Attached is a copy of the 2021–2022 First Semester Student Course Grades report. This report analyzes the grades earned by students in the first semester of the 2019–2020 school year (pre-pandemic), the first and second semesters of the 2020–2021 school year (during widespread school closures and remote learning), and the first semester of the 2021–2022 school year. Grades are reported by student grade level, race/ethnicity, student gender, and special populations including economically disadvantaged, English learner, gifted/talented, special education, and homeless students. Results are further disaggregated by high school level (9th 10th, 11th, and 12th, separately) to ensure students are on track to fulfill high school graduation requirements.

Key findings include:

- Among all students, an increase of four percentage points can be seen for students with one or more “F” grades from pre-pandemic to the current year. The percentage of students with one or more “F” grades was especially high for both grading cycles during widespread school closures and remote learning (2020–2021 school year) but has dropped back down to approximately pre-pandemic rates in the current school year for students in grades 1–8.
- Among high school students, an increase of 15 percentage points can be seen for students with one or more “F” grades from pre-pandemic to the current year. High school students in the current year earned just as many “F” grades this year as campuses return to in-person instruction than they did last year with widespread school closures and remote learning.
- Students of all race/ethnicities earned fewer “F” grades this year as campuses return to in-person instruction than they did last year with widespread school closures and remote learning, and most groups are returning to pre-pandemic rates.
- High school students of all race/ethnicities earned just as many or more “F” grades in the current year than they did in the 2020–2021 school year, and earned substantially more “F” grades in the current school year than they did pre-pandemic.
- Gaps between race/ethnicity groups that existed pre-pandemic have increased substantially in the current year. Hispanic and African American high school students were twice as likely to earn one or more “F” grades in the current grading cycle than White or Asian students.
- Students in all special population subgroups earned fewer “F” grades this year as campuses return to in-person instruction than they did last year with widespread school closures and remote learning. Some subgroups show returns to pre-pandemic rates.
- High school students in all special population subgroups except homeless students earned just as many or more “F” grades this year as campuses return to in-person instruction than they did last year with widespread school closures and remote learning, and earned substantially more “F” grades in the current year than they did pre-pandemic.

- When economically disadvantaged (ED) students are separated by race/ethnicity, significant disparities in students receiving one or more “F” grades can be seen. ED African American students are almost twice as likely to receive one or more “F” grades than ED Asian students.
- The percentage of all students with grades of 75 or above (grades of “A,” “B,” or “C”) was low for both grading cycles (68 percent and 70 percent) during widespread school closures and remote learning (2020–2021 school year) but has increased to slightly higher than pre-pandemic rates in the current school year (79 percent pre-pandemic, 80 percent in the current year).
- High school students in the current year earned substantially more grades of 75 or above this year as campuses return to in-person instruction than they did last year with widespread closures and remote learning, and earned slightly more grades of 75 or above in the current year than they did pre-pandemic.
- All reported student groups (gender, race/ethnicity, and special populations) who earned grades of 75 or above in the current year returned to pre-pandemic rates in the current school year, with the exception of SE students.
- High school students of all race/ethnicities earned substantially more grades of 75 or higher this year as campuses return to in-person instruction than they did last year with widespread school closures and remote learning, and earned about the same percentage of grades of 75 or higher than they did pre-pandemic.
- A gap of 13 percentage points can be seen between Hispanic and White high school students with grades of 75 or above and a gap of 19 percentage points can be seen between Hispanic and Asian high school students in the current year. A gap of 13 percentage points can be seen between African American and White high school students and a gap of 19 percentage points can be seen between African American and Asian high school students in the current year.

Executive Summary

Background

In order to establish a more equitable grading system, the grading trends of the district must be examined. It is equally important to understand how students enrolled in HISD performed academically “pre-pandemic,” during widespread school closures and remote learning, and in the current school year, and to compare the grading trends among students. This report analyzes the grades earned by students in the first semester of the 2019–2020 school year (pre-pandemic), the first and second semesters of the 2020–2021 school year (during widespread school closures and remote learning), and the first semester of the 2021–2022 school year. Grades are reported by student grade level, race/ethnicity, student gender, and special populations including economically disadvantaged, English learner, gifted/talented, special education, and homeless students. Results are further disaggregated by high school level (9th, 10th, 11th, and 12th, separately) to ensure students are on track to fulfill high school graduation requirements.

Highlights

- Among all students, an increase of four percentage points can be seen for students with one or more “F” grades from pre-pandemic to the current year. The percentage of students with one or more “F” grades was especially high for both grading cycles during widespread school closures and remote learning (2020–2021 school year) but has dropped back down to approximately pre-pandemic rates in the current school year for students in grades 1–8.
- Among high school students, an increase of 15 percentage points can be seen for students with one or more “F” grades from pre-pandemic to the current year. High school students in the current year earned just as many “F” grades this year as campuses return to in-person instruction than they did last year with widespread school closures and remote learning.
- Students of all race/ethnicities earned fewer “F” grades this year as campuses return to in-person instruction than they did last year with widespread school closures and remote learning, and most groups are returning to pre-pandemic rates.
- High school students of all race/ethnicities earned just as many or more “F” grades in the current year than they did in the 2020–2021 school year, and earned substantially more “F” grades in the current school year than they did pre-pandemic.
- Gaps between race/ethnicity groups that existed pre-pandemic have increased substantially in the current year. Hispanic and African American high school students were twice as likely to earn one or more “F” grades in the current grading cycle than White or Asian students.
- Students in all special population subgroups earned fewer “F” grades this year as campuses return to in-person instruction than they did last year with widespread school closures and remote learning. Some subgroups show returns to pre-pandemic rates.
- High school students in all special population subgroups except homeless students earned just as many or more “F” grades this year as campuses return to in-person instruction than they did last year with widespread school closures and remote learning, and earned substantially more “F” grades in the current year than they did pre-pandemic.

- When economically disadvantaged (ED) students are separated by race/ethnicity, significant disparities in students receiving one or more “F” grades can be seen. ED African American students are almost twice as likely to receive one or more “F” grades than ED Asian students.
- The percentage of all students with grades of 75 or above (grades of “A,” “B,” or “C”) was low for both grading cycles (68 percent and 70 percent) during widespread school closures and remote learning (2020–2021 school year) but has increased to slightly higher than pre-pandemic rates in the current school year (79 percent pre-pandemic, 80 percent in the current year).
- High school students in the current year earned substantially more grades of 75 or above this year as campuses return to in-person instruction than they did last year with widespread closures and remote learning, and earned slightly more grades of 75 or above in the current year than they did pre-pandemic.
- All reported student groups (gender, race/ethnicity, and special populations) who earned grades of 75 or above in the current year returned to pre-pandemic rates in the current school year, with the exception of special education students.
- High school students of all race/ethnicities earned substantially more grades of 75 or higher this year as campuses return to in-person instruction than they did last year with widespread school closures and remote learning, and earned about the same percentage of grades of 75 or higher than they did pre-pandemic.
- A gap of 13 percentage points can be seen between Hispanic and White high school students with grades of 75 or above and a gap of 19 percentage points can be seen between Hispanic and Asian high school students in the current year. A gap of 13 percentage points can be seen between African American and White high school students and a gap of 19 percentage points can be seen between African American and Asian high school students in the current year.

Introduction

Grading Systems

The purpose of a grading system is to give feedback to students, families, post-secondary institutions, and employers about the skills a student has mastered or the areas where they need more support or practice. Effective grading systems communicate information about learning to help students be proactive, overcome failures, and excel.

