Summer Reading Assignment

AP Language and Composition

Advanced Placement Language and Composition (AP Lang) focuses on nonfiction, including books about real—life topics such as history, biography, science, music, art, sports, movies, politics, philosophy, and lifestyle. To prepare for this class, I encourage you to read nonfiction this summer. There is one text on the list below that is a fictional narrative/novel, but is framed by nonfictional content.

Select at least one book that you can read and comprehend comfortably on your own. When selecting a book, use the 5-finger rule: open the book to a random full page. Read the page. While reading, hold up a finger for every unfamiliar or unknown word. The book is right for the reader if the reader is holding up 2 or 3 fingers—1 finger indicates no challenge, and 4 might be too much of a stretch. You can preview many of these texts online before making a purchase.

The content of the book must also be suitable for you. Because AP Lang is, in many respects, a college-level class, you should read books about **important issues** that adults face, but if some adult content is uncomfortable for you to read about, don't read about those issues. Sometimes the content, or maybe the style or word choice, makes a book unreadable. If a book becomes overwhelming, select another book.

You can choose from this list on the second page, **OR** you can choose a different book that is on this list

on Goodreads. Please TRY to obtain and read a hard copy of your book(s).

 Many of these books should be available at your local library or through the <u>Libby</u> app, which lets you read ebooks and audiobooks from your local library. You may also purchase a copy of your own.

 With a Spotify Premium subscription, you can listen to 15 hours of audiobooks each month, with a catalog of over 200,000 audiobooks. Any unused listening time expires at the end of each month and doesn't carry over to the next.



While you read, keep a quote log. Select <u>three important/interesting quotes</u> in the book: one from the <u>beginning</u>, one from the <u>middle</u>, and one from the <u>end</u>. Cite and record the quote, along with its corresponding page number. Bring the quotes to class on the <u>second day we meet</u>.

- You have the option to read more than one of these books if you wish. If you read a second book and collect three quotes from it, I will award you +3 points on an assignment of your choice. Additionally, if you read a third book and collect three quotes from it, I will award you +6 points on assignments of your choice.
 - This does not apply to quizzes, major grades, or projects; it only applies to in-class and homework assignments.
