




### Plot Map


#### Independent Reading Wordle

Vhat is a Wordle?

A Wordle is an online tool for making word clouds. Basically, it's a really cool way to visually display the nost important elements of a large piece of text. In our case, our large piece of text would be our adependent reading novel.

tere is an example of a Wordle based on the novel The Maze Runner by James Dashner:




equirements: For your Wordle Independent Reading assignment, you must include:

- 1. The title of the book (IN ALL CAPITAL LETTERS), the name of the author, and the genre.
- 2. Names of the main characters (antagonist and protagonist) and at least three adjectives to describe each.
- 3. Name of the setting. If it is not a specific place, you can stay a small town or modern Europe.
- 4. Words to describe the conflict (at least five different words).
- 5. Any other important words which are vital to the story (at least three).
- 6. The most significant segment of text in the book. This will probably be three to five paragraph or maybe even an entire chapter.
- 7. An analysis of your Wordle on the back. \*Please see rubric for specific details.

A body biography is a visual exploration of a character, and is intended to go beneath the surface of what you are "t about a character. This assignment gives you the opportunity to be creative and artistic, but the most important paralways going to be thoughtful, accurate information and writing.

Step 1: Decide what you are going to write on your body biography.

Be sure to think about things like how your character appears to others vs. how he/she actually is on the inside, what directly said about the character vs. what is implied, any changes that have occurred within your character.

3e sure that you have support in the form of evidence that confirms your statements. That support MUST be includ for at least 10 body parts.

- Head: Who or what the character thinks/thinks about.
- Eyes: What your character looks at/for.
- Nose: What your character knows, or thinks he/she knows.
- Mouth: What your character says about others, or how he/she speaks about them...
- Ears: What others say about your character, or how they speak about him/her.
- Right shoulder: The personal burdens your character carries.
- Left shoulder: The burdens of others that your character carries.
- Right hand: Who your character helps and how.
- Left hand: Who your character hurts and how.
- Heart: Who or what your character loves or has relationships with.
- Stomach: Obstacles your character faces.
- Spine: Your character's main objectives or desires.
- Left knee: Your character's most admirable qualities.
- Right knee: Your character's least admirable qualities.
- Right foot: Where your character is headed in life.
- Left foot: Where your character has been in life