There is widespread agreement among measurement specialists that grades, at least in academic subjects, should be based exclusively on measures of current achievement and that growth, ability, effort, conduct, and other non-achievement factors should not be considered. In equitable schools and classrooms, grades are not used as rewards, punishments, or tools to force compliance. Motivation is enhanced when students are provided accurate information about achievement, have clear learning goals, and study in an environment that supports learning by being positive and supportive, not negative or punitive.

An essential practice for educational equity is establishing clear, agreed-upon learning outcomes and defining the criteria for meeting those outcomes. Separating habits of work from academic proficiency ensures that a student's good behavior or work habits cannot mask proficiency, and that a student's poor behavior or work habits cannot mask their attainment of proficiency. Yet research clearly documents the prevalence of the "hodgepodge grade of attitude, effort, and achievement" prevalent in K–12 grades assigned nationwide (Brookhart, 1991). Many teachers blatantly use grades based on factors such as conduct, attitude, or even attendance to control student behavior (Cross and Fray, 1996). Despite the great potential for subjective teacher bias to distort the meaning of grades, it is also recognized that to students, teachers, administrators, and parents there is considerable face validity to grades which includes extraneous factors (Cross and Fray, 1996).

The COVID-19 Pandemic

As COVID-19 seemed to subside in the spring of 2021, many hoped the new school year would bring the opportunity of recovery, both academically and emotionally. This proved not to be the case, with the emergence of the Delta and Omicron variants that forced additional disruptions in student learning. Nearly two years into the COVID-19 pandemic, teachers no longer believe they can bring students to grade-level work by the end of this school year. In a national survey of 630 teachers in December 2021, the Ed Week Research Center found that eight out of ten teachers said fewer of their students this winter are on track to reach grade level than were on track two winters ago (Gerwertz, 2022). At all grade levels, teachers describe a cohort of children who are significantly behind where they would normally be at this time of year.

Studies and reporting throughout the pandemic have shown that students of color and students from low-income families were hardest hit by disruptions to in-person school. A report from McKinsey & Company (Dorn, Hancock, & Sarakatsannis, 2021) demonstrates how these inequities have persisted into the 2021–2022 school year. Overall, students are about four months behind in math and three in reading, compared with similar students in pre-pandemic years, but in schools where more than 75 percent of the students are African American, students are further behind their pre-pandemic peers than in schools where more than 75 percent of the students are White. The same holds true in comparing low-income schools and high-income schools. Furthermore, students from low-income families are 1.6 times more likely to be absent than students from high-income families.

Houston ISD

Even before the COVID-19 pandemic, the grading practices for HISD students appeared to be problematic. Grades assigned to students in HISD appeared to include non-achievement factors and inherent teacher biases. In order to establish a more equitable grading system, the grading trends of the district must be examined. It is equally important to understand how students enrolled in HISD performed academically “pre-pandemic,” during widespread school closures and remote learning, and in the current school year, and to compare the grading trends among students.

This report analyzes the grades earned by students in the first semester of the 2019–2020 school year (pre-pandemic), the first and second semesters of the 2020–2021 school year (during widespread school closures and remote learning), and the first semester of the 2021–2022 school year, as the district attempts to help students, families, and staff recover. The first half of the report compares the percentage of students receiving “F” grades, and the second half of the report compares the percentage of students receiving grades of 75 or above. Grades are reported by student grade level, student gender, race/ethnicity, and special populations including economically disadvantaged, English learner, gifted/talented, special education, and homeless students. Results are further disaggregated by high school level (9th, 10th, 11th, and 12th, separately) in order to more carefully scrutinize the grades obtained by students at those grade levels as they fulfill high school graduation requirements.

Methods

Archived grades assigned for all courses taken in the first semester of the 2019–2020 school year were obtained from Chancery, the Student Information System (SIS) utilized by HISD prior to the 2020–2021 school year, along with student demographics. Grades assigned using a 100-point scale were utilized for this report; letter grades such as “E” (exemplary) and “P” (poor) were not used. Since pre-Kindergarten and Kindergarten students typically do not receive numeric grades, those grade levels were excluded from analysis. When elementary grade levels (grades 1–2 and grades 3–5) did assign numeric grades, those were used. Even when elementary grade levels assign numeric grades for core foundation courses¹, they typically do not assign numeric grades for non-core foundation courses; only those courses for which numeric grades were assigned were utilized for this report.

Grades assigned for all courses taken in the first and second semesters of the 2020–2021 school year and the first semester of the 2021–2022 school year were obtained from PowerSchool, the new SIS utilized by HISD beginning in the fall of the 2020–2021 school year, along with student demographics. As with 2019–2020 data, grades assigned which did not use a 100-point numeric scale were not utilized for this report.

The research questions included in this report were developed with the input of the Curriculum, Federal and State Compliance, and Academics departments. Each section of this report describes all HISD students separated by grade level categories (grades 1–2, grades 3–5, grades 6–8, and grades 9–12), and focuses on high school level students separated by grade level (9th, 10th, 11th, and 12th). High school grade levels are examined separately because of graduation requirements high school students must meet, and to draw attention and invite discussion of the unanticipated results for this group.

¹ Core foundation courses include courses in reading/ELA, mathematics, science, and social studies which are required for graduation; for example, English I is a required course, but “yearbook” is an elective course. Non-core foundation courses include all other courses, such as physical education or fine arts; these courses are required for graduation but are not core foundation courses.

Basic descriptive statistics were employed to analyze the data. The number of students within each group can be found in the tables that accompany figures in Appendices A–E (pp. A-1–E-100). Due to rounding and missing data, some totals may not equal 100 percent, and some subgroups may not equal the total.

Exclusions

Pre-Kindergarten and Kindergarten students who do not typically receive numeric grades were excluded for the purposes of this report. In addition, non-numeric grades were also excluded; this was more typical at the elementary grade levels (grades 1–5) than in secondary grades, particularly for non-core foundation courses.

Data Limitations

HISD implemented the PowerSchool SIS in 2020. The transition to a new SIS caused several data anomalies to surface, which took time to identify and correct. In addition, data had to be interpreted differently than with the Chancery SIS used in prior years. This change in interpretation was not fully realized and implemented until after the start of the 2021–2022 school year; as such, the numbers found in the current report are different from the numbers found in prior grade reports released in the spring and summer of 2021.

Grades for courses typically taken by students in grades 1–8 are not averaged into “semester 1” and “semester 2” final grades, and high school level courses are not averaged into “end of year” final grades. Students in middle school taking a high-school level course (for example, Algebra 1) receive a “semester 1” or “semester 2” average, but only for that specific course. As such, Semester 1 and 2 averages were used for all students/courses for which they were available. If no Semester 1 or 2 average was available, end-of-year, Cycle 2 (2019–2020 school year only), Cycle 3, or Cycle 6 grades were utilized. Prior to the 2020–2021 school year, schools were on either a 6-week or 9-week grading cycle (6-Cycle or 4-Cycle, respectively). As such, an “end of semester” grade for the first semester of the 2019–2020 school year was either a “Cycle 2” grade (for campuses on a 9-week grading cycle) or a “Cycle 3” grade (for campuses on a 6-week grading cycle). As of the 2020–2021 school year, all campuses are on a 6-week, or 6-cycle, grading cycle.


Results

What percentage of students had one or more “F” grades?

Figure 1 (p. 7) shows the percentage of students with one or more “F” grades by grade level category, gender, race/ethnicity, and other special populations for all HISD students for Semester 1 of the 2019–2020 school year (pre-pandemic), Semesters 1 and 2 of the 2020–2021 school year (widespread school closures and remote learning), and Semester 1 of the 2021–2022 school year (current year). Corresponding data can be found in **Table A1** in **Appendix A** (p. A-1).

