SUBJECT: SUMMER SCHOOL EDUCATION PROGRAM, 2017–2018

Each year, the Houston Independent School District (HISD) offers a summer education program designed to assist students with a variety of instructional needs. Centrally coordinated summer school programs in 2018 included accelerated instruction for State of Texas Assessments of Academic Readiness (STAAR) and STAAR End-of-Course (EOC) re-testers; bilingual or English as Second Language (ESL) classes for English Learners (EL); credit accrual/recovery for students needing to graduate; Extended School Year (ESY) services; Promotion/Retention classes; and other school-based programs. The summer education program supports HISD's Strategic Direction Core Initiative 3: Rigorous Instructional Standards and Supports. The attached report shows student enrollment and outcomes for students who were eligible for and attended summer school in 2018.

Key findings include:

- A total of 35,388 students attended the HISD 2018 Summer School program in grades 1– 12.
- In grades 1–8, 15,693 students attended the HISD 2018 Summer School program after being retained at the end of Spring 2018.
- Of the 2018 summer courses taken by high school students (grades 9–12), 47 percent were in STAAR EOC subject areas, while 53 percent were from other course selections such as industry classes, physical education, and foreign language courses.
- Of the five STAAR EOC exams administered following the 2018 summer school program, U.S. History (41 percent) had the largest proportion of students meet at or above the Approaches Grade Level standard. English II (21 percent) had the smallest proportion of students meet at or above the Approaches Grade Level standard.

Summer School Education Program, 2017–2018

Executive Summary

Program Description

Each year, the Houston Independent School District (HISD) offers a summer education program designed to assist students with a variety of instructional needs. Centrally coordinated summer school programs in 2018 included accelerated instruction for State of Texas Assessments of Academic Readiness (STAAR) and STAAR End-of-Course (EOC) re-testers; bilingual or English as Second Language (ESL) classes for English Learners (EL); credit accrual/recovery for students needing to graduate; Extended School Year (ESY) services; Promotion/Retention classes; and other school-based programs. The summer education program supports HISD's Strategic Direction Core Initiative 3: Rigorous Instructional Standards and Supports. This report shows student enrollment and outcomes for students who attended summer school in 2018 based on either retention status at the end of Spring 2018, or for other reasons such as academic enrichment.

Highlights

- A total of 35,388 students attended the HISD 2018 summer school program in grades 1–12, and of this total, 25,397 were in grades 1–8.
- When compared to the number of students retained in grades 1–8 at the end of the Spring 2017 semester and who attended the 2017 summer school program (n=19,916), there was a decrease in the number of students retained in Spring 2018 and who attended the 2018 summer school program (n=15,693).
- Of the 15,693 students in grades 1–8 who were retained at the end of Spring 2018 and attended the 2018 summer school program, 71 percent were retained because they did not meet course grade requirements, 21 percent failed to meet multiple standards, six percent (grades 1 and 2) for not passing the High Frequency Word Examination (HFWE), and three percent were retained for other reasons.
- In the summer of 2018, students in grades 9–12 took 60,280 courses, for an average of six courses
 per student. Of the courses taken by high school students (grades 9–12), 98 percent were provided
 through face-to-face instruction, and two percent were provided through Apex/ApexIS or by other
 distance learning providers.
- Of the 2018 summer courses taken by high school students (grades 9–12), 47 percent were in core STAAR EOC subject areas, while 53 percent were from other course selections such as industry classes, physical education, and foreign language courses.
- On the Renaissance 360 (RL 360) reading assessment, a larger proportion of students (81 percent) in grades 1–8, attending the 2018 summer school program, scored in the Below Basic reading proficiency band when compared to district students in grades 1–8 in Spring 2018 (52 percent).
- For grades 9–12, a larger proportion of students (54 percent) attending the 2018 summer school
 program performed at the Below Basic reading proficiency level on the RL 360 when compared to the
 proportion of all HISD students at the end of Spring 2018 (41 percent).

 Of the five STAAR EOC exams administered during the summer of 2018, U.S. History had the largest proportion of students achieve at or above the Approaches Grade Level standard (41 percent). English II had smallest proportion of students achieve at or above the Approaches Grade Level standard (21 percent).

