SUBJECT: **COLLEGE ENROLLMENT OF HISD GRADUATES – NATIONAL STUDENT CLEARINGHOUSE DATA**

This report provides an analysis of the data available from the National Student Clearinghouse (NSC) based on the August 15, 2014 snapshot that includes historical information of the college enrollment in the fall immediately following graduation and within one year of graduation from HISD high schools during the period 2005-2013. District-level results are disaggregated by ethnic groups, gender, and socio-economic status. Campus-level summaries are included in **Appendices A and B**.

National Student Clearinghouse Data

In 2009, HISD started a subscription to the StudentTrackerSM service offered by the National Student Clearinghouse (NSC), a non-profit organization that is the nation's largest source for secondary and post-secondary student degree, diploma and enrollment verification. Previously, HISD relied exclusively on the annual reporting of the college enrollment of high school graduates in higher education institutions provided by the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board (THECB). Unfortunately, the THECB data suffers from several drawbacks:

- tracks only enrollment in Texas institutions,
- relies heavily on student social security numbers and other PEIMS data for matching purposes that fails to track the enrollment of undocumented students, and
- does not track enrollment beyond the fall immediately following student graduation.

StudentTrackerSM data enables administrators in school districts to access the NSC records on over 137 million students, which represent postsecondary enrollments and achievements nationwide. NSC maintains records on behalf of more than 3,500 public and private colleges and universities that enroll over 98 percent of the students in higher education. These institutions have authorized NSC to provide this information to high schools and school districts in order to help them improve their educational programs. However, it should be noted that while StudentTrackerSM offers vastly improved data quality compared to the THECB results, not all graduates are found through this service, and the results therefore represent the best estimates of college-enrollment of the high school graduates.

NSC Results

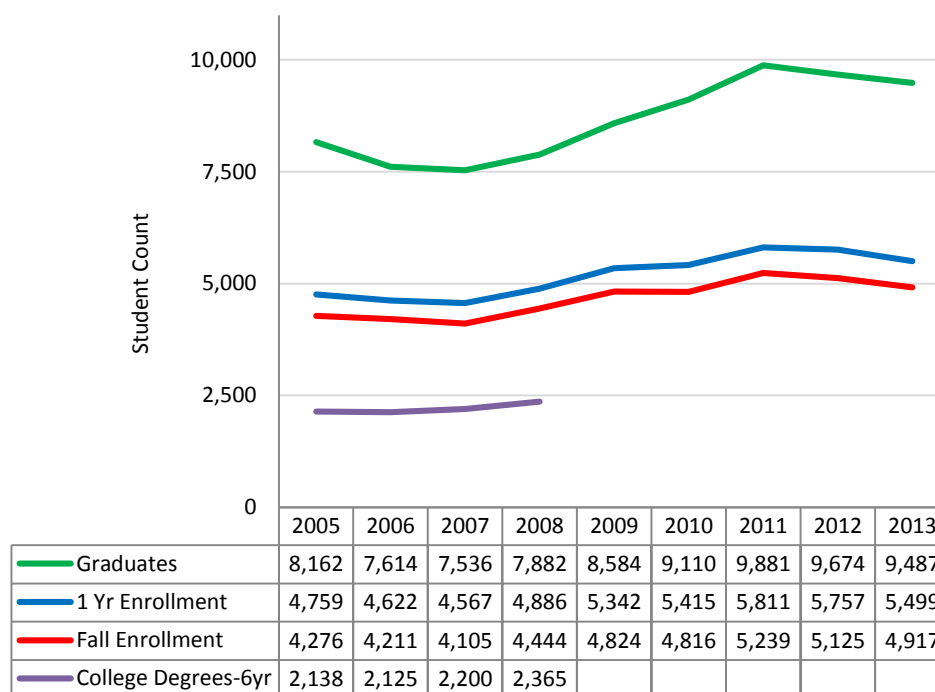


Figure 1 indicates the following:

The NSC results are shown in **Figures 1-14, Table 1, and Appendices A and B**:

Figure 1 shows the total number of HISD graduates and the number enrolled in college in the fall and within one year after graduation for the period 2005-2013.

- The number of high school graduates increased by 1,325 (16.2 percent) in 2013 compared to 2005.
- The number of high school graduates enrolled in college based on the fall data increased by 641 (15 percent) during the same period.
- The fall enrollment at 4,917 in the class of 2013 increased by 582 (11.8 percent) to 5,499 during the spring and summer.
- The one-year enrollment increased by 740 (15.5 percent) from 4,759 for the class of 2005 to 5,499 for the class of 2013.
- The number of college degrees awarded within six years after graduation from high school increased by 227 (10.6 percent) from 2,138 for the class of 2005 to 2,365 for the class of 2008.
- The number of college degrees awarded within six years after graduation from high school increased by 165 (7.5 percent) from 2,200 for the class of 2007 to 2,365 for the class of 2008.