- The percentage of students with one or more “F” grades was especially high for both grading cycles during widespread school closures and remote learning (2020–2021 school year) but has dropped back down to approximately pre-pandemic rates in the current school year for students in grades 1–8. The percentage of students with one or more “F” grades from pre-pandemic to the current year:
 - **Increased** for all students (four percentage points) and students in grades 6–8 (two percentage points), and
 - **Decreased** for students in grades 1–2 and 3–5 (two percentage points)


Figure 2B (p. 10) shows the percentage of high school students with one or more “F” grades by grade level and race/ethnicity for Semester 1 of the 2019–2020 school year (pre-pandemic), Semesters 1 and 2 of the 2020–2021 school year (widespread school closures and remote learning), and Semester 1 of the 2021–2022 school year (current year). Corresponding data can be found in Table A2 in Appendix A (pp. A-2–A-3).

- Among high school students, an increase of 15 percentage points can be seen for students with one or more “F” grades from pre-pandemic to the current year. The percentage of high school students with one or more “F” grades was especially high for both grading cycles during widespread school closures and remote learning (2020–2021 school year) and has *increased* slightly in the current year to a high of 50 percent of high school students. Further breakdown of high school results can be found in **Figure 2A** (p. 8).
- An increase of six percentage points for female students and three percentage points for male students with one or more “F” grades can be seen from pre-pandemic to the current year. Although the current year percentages are higher for both females and males as compared to the pre-pandemic grading cycle, the current year percentages are lower than either cycle for the 2020–2021 school year.
- Students of all race/ethnicities earned fewer “F” grades this year as campuses return to in-person instruction than they did last year with widespread school closures and remote learning, and most groups are returning to pre-pandemic rates.
 - Hispanic: decreased by as much as nine percentage points from 2020–2021 to current year; increased by five percentage points from pre-pandemic to current year.
 - African American: decreased by as much as seven percentage points from 2020–2021 to current year; increased by six percentage points from pre-pandemic to current year.
 - White: decreased by approximately two percentage points from 2020–2021 to current year; increased by one percentage point from pre-pandemic to current year.
 - Asian: decreased by approximately two percentage points from 2020–2021 to current year; increased by two percentage points from pre-pandemic to current year.
 - “Other” race/ethnicity: decreased by as much as four percentage points from 2020–2021 to current year; returned to pre-pandemic rate of 18 percent.

Figure 1. Percentage of Students with One or More “F” Grades by Grade Level Category, Gender, Race/Ethnicity, and Other Special Populations





- Students in all special population subgroups earned fewer “F” grades this year as campuses return to in-person instruction than they did last year with widespread school closures and remote learning. Some subgroups show returns to pre-pandemic rates.
 - Economically disadvantaged (ED): decreased by as much as eight percentage points from 2020–2021 to the current year but increased six percentage points from pre-pandemic to the current year.
 - English learners (EL): decreased by as much as ten percentage points from 2020–2021 to the current year and increased slightly (two percentage points) from pre-pandemic to current year.
 - Gifted/Talented (GT): decreased by as much as five percentage points from 2020–2021 to the current year but increased by eight percentage points from pre-pandemic to the current year.
 - Special Education (SE) decreased by as much as seven percentage points from 2020–2021 to the current year and increased slightly (one percentage point) from pre-pandemic to the current year.
 - Homeless: decreased by as much as 15 percentage points from 2020–2021 to the current year. Demographic data identifying homelessness was not available in the pre-pandemic grading cycle.

Figure 2A shows the percentage of high school students with one or more “F” grades by grade level and gender for Semester 1 of the 2019–2020 school year (pre-pandemic), Semesters 1 and 2 of the 2020–2021 school year (widespread school closures and remote learning), and Semester 1 of the 2021–2022 school year (current year). Corresponding data can be found in **Table A2** in Appendix A (pp. A-2–A-3).

- High school students in the current year earned just as many “F” grades this year as campuses return to in-person instruction than they did last year with widespread school closures and remote learning, and earned substantially more “F” grades in the current year than they did pre-pandemic,
 - The percentages of high school students at each grade level are relatively flat from the 2020–2021 school year to the current year.
 - Among all high school students, an increase of 15 percentage points can be seen from pre-pandemic to the current year. This increase can be seen at each grade level within high school (9th, 10th, 11th, and 12th grade).
 - The percentage of students with one or more “F” grades decreases as students remain in high school, with a smaller percentage of 12th grade students earning one or more “F” grades (38 percent) as compared to 9th grade students (60 percent).
- Both female and male high school students earned just as many or more “F” grades this year as campuses return to in-person instruction than they did last year with widespread school closures and remote learning. Both groups earned substantially more “F” grades in the current year than they did pre-pandemic:
 - Female: increased by 17 percentage points
 - Male: increased by 13 percentage points
- The percentage of both female and male students with one or more “F” grades decreases as students remain in high school, with a smaller percentage of 12th grade students earning one or more “F” grades as compared to 9th grade students.
 - Female: 55 percent of 9th grade students and 34 percent of 12th grade students
 - Male: 64 percent of 9th grade students and 43 percent of 12th grade students
- The gap between female and male students has decreased in the current year (nine percentage points) from pre-pandemic (13 percentage points).

- High school students of all race/ethnicities earned just as many or more “F” grades this year as campuses return to in-person instruction than they did last year with widespread school closures and remote learning. All groups earned substantially more “F” grades in the current year than they did pre-pandemic:
 - African American: increased by 18 percentage points
 - Hispanic: increased by 16 percentage points
 - Asian and “Other” race/ethnicity: increased by eight percentage points
 - White: increased by four percentage points
- For all race/ethnicity groups, the percentage of students with one or more “F” grades decreases as students remain in high school, with a smaller percentage of 12th grade students earning one or more “F” grades as compared to 9th grade students. Yet there were more than twice as many Hispanic and African American 12th grade students with one or more “F” grades than there were White or Asian 12th grade students with one or more “F” grades, and nearly three times as many Hispanic and African

American 9th grade students with one or more “F” grades than there were Asian 9th grade students with one or more “F” grades.

- Hispanic: 65 percent of 9th grade students and 42 percent of 12th grade students
- African American: 64 percent of 9th grade students and 41 percent of 12th grade students
- White: 31 percent of 9th grade students and 19 percent of 12th grade students
- Asian: 23 percent of 9th grade students and 17 percent of 12th grade students
- “Other” race/ethnicity: 40 percent of 9th grade students and 28 percent of 12th grade students



- Gaps between race/ethnicity groups that existed pre-pandemic have increased substantially in the current year:
 - The gap between Hispanic and White high school students of 17 percentage points pre-pandemic has nearly doubled in the current year to 29 percentage points. Similarly, the gap between African American and White high school students of 15 percentage points pre-pandemic has nearly doubled in the current year to 29 percentage points.
 - The gap between both Hispanic and Asian and African American and Asian high school students was 26 percentage points pre-pandemic and is 34 percentage points in the current year.
- Hispanic and African American high school students were twice as likely to earn one or more “F” grades in the current grading cycle than White or Asian students, with 55 percent of Hispanic and African American students, 26 percent of White students, and 21 percent of Asian students earning one or more “F” grades.

Figure 2C (p. 12) shows the percentage of high school students with one or more “F” grades by grade level and special population subgroups for Semester 1 of the 2019–2020 school year, Semesters 1 and 2 of the 2020–2021 school year, and Semester 1 of the 2021–2022 school year. Corresponding data can be found in Table A2 in Appendix A (pp. A-2–A-3).