Recommendations

 Of the 60,280 course enrollments by students in grades 9–12 during the 2018 summer school program, 21,323 (35%) were identified as completed. This lack of completion has a detrimental effect on the judicious use of finite HISD resources in meeting the needs of HISD students needing support to meet graduation requirements. Therefore, it is recommended that steps be taken to identify barriers to course completion and mechanisms be put in place to overcome the identified barriers.

Introduction

In 2010–2011, the Texas Education Agency (TEA) adopted a set of promotion standards for students in grades 5 and 8 in Texas. To be promoted, students in grades 5 and 8 must meet academic achievement standards on state-mandated assessments or demonstrate subject matter proficiency for the grade level or course. The state allows students three attempts at the state-mandated assessments, two during the school year and one during summer. To meet extraordinary circumstances, exceptions to promotion standards were provided between the 2014-2015 and 2017-2018 academic years (Department of Research and Accountability, 2016; Department of Research and Accountability, 2017; Department of Research and Accountability, 2018b; Houston Independent School District, 2017; Houston Independent School District, 2018a; Texas Education Agency, 2018). In 2014-2015, in response to a change in the mathematics standards, the state suspended the promotion standard for this subject (Department of Research and Accountability, 2016). Therefore, in 2014–2015, STAAR 3-8 reading was the only state assessment used in grades 5 and 8 to determine student promotion. In 2015-2016, the TEA commissioner suspended the third administration of the STAAR reading and mathematics exams for grades 5 and 8 and waived the promotion standard attached to the exams due to a delay in test results (Department of Research and Accountability, 2017). Based on changes to the state's testing calendar for school year 2016–2017 and the subsequent delay in receiving test results, Houston Independent School District (HISD) promotion standards requiring passing scores on STAAR tests were modified for grades 3, 4, 6, and 7 (Houston Independent School District, 2017). Therefore, students in these grades were not required to pass the STAAR 3-8 tests to be promoted to the next grade. However, students in grades 5 and 8 were still required to pass the STAAR exams to meet the state promotion standard. If a student in grade 5 or 8 did not successfully pass the STAAR reading or STAAR mathematics exams on any of the attempts, the student was retained, unless promoted through a school committee decision or another plan. In 2017-2018, the TEA commissioner suspended the third administration of the STAAR reading and mathematics exams for grades 5 and 8 and waived the promotion standard attached to the exams for school districts, including HISD, impacted by Hurricane Harvey (Texas Education Agency, 2018).

Each academic year, HISD offers a summer education program designed to assist students with a variety of instructional needs. The 2018 summer education program allowed students who did not meet the applicable promotion standards the opportunity to repeat required courses needed for promotion and to be re-tested. For other students, the summer school program provided the opportunity to get ahead by taking required courses before the next school year, or to receive specialized instruction based on eligibility. Centrally coordinated summer school programs in 2018 included accelerated instruction for State of Texas Assessments of Academic Readiness (STAAR 3–8) and STAAR End-of-Course (EOC) re-testers, bilingual or English as Second Language (ESL) classes for English Learners (EL), credit accrual/recovery for students needing to graduate, Extended School Year (ESY) services, Promotion/Retention classes, and other school-based programs. The summer education program supports HISD's Strategic Direction Core Initiative 3: Rigorous Instructional Standards and Supports. This report addresses eligibility, enrollment, attendance, and outcomes for the 2018 HISD summer school program.

Methods

Data Collection and Analysis

Several student data files were used for Spring 2018 and Summer 2018 information, including end-of-year (EOY) promotion, retention, and enrollment [Chancery Promotion, Retention, and Enrollment file, (PSE file)], students' reading proficiency levels [Renaissance (RL) 360 Reading assessment], summer school

attendance (PSE file and Chancery Historical Grades file), STAAR EOC results (Access STAAR/EOC file and 2018 June Administration Research and Accountability Report) and student demographics (PSE file and Chancery Historical Grades file). Results from these data sources are reflected in the tables contained within **Appendix A**, pp. 19–29.

