warning signs and threats. Student will develop strategies for combating the joke culture.
Activity (Option 5)	Difficult Conversations Lesson #6 Pgs. 48- 51 Set-up a simulation activity Students will practice having those difficult conversations using simulations and role plays.	 Students will assess warning signs and treats to be reported to trusted adults. Students will practice saying something to a trusted adult by role playing the use of a three-step model for having difficult conversations.



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Say Something is a program for students in grades 6-12. Youth-led clubs can implement and sustain Say Something's message throughout their campus.