- More than half of high school ED (56 percent), EL (66 percent), and SE (51 percent) students, 41 percent of homeless students, and one third of GT students (33 percent) had one or more “F” grades in the current year.
- High school students in all special population subgroups except homeless students earned just as many or more “F” grades this year as campuses return to in-person instruction than they did last year with widespread school closures and remote learning. These groups earned substantially more “F” grades in the current year than they did pre-pandemic:
 - Economically Disadvantaged (ED): increased by 18 percentage points
 - English Learners (EL): increased by 14 percentage points
 - Gifted/Talented (GT): increased by 16 percentage points
 - Special Education (SE): increased by 11 percentage points
- For all special population subgroups, the percentage of students with one or more “F” grades decreases as students remain in high school, with a smaller percentage of 12th grade students earning one or more “F” grades as compared to 9th grade students.
 - ED: 66 percent of 9th grade students and 43 percent of 12th grade students
 - EL: 73 percent of 9th grade students and 54 percent of 12th grade students
 - GT: 37 percent of 9th grade students and 26 percent of 12th grade students
 - SE: 63 percent of 9th grade students and 34 percent of 12th grade students
 - Homeless: 51 percent of 9th grade students and 30 percent of 12th grade students

Figure 2C. Percentage of High School Students with One or More “F” Grades by Grade Level and Special Population





Figure 3 shows the percentage of all students (orange bars) and high school students (yellow bars) of each race/ethnicity group who are also economically disadvantaged and received one or more “F” grades in the current grading cycle. Corresponding tables (**Tables A3–A4**) can be found in Appendix A (pp. A-4–A-6).

- When economically disadvantaged (ED) students are separated by race/ethnicity, significant disparities in students receiving one or more “F” grades can be seen; for example, ED African American students are almost twice as likely to receive one or more “F” grades than ED Asian students.


What percentage of students had one or more “F” grades in the core foundation content areas?

Figure 4 (p. 14) shows the percentage of all students and of high school students with one or more “F” grades by core foundation content area for Semester 1 of the 2019–2020 school year (pre-pandemic), Semesters 1 and 2 of the 2020–2021 school year (widespread school closures and remote learning), and Semester 1 of the 2021–2022 school year (current year). Corresponding tables (**Tables B1(a)–B5(b)**) by core foundation content area can be found in **Appendix B(1)** (pp. B-1–B-40). A descriptive statistics summary can be found in **Appendix B(2)** (pp. B(2)-1–B(2)-5).

- When separated by content area, all students earned fewer “F” grades in all content areas as campuses return to in-person instruction than they did last year with widespread school closures and remote learning. However, the performance of high school students in the current year is closer to that of the 2020–2021 school year and is much higher than pre-pandemic rates compared to all HISD students.
 - The percentage of all students with one or more “F” grades showed a consistent decrease of seven percentage points for all content areas from the 2020–2021 school year to the current year, and increased by two percentage points from pre-pandemic (14 percent) to the current year (16 percent).

- The percentage of high school students with one or more “F” grades decreased one to five percentage points for all content areas from the 2020–2021 school year to the current year and increased eight to 12 percentage points for all content areas from pre-pandemic to the current year.

Tables B1(a)–B5(b) and Figures B-1–B-15(c) (Appendix B(1), pp. B(1)-1–B(1)-40) show the percentages of students with “F” grades for Semester 1 of the 2019–2020 school year, Semesters 1 and 2 of the 2020–2021 school year, and Semester 1 of the 2021–2022 school year for each content area by grade level category, gender, race/ethnicity, and special populations for all students and for high school students disaggregated by grade level. A descriptive statistics summary can be found in **Appendix B(2)** (pp. B(2)-1–B(2)-5).

Grade Levels Categories

- In comparing the percentage of students with one or more “F” grades from the current year to the 2020–2021 school year during widespread school closures and remote learning, and comparing the percentage of students with one or more “F” grades from the current year to pre-pandemic by grade level categories:
 - Students in grades 1–2 and grades 3–5 are doing better in the current year than they were doing in the 2020–2021 school year and are doing about as well or better in the current year as they were pre-pandemic for all content areas.
 - Students in grades 6–8 are doing far better in the current year than they were doing in the 2020–2021 school year and are doing about as well in the current year as they were pre-pandemic for all content areas.
 - High school students overall are doing about the same in all content areas in the current year as they were doing in the 2020–2021 school year, which is far worse than they were doing pre-pandemic.

Gender

- In comparing the percentage of students with one or more “F” grades from the current year to the 2020–2021 school year during widespread school closures and remote learning, and comparing the percentage of students with one or more “F” grades from the current year to pre-pandemic by student gender:

- Both female and male students are doing far better in the current year than they were doing in the 2020–2021 school year and are doing about as well in the current year as they were pre-pandemic for all core foundation content areas, although a large gap can still be seen for non-core foundation courses.
- Both female and male high school students showed decreases in the percentage of students with one or more “F” grades from the 2020–2021 school year to the current school year, with male high school students showing greater decreases as compared to female high school students for all content areas. Both female and male high school students are doing far worse in the current year than they were pre-pandemic for all content areas.

Race/Ethnicity

- In comparing the percentage of students with one or more “F” grades from the current year to the 2020–2021 school year during widespread school closures and remote learning, and comparing the percentage of students with one or more “F” grades from the current year to pre-pandemic by student race/ethnicity:
 - Hispanic students are doing far better in the current year than they were in the 2020–2021 school year and are doing nearly as well in the current year as they were pre-pandemic for all core foundation content areas, although a large gap can still be seen for non-core foundation courses.
 - African American students are doing far better in the current year than they were doing in the 2020–2021 school year but are doing far worse in the current year than they were pre-pandemic for all content areas.
 - White, Asian, and “Other” race/ethnicity students showed very little change during the 2020–2021 school year during widespread school closures and remote learning; as such, these modest changes indicate that these students are doing about the same in the current year as they were pre-pandemic for all content areas.
- In comparing the percentage of high school students with one or more “F” grades from the current year to the 2020–2021 school year during widespread school closures and remote learning, and comparing the percentage of high school students with one or more “F” grades from the current year to pre-pandemic by student race/ethnicity:
 - Hispanic high school students are performing better in the current year than they were in the 2020–2021 school year in all content areas but are much farther away from pre-pandemic rates in all content areas than all Hispanic HISD students.
 - African American high school students are performing better in the current year than they were in the 2020–2021 school year in all content areas but are much farther away from pre-pandemic rates in all content areas than all African American HISD students.
 - White, Asian, and “Other” race/ethnicity high school students showed very little change during the 2020–2021 school year during widespread school closures and remote learning in all content areas; as such, these modest changes indicate that these students are doing about the same in the current year as they were pre-pandemic for all content areas.

Special Populations

- In comparing the percentage of students with one or more “F” grades from the current year to the 2020–2021 school year during widespread school closures and remote learning, and comparing the percentage of students with one or more “F” grades from the current year to pre-pandemic by special population subgroups:
 - ED and EL students are doing far better in the current year than they were in the 2020–2021 school year, showing decreases of five to 11 percentage points for core foundation courses and 15 to 23

- percentage points for non-core foundation courses. Both groups are doing worse in the current year than they were pre-pandemic for all content areas.
- GT and SE students are doing moderately better in the current year than they were in the 2020–2021 school year for core foundation courses, and far better for non-core foundation courses. Both groups are doing about the same in the current year than they were pre-pandemic for all content areas.
 - Homeless students are doing far better in the current year than they were in the 2020–2021 school year, showing decreases of nine to 16 percentage points for all content areas.
- In comparing the percentage of high school students with one or more “F” grades from the current year to the 2020–2021 school year during widespread school closures and remote learning, and comparing the percentage of high school students with one or more “F” grades from the current year to pre-pandemic by special population subgroups:
 - ED, GT, and SE students are doing moderately better in the current year than they were in the 2020–2021 school year, showing decreases of two to seven percentage points for all content areas.
 - EL and homeless students are doing far better in the current year than they were in the 2020–2021 school year, showing decreases of three to 12 percentage points for all content areas.
 - All special population subgroups are doing far worse in the current school year than they were pre-pandemic, showing increases of six to 15 percentage points for all content areas.
 - For all special population groups, the decreases in the percentage of students with one or more “F” grades observed from the 2020–2021 school year to the current year do not negate or balance the increases observed from pre-pandemic to current year.

