

6. Social and Emotional Development: Recognizing and celebrating diverse cultural traditions can help students develop empathy and social skills, which are critical for their overall development and future interactions in a diverse society.	
7. Combatting Stereotypes and Prejudices: Exposure to different cultures in a positive and celebratory context can help break down stereotypes and prejudices. It encourages students to see the richness in diversity rather than viewing it through a lens of otherness.	



Diwali, also known as Deepavali, is a major Hindu festival celebrated with great enthusiasm and joy across India and by Hindu communities around the world. It is also observed by Sikhs, Jains, and some Buddhists. The festival typically lasts five days and is known as the "Festival of Lights" due to the tradition of lighting oil lamps (diyas) and fireworks.
Significance:
Victory of Light over Darkness: Diwali symbolizes the victory of light over darkness and good over evil.
Celebrations:
1) Lighting Diyas and Candles: Homes and public spaces are illuminated with oil lamps and candles.

2)	Fireworks : People set off fireworks and firecrackers.	
3)	Decorations: Homes are decorated with rangoli (colorful patterns made on the floor with powders or flower petals) and lights.	
4)	Sweets and Feasts: Families prepare and share a variety of traditional sweets and dishes.	
5)	Gifts and New Clothes : Exchanging gifts and wearing new clothes are common practices.