For this report, an HISD student cohort was created using the PSE file for grades 1–8. This analysis included HISD students who had promotion or retention records and excluded students who withdrew prior to the end of the 2017–2018 school year. Students from the PSE file were matched to the Chancery Ad Hoc Spring 2018 file for purposes of analyzing student demographics. A total of 125,666 students in grades 1–8 were included for summer school eligibility and attendance analyses. A total of 30,756 students available at the end of Spring 2018 for summer school in early childhood programs [early education (EE), pre-kindergarten (PK), and kindergarten (K)] were identified using the ADA_400 file and filtering for cycle six and eliminating a total of 44 duplicate entries. A total of 52,943 students available at the end of Spring 2018 for summer school in grades 9–12 were identified using the Chancery Historical Grades file, 2017–2018.

Students from the HISD student cohort were included in the 2018 HISD summer school cohort if they were coded as present for at least one day of summer school in grades 1–8. A positive summer school enrollment indicator in the Chancery Historical Grades file identified 9,991 students in grades 9–12 who enrolled in the 2018 summer school program. In sum, a total of 35,388 HISD students, grades 1–12, attended the 2018 summer school program.

Lexile scores for the 2017–2018 end-of-year (EOY) were taken from the RL 360 Reading assessment file for grades 1–12. A total of 25,915 students in grades 1–12 that attended the 2018 summer school program had a Spring 2018 EOY Lexile score from taking the RL-360 Reading assessment. If the student took multiple EOY RL-360 Reading assessments, the highest score was included in this report for analysis. Lexile proficiency categories for grades K–12 were provided by the Secondary Curriculum and Development department. A chart with corresponding Lexile score bands for each Lexile proficiency category (reading level) by grade can be found in **Appendix B**, p. 30. **Appendix C**, pp. 31–70 shows the number of students enrolled in summer school per Lexile score band based on the students' 2018 spring campus. The Lexile scores were used to ascertain if there was an observable difference between Spring 2018 districtwide Lexile scores and the Lexile scores of students that attended the 2018 summer school program, as well as any observable difference in Lexile scores when comparing the group of students that attended the summer school program in 2018 and the group of students that attended the 2017 summer school program. Summer 2017 student Lexile scores were taken from iStation assessments and STAAR reading 3–8 examination files.

For this report, summer school enrollment by campus for eligible students grades 1–8 was provided by the PSE file. **Appendix D**, pp. 71–109 shows summer school campus enrollment and the students' 2018 spring campus. HUB campus locations, along with projected attendance numbers, were provided by the Officer, Special Populations (2018 Summer School Guide/FAQs, 2018). **Appendix E**, pp. 110–116 shows summer enrollment by campus and HUB campus for both the 2016–2017 school year and the 2017–2018 school year. **Appendix F**, pp. 117–118 has enrollment by high school for grades 9–12.

Numbers were rounded to the nearest whole number in the text, and to the nearest tenth in the tables. Numbers were rounded up if the next digit was five or higher and were not changed if the next digit was lower than five, so 11.49 was recorded as 11.5 in a table and 11 in the text, while 11.50 was recorded as 11.5 in the table and 12 in the text.

Data Limitations

Students from the Texas Connections Academy Houston (TCAH) did not have promotion or retention data and were subsequently dropped from the HISD eligibility cohort. However, TCAH students (n=103) were included in the summer school analysis cohort, if they had attendance records for summer school.

Results

What was the population of students who were available for summer school in 2017-2018?


 A total of 209,365 HISD students were enrolled in Early Education (EE) – grade 12 at the end of the Spring 2018 semester (Table A-1, p. 19). This enrollment number is different from the fall PEIMS snapshot of enrollment taken in October and more closely reflects students available at the end of the school year to attend summer school.

Grades 1 through 12

What was the number of students in grades 1–12 that attended the HISD 2018 summer school program?

A total of 35,388 students in grades 1–12 attended the HISD 2018 summer school program (Table A-2, p. 20) for enrichment (Extended School Year, Campus Enrichment, or Reading Intervention) or failing to meet HISD promotion standards (Grades Only, High Frequency Word Examination Only, or Multiple Standards).