What percentage of students had one or more “F” grades in each of the content areas at each campus?

The percentage of students with one or more “F” grades assigned at each campus for each content area are reported in **Appendix C (Tables C1–C70)**. Campuses serving students in each grade category were ranked by the percentage of students with one or more “F” grades for each content area and were then assigned a quartile where campuses in Quartile 1 had the highest percentage of students with one or more “F” grades and campuses in Quartile 4 had the lowest percentage of students with one or more “F” grades. Campuses with less than 25 total grades or less than 25 total students were not included. A high-level summary of the appendix is presented in **Table 1**.



What grades did students earn?

Figure 5 shows the percentage of students with all grades earned by grade level category, gender, race/ethnicity, and other special populations for all HISD students for Semester 1 of the 2019–2020 school year (pre-pandemic), Semesters 1 and 2 of the 2020–2021 school year (widespread school closures and remote learning), and Semester 1 of the 2021–2022 school year (current year). Corresponding data can be found in **Tables D1(a)–D1(d)** in **Appendix D** (pp. D-1–D-4).

Figure 5. Percentage of Students with All Grades Earned by Grade Level Category, Student Gender, Race/Ethnicity, and Other Special Populations





- The percentage of all students with grades of 75 or above (grades of “A,” “B,” or “C”) was low for both grading cycles (68 percent 2020–2021 semester 1 and 70 percent 2020–2021 semester 2) during widespread school closures and remote learning but has increased to slightly higher than pre-pandemic rates in the current school year (79 percent pre-pandemic, 80 percent in the current year). The percentage of students with grades of 75 or above:
 - **Increased** slightly for students in grades 1–2 (79 percent pre-pandemic, 81 and 82 percent in 2020–2021, and 81 percent in the current year) and for students in grades 3–5 (78 percent pre-pandemic, 69 and 77 percent in 2020–2021, and 80 percent in the current year); and
 - **Returned to pre-pandemic rates** for students in grades 6–8 (80 percent pre-pandemic, 64 and 67 percent in 2020–2021, and 80 percent in the current year) and for students in grades 9–12 (75 percent pre-pandemic, 65 percent in both semesters of 2020–2021, and 76 percent in the current year).
- All reported student groups (gender, race/ethnicity, and special populations) who earned grades of 75 or above in the current year returned to pre-pandemic rates in the current school year, with the exception of SE students.
 - Sixty-seven percent of SE students had grades of 75 or above pre-pandemic, as compared to 72 percent in the current year – an increase of five percentage points.
- Gaps between race/ethnicity groups that existed pre-pandemic have mostly remained the same or increased in the current year:
 - The gap between Hispanic and White students has remained the same at 13 percentage points and has decreased from 17 percentage points to 15 percentage points for Hispanic and Asian students.
 - The gap between African American and White students has increased from 13 percentage points to 16 percentage points and has increased from 17 percentage points to 18 percentage points for African American and Asian students.

Figure 6A. Percentage of High School Students with All Grades Earned by Grade Level





- High school students in the current year earned substantially more grades of 75 or above this year as campuses return to in-person instruction than they did last year with widespread closures and remote learning and earned slightly more grades of 75 or above in the current year than they did pre-pandemic.
 - All high school students show an increase of 11 percentage points from the 2020–2021 school year to the current year and one percentage point from pre-pandemic to the current year.
 - The percentage of students with grades of 75 or higher increases as students remain in high school, with a larger percentage of 12th grade students earning grades of 75 or higher (82 percent) as compared to 9th grade students (69 percent).

Figure 6B shows the percentage of high school students with all grades earned by grade level and gender for Semester 1 of the 2019–2020 school year, Semesters 1 and 2 of the 2020–2021 school year, and Semester 1 of the 2021–2022 school year. Corresponding data can be found in Table D2(a)–D2(d) in Appendix D, pp. D-5–D-12.

- Both female and male high school students earned substantially more grades of 75 and above this year as campuses return to in-person instruction than they did last year with widespread school

closures and remote learning and earned about the same percentage of grades of 75 or above in the current year than they did pre-pandemic.

- Female high school students showed an increase of eight to nine percentage points from the 2020–2021 school year to the current year and a decrease of two percentage points from pre-pandemic to the current school year.
- Male high school students showed an increase of 11 percentage points from the 2020–2021 school year to the current year and an increase of three percentage points from pre-pandemic to the current school year.
- The percentage of both female and male students with grades of 75 or above increased as students remain in high school, with a larger percentage of 12th grade students earning grades of 75 or above as compared to 9th grade students.
 - Female: 73 percent of 9th grade students and 85 percent of 12th grade students
 - Male: 65 percent of 9th grade students and 80 percent of 12th grade students
- The gap between female and male students has decreased in the current year (seven percentage points) from pre-pandemic (12 percentage points).

Figure 6C (p. 22) shows the percentage of high school students with all grades earned by grade level and race/ethnicity for Semester 1 of the 2019–2020 school year, Semesters 1 and 2 of the 2020–2021 school year, and Semester 1 of the 2021–2022 school year. Corresponding data can be found in Table D2(a)–D2(d) in Appendix D, pp. D-5–D-12.

- High school students of all race/ethnicities earned substantially more grades of 75 or higher this year as campuses return to in-person instruction than they did last year with widespread school closures and remote learning, and earned about the same percentage of grades of 75 or higher than they did pre-pandemic.
 - Hispanic: increased by approximately 11 percentage points from the 2020–2021 school year to the current year and remained the same at 73 percent from pre-pandemic to the current school year.
 - African American: increased by approximately ten percentage points from the 2020–2021 school year to the current year and remained the same at 73 percent from pre-pandemic to the current school year.
 - White: increased by three percentage points from the 2020–2021 school year to the current year and increased by two percentage points from pre-pandemic to the current school year.
 - Asian: increased by approximately three percentage points from the 2020–2021 school year to the current year, and decreased by one percentage point from pre-pandemic to the current school year.
 - “Other” race/ethnicity: increased by approximately four percentage points from the 2020–2021 school year to the current year and decreased by one percentage point from pre-pandemic to the current school year.
- For all race/ethnicity groups, the percentage of students with grades of 75 or above increased as students remain in high school, with a larger percentage of 12th grade students earning grades of 75 or above as compared to 9th grade students.
 - Hispanic: 67 percent of 9th grade students and 81 percent of 12th grade students
 - African American: 65 percent of 9th grade students and 82 percent of 12th grade students
 - White: 84 percent of 9th grade students and 90 percent of 12th grade students
 - Asian: 90 percent of 9th grade students and 93 percent of 12th grade students
 - “Other” race/ethnicity: 80 percent of 9th grade students and 85 percent of 12th grade students

- Gaps between race/ethnicity groups that existed pre-pandemic have remained the same or increased slightly in the current year:
 - The gap between Hispanic and White and between African American and White high school students of 11 percentage points pre-pandemic has increased to 13 percentage points for the current year.
 - The gap between Hispanic and Asian and between African American and Asian high school students of 20 percentage points has decreased to 19 percentage points for the current year.

