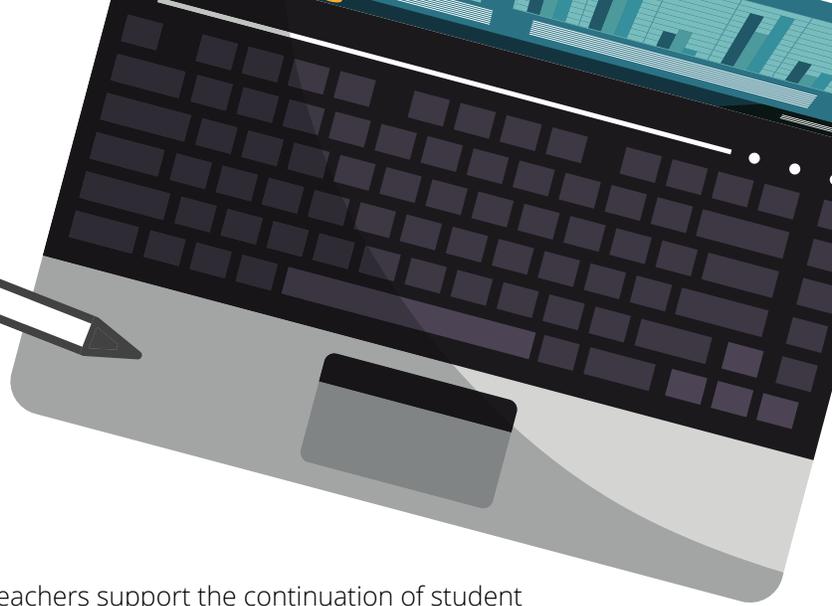
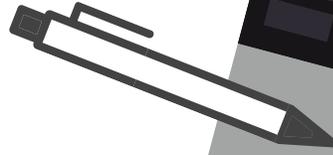
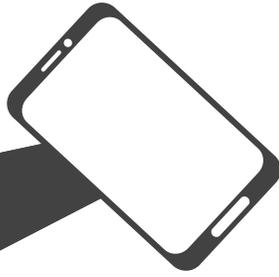


# DISTANCE LEARNING BEST PRACTICES, TIPS, AND TOOLS FOR TEACHERS

Despite instructing your students from the comfort of your own home, you will be on camera. Make sure that you are dressed appropriately (would you wear it to work?) and that your background surroundings are reflective of your image as a professional educator. It's important that you set the tone for your online sessions because your students (and their parents) will be watching. It is also important that you have "norming" conversations with your students. By providing suggestions regarding appropriate dress, you will help to decrease distractions that will impact your instructional time.

Even seasoned online instructors have occasional technical glitches and unanticipated challenges. The reality is, you are doing the very best that you can and flexibility is key. Arm yourself with handy "FAQs" and "Common Issues" type resources associated with the tools that you are using and if something goes awry, be flexible and forgiving of yourself and others.

Promote success in your online environment by clearly defining what your idea of participation is, what your expectations are for online behavior, etc. and make sure that you share this with your students. This again goes back to the "norming" conversations that were mentioned above. Just as you set clear expectations in your brick and mortar classroom, it is critical that you also set them in your virtual classroom.

# **SAMPLE**

## *Student Norms*

1. Be respectful of others. Everyone's opinion matters online just as it does in our regular class.
2. Monitor your online "tone". Typing in all caps is equal to yelling at someone. Avoid all caps, excessive exclamation marks, and strong language. Don't write anything that sounds mean, angry, or sarcastic.
3. Think before you type. The words and symbols that you type are a part of a permanent digital record.
4. Grammar and spelling matter. Avoid typing online for class the way that you text your friends. Spell words out because this is a classroom environment.
5. Do not share or post things that are not appropriate (even privately). Nothing is private online.
6. Use "please" and "thank you" when interacting with others online.