- Based on the 2018 Spring enrollment, grade 3 had the largest proportion of Spring 2018 students enrolled (27 percent) in the 2018 summer school program. In addition to grade 3, five other grades (1, 2, 4, 9 and 10) had at least 20 percent of the Spring 2018 students enrolled in the 2018 summer program (Table A-2 and Figure 1). Grade 12 had the smallest proportion of Spring 2018 students attend the 2018 summer program (5 percent) as most of them graduated and did not need to attend summer school (Figure 1).





Figure 2. Proportion of 2018 Summer School Program Participants by Grade Level

- Of all students enrolled in the 2018 summer school program, the largest proportion of students was in grade 3 (13 percent), followed by grades 1, 2 and 4 (12 percent each). In contrast, the smallest proportion of all students enrolled in the 2018 summer school program was in grade 12 with two percent, followed by grades 6 and 8 (5 percent) (Table A-2; **Figure 2**, p. 6).

What were Lexile scores for students who attended the 2018 summer school program?

 Overall, of the students who were assigned a Lexile score, larger proportions of 2018 summer school students than all Spring 2018 tested students scored at Basic or Below Basic levels. Conversely, smaller proportions tested at Proficient or Advanced levels (Table A-3, p. 21; Figure 3; Figure 4, p. 7).



 A larger proportion of students in grades 1–8 who attended summer school in 2018 scored Below the Basic reading level (81 percent) compared to the proportion of all spring 2018 district students who performed at that level (52 percent) (Figure 3; Table A-3). A smaller proportion (19 percent) of 2018 summer school students in grades 1–8 scored at the Basic, Proficient, and Advanced levels combined when compared to the district proportion at the end of Spring 2018 (48 percent) (Figure 3, p. 6).

- As shown in Figure 4, a larger proportion of students in grades 9–12 who attended the 2018 summer school program performed at the Below Basic reading level (54 percent) when compared to all students in grades 9–12 in Spring 2018 (41 percent).
- A smaller proportion (46 percent) of 2018 summer school students grades 9–12 scored at the Basic, Proficient, and Advanced levels combined when compared to the district proportion at the end of Spring 2018 (59 percent) (Figure 4).

How did the Lexile levels for students in the 2018 summer school program compare to Lexile levels for students in the 2017 summer school program?

- The number of summer school students in grades 1–12 with Lexile scores declined from 33,581 scores for 2017 summer school attendees to 25,915 scores in 2018 (**Table A-4**, p. 22).
- As shown in Figure 5 (p. 8), a larger proportion (81 percent) of 2018 summer school students in grades 1–8 were in the Below Basic reading band when compared to 2017 summer school students in grades 1–8 (45 percent). Although, it should be noted that a different assessment was used to determine Lexile levels between the two years.
- Additionally, a smaller proportion (19 percent) of 2018 summer school students in grades 1–8 scored at the Basic, Proficient, and Advanced levels combined when compared to 2017 summer school students in grades 1–8 (55 percent) (Figure 5).



- As shown in Figure 6, the proportion of students in grades 9–12 with Lexile scores in the Below Basic reading band increased slightly for summer 2018 high school students when compared to summer 2017 high school students.
- The 2018 summer school program had a lower percentage of students in grades 9–12 (30 percent) in the Basic and Proficient reading bands combined when compared to students in grades 9–12 (40 percent) that participated in the 2017 summer school program (Figure 6). However, it should be noted that a different assessment was used to determine Lexile levels between the two years.
- A higher percentage of high school students in the 2018 summer school program (16 percent) were in the Advanced reading band when compared to high school students who participated in the 2017 summer school program (six percent).

Grades 1 through 8

What were the reasons students in grades 1-8 attended the 2018 summer school program?

- There were several reasons outside of being retained that students in grades 1–8 attended the 2018 summer school program. The most prevalent was campus enrichment (28 percent), followed by other (10 percent), and both extended school year and reading intervention accounting for less than one percent of 2018 summer school program participants in grades 1–8 (**Figure** 7; **Table A-5**, p. 23).
- Of the 25,397 summer school attendees in grades 1–8, 15,693 (62 percent) were eligible following being retained at the end of Spring 2018 for not meeting one or more of the 2017–2018 HISD promotion standards (grades only, attendance, multiple standards, and for grades 1 and 2, not passing the High Frequency Word Examination (HFWE) (Figure 7; Table A-5).