Figure 6C. Percentage of High School Students with All Grades Earned by Race/Ethnicity



- High school students in all special population subgroups earned substantially more grades of 75 or higher this year as campuses return to in-person instruction than they did last year with widespread school closures and remote learning, and earned about the same or higher percentage of grades of 75 or higher than they did pre-pandemic.


- ED: increased by approximately 11 percentage points from the 2020–2021 school year to the current year and decreased by one percentage point from pre-pandemic to the current school year.
 - EL: increased by approximately 14 percentage points from the 2020–2021 school year to the current year and increased by four percentage points from pre-pandemic to the current school year.
 - GT: increased by approximately eight percentage points from the 2020–2021 school year to the current year and decreased by one percentage point from pre-pandemic to the current school year.
 - SE: increased by approximately seven percentage points from the 2020–2021 school year to the current year and decreased by two percentage points from pre-pandemic to the current school year.
 - Homeless: increased by 15 percentage points from the 2020–2021 school year to the current year.
- For all special population subgroups, the percentage of students with grades of 75 or above increased as students remain in high school, with a larger percentage of 12th grade students earning grades of 75 or above as compared to 9th grade students.

What grades did students earn in core foundation content areas?

Figure 7 (p. 25) shows the percentage of students with all grades earned by all students and by high school students for Semester 1 of the 2019–2020 school year, Semesters 1 and 2 of the 2020–2021 school year, and Semester 1 of the 2021–2022 school year. Corresponding tables (**Tables E1(a)–E10(d)**) by content area can be found in **Appendix E(1)** (pp. E(1)-1–E(1)-100).

- All students earned more grades of 75 or above in all content areas as campuses return to in-person instruction than they did last year with widespread school closures and remote learning.
 - The percentage of all students with grades of 75 or above showed an increase of seven to 13 percentage points for all content areas from the 2020–2021 school year to the current year and showed little changes from pre-pandemic to the current school year.
 - The percentage of high school students with grades of 75 or above showed an increase of six to 14 percentage points for all content areas from the 2020–2021 school year to the current year and showed little changes from pre-pandemic to the current school year.

Grade Level Categories

- In comparing the percentage of students with grades of 75 or higher from the current year to the 2020–2021 school year during widespread school closures and remote learning, and comparing the percentage of students with grades of 75 or higher from the current year to pre-pandemic by grade level categories:
 - Students in grades 1–2 are doing about as well in the current year as they were in the 2020–2021 school year and are doing about as well or better in the current year as they were pre-pandemic for all content areas.
 - Students in grades 3–5 are performing better in the current year than they were in the 2020–2021 school year and are doing about as well or better in the current year as they were pre-pandemic for all content areas.

- Students in grades 6–8 and in grades 9–12 are doing far better in the current year than they were in the 2020–2021 school year and are doing about as well in the current year as they were pre-pandemic for all content areas.

Gender

- In comparing the percentage of students with grades of 75 or above from the current year to the 2020–2021 school year during widespread closures and remote learning, and comparing the percentage of students with grades of 75 or above from the current year to pre-pandemic by student gender:
 - Both female and male students are doing far better in the current year than they were doing in the 2020–2021 school year and are doing about as well in the current year as they were pre-pandemic for all core foundation content areas.
 - Among high school students, both female and male students are doing far better in the current year than they were doing in the 2020–2021 school year. Female high school students showed decreases and male high school students showed increases in the percentage of students with grades of 75 or above from pre-pandemic to the current school year.

Race/Ethnicity

- In comparing the percentage of students with grades of 75 or above from the current year to the 2020–2021 school year during widespread school closures and remote learning, and comparing the percentage of students with one or more “F” grades from the current year to pre-pandemic by student race/ethnicity:
 - Hispanic and African American students are doing far better in the current year than they were in the 2020–2021 school year and are doing about as well as they were pre-pandemic for all content areas.
 - White, Asian, and “Other” race/ethnicity students showed very little change in the percentage of students with grades of 75 or above during the 2020–2021 school year during widespread school closures and remote learning; as such, these modest changes indicate that these students are doing about the same in the current year as they were pre-pandemic for all content areas.
- In comparing the percentage of high school students with grades of 75 or above from the current year to the 2020–2021 school year during widespread school closures and remote learning, and comparing the percentage of high school students with grades of 75 or higher from the current year to pre-pandemic by student race/ethnicity:
 - Hispanic high school students are doing far better in the current year than they were in the 2020–2021 school year and are doing about as well as they were pre-pandemic for all content areas.
 - African American high school students are doing far better in the current year than they were in the 2020–2021 school year and are performing slightly worse in the current year as they were pre-pandemic for all content areas.
 - White and Asian high school students are doing about the same in the current year as they were in the 2020–2021 school year, which was about the same as they had performed pre-pandemic, for all content areas.
 - “Other” race/ethnicity high school students are doing about the same in the current year as they were in the 2020–2021 school year except for social studies and non-core foundation courses. For these content areas, “Other” race/ethnicity high school students are doing far better in the current year than they performed during the 2020–2021 school year. For all content areas except social studies, “Other” race/ethnicity high school students performed about the same as they had pre-pandemic; for social studies, this group is performing at a higher rate.

Special Populations

- In comparing the percentage of students with grades of 75 or above from the current year to the 2020–2021 school year during widespread school closures and remote learning, and comparing the percentage of students with grades of 75 or above from the current year to pre-pandemic by special population subgroups:
 - ED, EL, and GT students are doing about the same in the current year as they were pre-pandemic and are performing far better in the current year than they did in the 2020–2021 school year.
 - SE students are performing far better in the current year than they were pre-pandemic than they did in the 2020–2021 school year.
 - Homeless students are performing far better in the current year than they did in the 2020–2021 school year.
 - ED and GT high school students are doing about the same in the current year as they were pre-pandemic and are performing far better in the current year than they did in the 2020–2021 school year.
 - EL and SE high school students are performing far better in the current year than they were pre-pandemic for all content areas except reading/ELA and are performing far better in the current year than they did in the 2020–2021 school year in all content areas.
 - Homeless high school students are performing far better in the current year than they did in the 2020–2021 school year.

Conclusion

By documenting changes in student grades pre-pandemic, during widespread closures and remote learning due to the COVID-19 pandemic, and as campuses return to face-to-face instruction in the current school year, this report in part demonstrates how the COVID-19 pandemic has impacted Houston ISD students. The percentage of all students with one or more “F” grades pre-pandemic was 28 percent, as compared to 40 percent in the 2020–2021 school year – an increase of as much as 12 percent. Furthermore, while there was a decline for the current school year to 32 percent, this is still higher than the percentage of students earning one or more “F” grades pre-pandemic. The story on course failures changes when examining high school students. The percentage of high school students with one or more “F” grades pre-pandemic was 35 percent, as compared to 49 percent in the 2020–2021 school year – an increase of as much as 14 percent, which is similar to students across all grade levels. But the recovery seen by all students is not evident among high school students. Instead of the expected decline from the 2020–2021 school year to the current year, we instead see the percentage of high school students with one or more “F” grades increase to 50 percent for the current year – an increase of one percentage point from the 2020–2021 school year and an increase of 15 percentage points from pre-pandemic. This increase in course failures, both for all students and for high school students, is not exclusive to one or two content areas; instead, it is evident in all content areas for all district students of all grade level categories.

Although students earned a higher percentage of “F” grades in the current year than they did pre-pandemic, grades of 75 or higher have returned to pre-pandemic rates for all students and for high school students. Furthermore, this remains true when separated by content area; for all five content areas, the percentage of students earning grades of 75 or above is the same or similar to pre-pandemic, for all district students of all grade level categories.

