The Superior Instructor competition is a component of the overall score for the Superintendent's Cup, and cadets earn a ribbon and arch for their uniforms. Four cadets from each program in the Houston ISD must teach three approved classes to fully compete. The first two classes are graded by the school's Senior Army Instructor where the cadets earn a ribbon. The final class is taught in front of Director of Army Instruction from HISD and is measured against a rubric where programs earn points for their teams. Last year, the Black Knights performed quite well being one of the top three programs in this competition. This year, the goal is to be the absolute best in this competition, and at the same time inspire the next crop of student instructors to want to lead the way. The Black Knights will formally compete on February 27, 2023.

THE HONORABLE SILVIA GARCIA INTERVIEWS C/LTC JIMENEZ



In the final stages of securing an appointment to the United States Military Academy at West Point, Cadet Lieutenant Erik Jimenez did a face-to-face interview via Zoom with District #29's House of Representatives member, the Honorable Silvia Garcia. She asked him why he wanted to serve in the U.S. Army as an officer and how did he learn about this path. He responded, "As a freshman, I was placed in JROTC, but I grew to like the course. During my sophomore year, our instructor explained there was a military college that focused on engineering and academic excellence. So, I wanted to earn this appointment since my 10th grade year." Erik is now waiting to learn if he has been accepted into the university. The congresswoman was pleased to see a young person so focused and poised knowing what he wants to do once he leaves his high school.