What were the demographics of retained students grades 1–8 that attended the 2018 summer school program, and how do these demographics compare to demographics of retained students grades 1–8 that attended the 2017 summer school program?


- The number of students in grades 1–8 that were retained and attended summer school decreased from 19,916 in 2017 to 15,693 in 2018.
- There was little change in the proportion of students who were retained and who attended the 2018 summer school program when compared to students who were retained and attended the 2017 summer school program: gender (1 percentage-point increase in males and complementary 1 percentage-point decrease in females), English Learner (EL) status (1 percentage-point decrease), special education status (half a percentage-point decrease), and Title I status (1 percentage-point decrease from 2017 to 2018) (Figure 8, p. 10; Table A-6, p. 24).
- There was a small increase (one percentage point) in the proportion of African-Americans who were retained and who attended the 2018 summer school program compared to students who were retained and attended the 2017 summer school program and a small change from 2017 to 2018 in the proportion of Hispanic students that were retained and attended the summer school program (1 percentage-point decrease) (Figure 9, p. 10; Table A-7, p. 25).

Based on what promotion standard(s) were students in grades 1–8 eligible for the 2018 summer school program?

- Of students in grades 1–8 who were retained and who attended the 2018 summer school program, 71 percent were retained for not meeting course grade requirements, 21 percent failed to meet multiple standards, six percent did not pass the HFWE (grades 1 and 2 only), and three percent were retained for some other reason (Table A-8, p. 25).




Figure 10. Spring 2018 Students Retained and Attended 2018 Summer School Program, by Grade Level and Reason for Retention

- Grades 3–5 had the largest proportions of students who were retained and attended the 2018 summer school program based only on not meeting the course grade requirements promotion standard (all above 94 percent) (blue band) (Figure 10, p. 11).

- The grade level with the largest proportion of students that did not meet multiple standards in Spring 2018 and attended the 2018 summer school program was grade 1 (45 percent) followed by grade 6 (33 percent), and grade 2 (30 percent) (Figure 10; Table A-8, p. 25).
- Twenty-two (22) percent of students in grade 1 that were retained and attended the 2018 summer school were eligible based on not meeting the High Frequency Word Examination (HFWE) promotion standard, and 15 percent of retained grade 2 students attended the 2018 summer school program based on not meeting the HFWE promotion standard (Figure 10; Table A-8).

How many HISD students in grades 1–8 were promoted or retained following the 2017 and 2018 spring semesters and summer school program?




Figure 11. Promotion Status of Students Spring and Summer, 2017 and 2018, Grades 1-8

• When comparing 2017 to 2018, there was a reduction in the proportion of students in grades 1-8 retained at the end of the spring semester (17 percent and 14 percent, respectively) (**Figure 11**, p. 12).

• Eighty-six (86) percent of Spring 2018 students in grades 1–8 were promoted compared to 83 percent of Spring 2017 students in grades 1–8 (Figure 11). There was an increase from 2017 to 2018 in the proportion of summer school attendees that were promoted following summer school (3 percentage-point increase) (Figure 11). The spring and summer combined total promoted for both 2017 and 2018 was roughly 97 percent for both years (Figure 11).

In 2017 and 2018, several students that were retained at the end of the spring semester and then attended the summer school program had an "unknown" retention status following summer school (919 and 183, respectively).

As shown in Table 1, of all HISD students who were retained at the end of Spring 2018 and attended
the 2018 summer school program, a larger proportion were promoted at the end of the Summer 2018
(87 percent) when compared to students who were retained/attended the 2017 summer school program
(84 percent).



• Including summers, the proportion of students promoted after meeting promotion standards in grades 1–8 increased from 88 percent at the end of the 2016–2017 school year to 94 percent at the end of the

2017–2018 school year (**Figure 12**). The percentage promoted by committee decreased from 9 percent in 2016–2017 to 3 percent in 2017–2018.



What were the outcomes for retained students in Grades 1–8 after participating in the 2018 summer school program?