When compared to students at other grade level categories or to all students in the district, high school students earn a higher percentage of “F” grades and a lower percentage of grades of 75 or above overall and by content area. In addition, high school students are much farther away from pre-pandemic rates for all content areas than students across all grade levels. In some cases, high school students performed better during the 2020–2021 school year during widespread school closures and remote learning than they performed in the current year.

The documentation and examination of student grades also serves as an opportunity to identify and address areas of inequity, structural racism, and implicit bias, which unfortunately are prevalent and obvious throughout this report. Inequity is quite simply defined as a lack of fairness or justice. Structural racism is a system in which public policies, institutional practices, cultural representations, and other norms work in various, often reinforcing ways to perpetuate racial group inequity; it is not something that a few people or institutions chose to practice, but instead has been a feature of the social, economic, and political systems in which we all exist. Implicit bias describes having attitudes towards people or associating stereotypes with them without conscious knowledge. With these definitions in mind, refer to the findings reported in Figure 3 of this report, which shows the percentage of students receiving “F” grades by economically disadvantaged status and race/ethnic group. High school students who are both economically disadvantaged and African American or Hispanic are almost twice as likely to receive one or more “F” grades than high school students who are both economically disadvantaged and Asian or White. This finding is both disheartening and disappointing for district personnel of all types (administrators, teachers, and campus personnel alike), but not as discouraging or as oppressive as it is for the students in the district.

Additional areas of inequity are pervasive throughout this report:

- Superficially, it appears as though the percentages of Hispanic and African American students with one or more “F” grades appear to be returning to pre-pandemic rates. But a closer examination reveals that the percentages of Hispanic and African American students with one or more “F” grades was, and still is, considerably higher than those of their White and Asian peers. For example, from pre-pandemic to the current year, Hispanic students show an increase of two percentage points in the percentage of students with one or more “F” grades for reading/ELA; this change is from 15 percent pre-pandemic to 17 percent for the current year. White students, on the other hand, show no change in the percentage of students with one or more “F” grades for reading/ELA; this subgroup remained flat at six percent. This is a gap of 11 percentage points between Hispanic and White reading/ELA students.
- The percentage of male high school students with grades of 75 or higher (grades of A, B, or C) appears to be not only returning to but exceeding pre-pandemic rates. But further exploration reveals that the percentage of male high school students with grades of 75 or higher was, and still is, considerably lower than their female peers. For example, from pre-pandemic to the current year, male high school students show a one percentage point increase in the percentage of students with grades of 75 or higher for reading/ELA; this change is from 67 percent pre-pandemic to 68 percent for the current year. Female high school students, on the other hand, show a decrease of three percentage points; this change is from 80 percent pre-pandemic to 77 percent for the current year. Although female students had a larger decrease in the percentage of grades of 75 or above than the increase seen for male students, there is a gap of nine percentage points between male and female high school reading/ELA students.
- The percentage of high school English Learners (ELs) with grades of 75 or above in the current year as compared to pre-pandemic for all content areas has increased by one to seven percentage points. While this is indeed good news, both the starting (pre-pandemic) and ending (current year) percentages are still very low for this special population. For example, high school ELs had an increase in the percentage of students with grades of 75 or above in math of three percentage points, from 53 percent pre-pandemic to 56 percent, or *just over half of students*, in the current year.
- Campuses were placed into quartiles based on the percentage of students with one or more “F” grades by student grade level category and content area. For all grade level categories and content areas, the percentage of students with “F” grades at schools in the top quartile were much higher than those in the bottom quartile. Schools typically stayed in the same quartile across subjects. Further examination of the schools in the top and bottom quartiles is recommended to investigate differences in the racial and special population makeup of campuses in these quartiles.

Monitoring student grades with reports like this one should continue. Other topics that merit further exploration include:

- Comparisons of course grades earned to the corresponding STAAR and STAAR-EOC performance levels;
- Grade distributions in critical courses like 3rd grade reading, Algebra I, and English II; and
- Further examination of the distribution of grades at campuses with very high and very low failure rates to investigate differences in the racial and special population makeup of these campuses.



Figure B1. Percentage of Students with One or More “F” Grades for Reading/ELA by Grade Level



Figure B2. Percentage of All HISD Students with One or More “F” Grades in Reading/ELA by Gender, Race/Ethnicity, and Special Populations



by Grade Level and Race/Ethnicity**





Figure B4. Percentage of Students with One or More “F” Grades for Mathematics by Grade Level



Figure B5. Percentage of All HISD Students with One or More “F” Grades in Mathematics by Gender, Race/Ethnicity, and Special Populations



Grades in Mathematics by Grade Level and Gender**



Grade Level and Race/Ethnicity





Figure B7. Percentage of Students with One or More “F” Grades for Science by Grade Level



Figure B8. Percentage of All HISD Students with One or More “F” Grades in Science by Gender, Race/Ethnicity, and Special Populations



Grade Level and Race/Ethnicity**





Figure B10. Percentage of Students with One or More “F” Grades for Social Studies by Grade Level



Figure B11. Percentage of All HISD Students with One or More “F” Grades in Social Studies by Gender, Race/Ethnicity, and Special Populations



Figure B12(b). Percentage of High School Students with One or More “F” Grades in Social Studies by Grade Level and Race/Ethnicity





Figure B13. Percentage of Students with One or More “F” Grades in Non-Core Foundation Content Areas by Grade Level





Figure B15(a). Percentage of High School Students with One or More “F” Grades in Non-Core Foundation Courses by Grade Level and Gender



Figure B15(b). Percentage of High School Students with One or More “F” Grades in Non-Core Foundation Courses by Grade Level and Race/Ethnicity



 - The percentage of students with one or more “F” grades in grades 1–2 decreased for reading/ELA (four percentage points) and math (one percentage point), remained flat for social studies (four percent), and increased for science (one percentage point).
 - The percentage of students in grades 3–5 decreased for reading/ELA (two percentage points) and math (one percentage point) and remained flat for science (four percent) and social studies (three percent).
 - The percentage of students with one or more “F” grades in grades 6–8 remained flat for science (ten percent) and social studies (11 percent) and increased for non-core foundation courses (five percentage points) and reading/ELA and math (one percentage point each).
 - The percentage of students in grades 9–12 increased eight to 12 percentage points for all content areas from pre-pandemic to the current year. 

Figure E1. Percentage of Students with All Grades Earned for Reading/ELA by Grade Level



Figure E2. Percentage of Students with All Grades Earned for Reading/ELA by Gender






Figure E3(b). Percentage of High School Students with All Grades Earned for Reading/ELA by Race/Ethnicity, Continued




Figure E4(a). Percentage of All Students with All Grades Earned for Reading/ELA by Special Populations








Figure E5. Percentage of Students with All Grades Earned for Mathematics by Grade Level

Figure E6. Percentage of Students with All Grades Earned for Mathematics by Gender




Figure E7(a). Percentage of All Students with All Grades Earned for Mathematics by Race/Ethnicity



Figure E7(b). Percentage of High School Students with All Grades Earned for Mathematics by Race/Ethnicity, Continued



Figure E8(a). Percentage of All Students with All Grades Earned for Mathematics by Special Populations








Figure E9. Percentage of Students with All Grades Earned for Science by Grade Level

Figure E10. Percentage of Students with All Grades Earned for Science by Gender




Figure E11(a). Percentage of All Students with All Grades Earned for Science by Race/Ethnicity



Figure E11(b). Percentage of High School Students with All Grades Earned for Science by Race/Ethnicity, Continued




Figure E12(a). Percentage of All Students with All Grades Earned for Science by Special Populations