• Of the students in grades 1–8 who attended the 2018 summer school program, 87 percent of retained students in grades 1–8 were promoted either by meeting the promotion standards or by committee decision (**Figure 13**; **Table A-9**, p. 26). Twelve (12) percent of spring 2018 retained students in grades 1–8 who attended summer school were retained (Figure 13; Table A-9). Data were not available for one percent of spring 2018 retained students in grades 1–8 that attended the 2018 summer school program (Figure 13; Table A-9).

- Of the students in grades 1–8 attending the 2018 summer school program for any reason, 82 percent (n = 20,788) attended summer school at the same campus they were attending at the end of spring 2018, while 18 percent attended a different summer school campus than the campus they attended at the end of spring 2018 (**Figure 14**, **Table A-10**, p. 26).
- Ninety (90) percent or more of summer school students in grades 1–4 and 6–7 attended summer school at the same campus they attended at the end of spring 2018 (Figure 14 and Table A-10) with grades 5 and 8 being the transition grades to the next academic level.
- A list of enrollments for grades 1–8 by spring 2018 campus is presented in Appendix D (pp. 71–109).
 HUB campuses, to serve as host for nearby campuses, were introduced during the 2018 summer school program (Houston Independent School District, 2018b). Enrollment on the designated HUB campuses for grades 1–8 is presented in Appendix E (pp. 110–116).
- Two HUB campuses met or exceeded their projected enrollment: Almeda Elementary School and The Rice School.

How many days of instruction did students in grades 1-8 attend during the 2018 summer school program?

A total of 25,397 students in grades 1–8 attended the 2018 summer school program for any reason. Of those, 20,203 students (80 percent) attended 16–18 days out of a total of 18 instructional days (Table A-11, p. 27). By comparison only 756 students (3 percent) attended five or fewer instructional days (Table A-11).

Grades 9 through Grade 12

What type of courses did students in grades 9–12 take during the 2018 summer school program?

• Of the 9,991 students in grades 9–12 enrolled in the 2018 summer school program, 40 percent were in ninth grade (n = 3,960), 31 percent were in tenth grade (n = 3,086), 24 percent were in eleventh grade (n = 2,358), and six percent were in twelfth grade (n = 587) (**Table A-12**, p. 27).

- Of the total course enrollment (n = 60,280) during the 2018 summer school program, ninth graders took a total of 25,416 courses or 42 percent of all courses, followed by 18,008 courses (30 percent) taken by tenth graders, 13,223 courses (22 percent) taken by eleventh graders, and 3,633 courses (6 percent) taken by twelfth graders (**Table A-13**, p. 27). Students on average took six courses each.
- In the 2018 summer school program, 98 percent of courses taken by students in grades 9–12 were provided through direct instruction while the other two percent of courses had instruction provided through a distance learning provider (Table A-13).
- Of the 2018 summer school courses taken, 47 percent were in core STAAR EOC subject areas and 53 percent were in other subject areas, such as industry classes, physical education, and language courses. Of the STAAR EOC subject areas, English I and English II combined had the highest proportion of course enrollment (23 percent) followed by Biology and Algebra I (both 10 percent), and U. S. History (3 percent) (Table A-14, p. 28).
- During the 2018 summer school program, students in grades 9–12 enrolled in courses that represented
 one of four credit types. Credit Recovery accounted for 78 percent of all course enrollment, followed by
 Not Specified (13 percent), Test Review (6 percent), and Original Credit (3 percent) (Table A-15, p.
 28).


- The content area with the largest proportion of all the Credit Recovery courses was subjects other than EOC subjects (49 percent), followed by English I and English II combined (25 percent), then Algebra I and Biology (both 11 percent), and U. S. History (4 percent) (Figure 15; Table A-15).
- English I and English II combined (56 percent) had the largest proportion of all Test Review course enrollment, followed by Biology (22 percent), and Algebra I (21 percent) (Figure 15; Table A-15).

 Other subjects (58 percent) and English I and English II combined (27 percent) accounted for the two largest proportions of Original Credit course enrollment for students in grades 9–12 during the 2018 summer school program (Figure 15; Table A-15).

How many credits were earned by students attending the 2018 summer school program for grades 9–12?

- Of the total enrollment of 60,280 courses during summer school, a total of 21,323 (35 percent) were recorded as completed (Table A-15; Table A-16, p. 28). Some of the high school summer courses which did not award high school credit were test review courses, which accounted for six percent of the 60,280 courses in which high school students enrolled.
- Of the 21,323 completed courses, one full high school credit was received by students for 20 courses (less than 1 percent), one-half high school credit was earned for 17,465 courses (82 percent), and 3,838 or 18 percent of completed courses had zero credits awarded (Table A-16, p. 28).

Figure 16. Percentage of Summer 2018 Credits Awarded, Grades 9-12



• For the high school credit course enrollments, eleventh graders were associated with the highest percentage of students earning one-half high school credit (88 percent), followed by tenth graders (82 percent), then twelfth graders and ninth graders with 79 percent (**Figure 16**).

How many students attending the 2018 summer school program took a STAAR End of Course (EOC) exam and what were the outcomes?

- A total of 11,923 STAAR EOC exams were administered to the 9,991 students enrolled in grades 9–12 during the 2018 summer school program (**Table A-17**, p. 29).
- The highest proportion of grades 9–12 combined STAAR EOC examinations that met at or above the Approaches Grade Level standard on the June 2018 administration was 41 percent in U. S. History, and the next highest was 32 percent in Algebra I (Table A-17; **Figure 17**, p. 16).

Discussion

The 2018 summer education program allowed students who did not meet the applicable promotion standard the opportunity to successfully meet the requirements for promotion. Promotion standards included: 1) earning 70 percent or higher in course work; 2) for students in grades 1 and 2, achieving a minimum passing score on the High Frequency Word Examination (HFWE); and 3) attendance (90 percent of all instructional days). For the other students, it provided the opportunity to get ahead by taking required courses before the next school year or to receive specialized instruction based on eligibility. A total of 35,388 students attended the HISD 2018 summer school program in grades 1–12. Of this total, 15,693 students in grades 1–8 were eligible for summer school based on being retained in Spring 2018.

The number of students who were retained following the spring semester and attended summer school experienced a decrease in 2018 (n = 15,693) when compared to 2017 (n = 19,916). The Grades Only promotion standard accounted for 71 percent of retained students who attended the 2018 summer school program, followed by 21 percent being retained based on multiple promotion standards, six percent for not passing the HFWE (grades 1 and 2 only), and finally three percent were retained for reasons other than not meeting promotion standards. This decrease in students attending the 2018 summer school program based on being retained could be explained by the Texas Education Agency's (TEA) STAAR promotion standard waiver for grades 5 and 8 based on the instructional disruption resulting from Hurricane Harvey and its aftermath in 2017.

Students in grades 1–8 who were retained and attended the 2018 summer school program had a higher proportion of scores at the Lexile Below Basic reading proficiency band than student scores districtwide at the end of the 2018 Spring semester. Also, students in grades 9–12 that attended the 2018 summer school program had a higher proportion of scores at the Lexile Below Basic reading proficiency band than student scores districtwide at the end of the 2018 Spring semester.

A total of 9,991 students in grades 9–12 attended the 2018 summer school program and took a total of 60,280 courses, for an average of six courses per student. Ninety-eight (98) percent of courses were provided by face-to-face instruction and two percent were provided through distance learning instruction. Additionally, 47 percent of the courses taken were in a STAAR EOC subject area. Following the June 2018 STAAR EOC examination administration, U.S. History had the largest proportion of examinations scored at or above the Approaches Grade Level standard (41 percent) and English II had the smallest proportion of examinations scored at or above the Approaches Grade Level standard.

The 2018 summer school program provided HISD students the opportunity to meet the appropriate grade level promotion standard. Eighty-seven percent of students in grades 1–8 retained in Spring 2018 who then attended the 2018 summer school program, met the appropriate grade level promotion standard. This improved the district's combined spring and summer 2018 promotion rate to 97 percent, similar to the 2017 rate. In addition, the 2018 summer school program provided students in grades 9–12 the opportunity to

earn course credits to meet graduation requirements. 21,323 (35 percent) of the 60,280 courses attempted by high school students had a completion status following 2018 summer school. Increasing summer school course completion is one way to support high school students in meeting graduation requirements.