Figure E13. Percentage of Students with All Grades Earned for Social Studies by Grade Level

Figure E14. Percentage of Students with All Grades Earned for Social Studies by Gender




Figure E15(a). Percentage of All Students with All Grades Earned for Social Studies by Race/Ethnicity



Figure E15(b). Percentage of High School Students with All Grades Earned for Social Studies by Race/Ethnicity, Continued




Figure E16(a). Percentage of All Students with All Grades Earned for Social Studies by Special Populations






Figure E17. Percentage of Students with All Grades Earned for Non-Core Foundation Courses by Grade Level

Figure E18. Percentage of Students with All Grades Earned for Non-Core Foundation Courses by Gender




Figure E19(a). Percentage of All Students with All Grades Earned for Non-Core Foundation Courses by Race/Ethnicity



Figure E19(b). Percentage of High School Students with All Grades Earned for Non-Core Foundation Courses by Race/Ethnicity




Figure E20(a). Percentage of All Students with All Grades Earned for Non-Core Foundation Courses by Special Populations



- Grade level categories show variations in the percentage of students with grades of 75 or above from pre-pandemic to the current year.
 - The percentage of students in grades 1–2 increased for math (two percentage points) and reading/ELA (one percentage point) and remained flat for science (88 percent) and social studies (87 percent).
 - The percentage of students in grades 3–5 with grades of 75 or above increased for reading/ELA and math (two percentage points each) and for social studies (one percentage point) and remained flat for science (86 percent).
 - The percentage of students in grades 6–8 increased for reading/ELA, math, and social studies (one percentage point each), remained flat for science (77 percent), and decreased non-core foundation courses (one percentage point).
 - The percentage of students in grades 9–12 with grades of 75 or above increased for social studies (two percentage points) and math and science (one percentage point each), remained flat for non-core foundation courses (82 percent), and decreased for reading/ELA (two percentage points). Variations were found for high school grade levels (grade 9, grade 10, grade 11, and grade 12), with some grade levels showing increases and others showing decreases within the same content area. Overall, grades 10 and 12 showed consistent increases, while grades 9 and 11 showed both increases and decreases across content areas.

- From the second semester of the 2020–2021 school year to current year, most grade level categories show increases in the percentage of students with grades of 75 or above.
 - The percentage of students in grades 1–2 increased for science (one percentage point), remained flat for social studies (87 percent), and decreased for reading/ELA (two percentage points) and math (three percentage points).
 - The percentage of students in grades 3–5 with grades of 75 or above increased for social studies (seven percentage points), science (six percentage points), math (three percentage points), and reading/ELA (two percentage points).
 - The percentage of students in grades 6–8 increased for reading/ELA (18 percentage points), non-core foundation courses (16 percentage points), science and social studies (13 percentage points each), and math (ten percentage points).
 - The percentage of students in grades 9–12 with grades of 75 or above increased for non-core foundation courses (13 percentage points), reading/ELA (ten percentage points), science and social studies (nine percentage points each), and math (five percentage points). All high school grade levels showed increases for all content areas.

Gender

- Student gender shows variation in the percentage of students with grades of 75 or above from pre-pandemic to the current year.
 - The percentage of female students remained flat for reading/ELA (79 percent), math (73 percent), science (82 percent), and social studies (83 percent) and decreased for non-core foundation courses (two percentage points).
 - The percentage of male students with grades of 75 or above increased for all core foundation courses (one to two percentage points) and remained flat for non-core foundation courses.
- From the second semester of the 2020–2021 school year to current year, both genders show increases in the percentage of students with grades of 75 or above.
 - The percentage of female students increased for all content areas by four to 12 percentage points, with the highest increases seen for non-core foundation courses.
 - The percentage of male students with grades of 75 or above increased for all content areas by four to 14 percentage points, with the highest increases seen for non-core foundation courses.
- Among high school students, female students show decreases and male students show increases in the percentage of students with grades of 75 or above from pre-pandemic to the current year.
 - The percentage of female high school students decreased by one to three percentage points for all content areas. Within high school grade levels, there were none that showed consistent increases or decreases, although reading/ELA and non-core foundation courses showed consistent decreases across high school grade levels for female students.
 - The percentage of male high school students with grades of 75 or above increased by one to four percentage points for all content areas. Within high school grade levels, male students in grades 9 and 10 showed consistent increases for all content areas, and male students in grades 11 and 12 remained flat or showed increases for all content areas.

 - The percentage of Hispanic high school students with grades of 75 or above increased for non-core foundation courses (15 percentage points), reading/ELA, science, and social studies (11 percentage points each), and math (six percentage points).
 - The percentage of African American high school students with grades of 75 or above increased for non-core foundation courses (12 percentage points), reading/ELA (11 percentage points), social studies (ten percentage points), science (seven percentage points), and math (four percentage points).
 - The percentage of White high school students with grades of 75 or above increased for reading/ELA and non-core foundation courses (three percentage points each), social studies (two percentage points), and science (one percentage point), and decreased for math (one percentage point).
 - The percentage of Asian high school students with grades of 75 or above increased for science and social studies (two percentage points each), reading/ELA (four percentage points), and non-core foundation courses (five percentage points) and remained flat for math (88 percent).
 - The percentage of “Other” race/ethnicity high school students with grades of 75 or above increased for science (three percentage points), reading/ELA (four percentage points), non-core foundation courses (six percentage points), and social studies (nine percentage points) and decreased for math (two percentage points).

Special Populations

- Special populations show variations in the percentage of students with grades of 75 or higher from pre-pandemic to the current year.
 - ED students show decreases for social studies (one percentage point) and non-core foundation courses (two percentage points), remained flat for reading/ELA (72 percent) and science (77 percent), and show an increase of one percentage point for math.
 - ELs show increases of zero to three percentage points for all content areas.
 - GT students show decreases of one to three percentage points for all content areas.
 - SE students show increases of three to eight percentage points for core foundation courses and remained flat for non-core foundation courses.

- From the 2020–2021 school year to the current year, all special populations show increases in the percentage of students with grades of 75 or higher.
 - ED students show increases of five to nine percentage points for core foundation courses and an increase of 15 percentage points for non-core foundation courses.
 - ELs show increases of four to seven percentage points for core foundation courses and an increase of 17 percentage points for non-core foundation courses.
 - GT students show increases of four to six percentage points for core foundation courses and an increase of ten percentage points for non-core foundation courses.
 - SE students show increases of one to five percentage points for core foundation courses and an increase of nine percentage points for non-core foundation courses.
 - Homeless students show increases of 12 to 16 percentage points for all content areas.

- Among high school students, all special populations show variations in the percentage of students with grades of 75 or higher from pre-pandemic to the current year.
 - High school ED students show decreases for non-core foundation courses (two percentage points) and math and science (one percentage point each) and show increases for social studies (one percentage point) and reading/ELA (three percentage points).
 - High school ELs show a decrease for reading/ELA (one percentage point) and increases for all other content areas (three to seven percentage points).
 - High school GT students remained flat for science (85 percent) and show decreases for reading/ELA and math (two percentage points each) and social studies and non-core foundation courses (one percentage point each).
 - High school SE students show increases of two to five percentage points for all content areas.

- From the 2020–2021 school year to the current year, all high school special populations show increases in the percentage of students with grades of 75 or higher.
 - High school ED students show increases of six to 14 percentage points for all content areas.
 - High school ELs showed increases of six to 18 percentage points for all content areas.
 - High school GT students show increases of five to nine percentage points for all content areas.
 - High school SE students show increases of zero to six percentage points for core foundation courses and an increase of nine percentage points for non-core foundation courses.
 - High school homeless students show increases of 14 to 18 percentage points for all content areas.