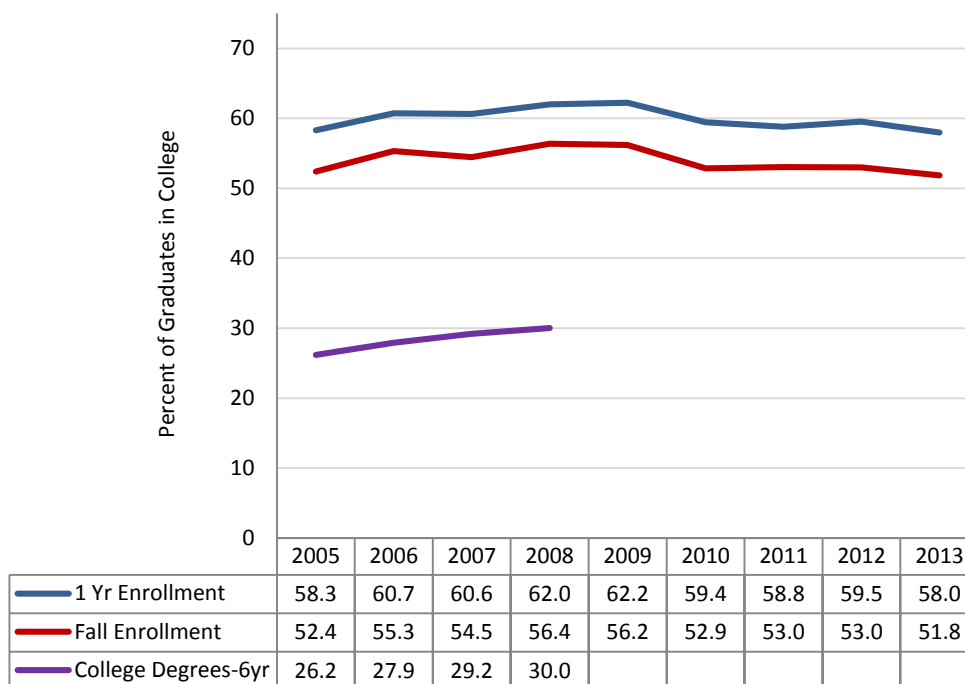


Figure 2 indicates the following:

Figure 2 shows the college-enrollment data as the percent of graduates.

- The one-year enrollment in college decreased from 58.3 percent in 2005 to 58.0 percent in 2013 but has varied across time.
- The one-year enrollment decreased from 59.5 percent in 2012 to 58 percent in 2013.
- Notably, the one-year enrollment peaked at 62.2 percent in 2009 and has trended downward since then.
- The data from 2005 to 2013 indicates that the college enrollment increases by an average of 6.1 percentage points from the fall semester to the following spring and summer semesters.
- The rate of college degrees earned within six years after high school graduation increased from 26.2 percent for the class of 2005 to 30.0 percent for the class of 2008.
- The rate of college degrees earned within six years after high school graduation increased from 29.2 percent for the class of 2007 to 30.0 percent for the class of 2008.

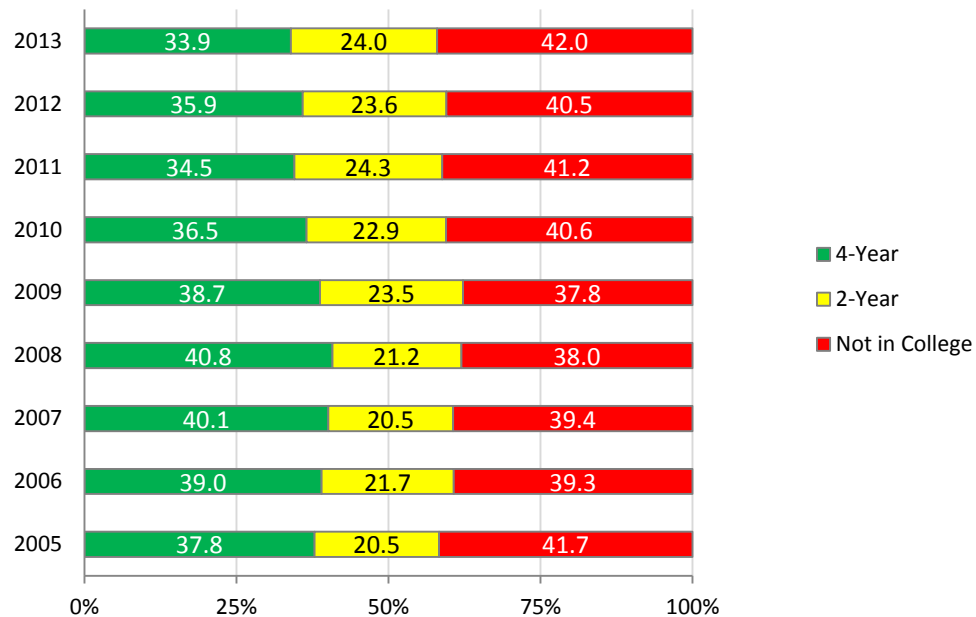


Figure 3 indicates the following:

Figure 3 shows the distribution of the enrollment of graduates by college-type, i.e., by 2-year and 4-year institutions.

- As the number of graduates and the number enrolled in college increased from 2005 to 2013, the HISD graduates enrolled in 4-year institutions declined from 37.8 percent in 2005 to 33.9 percent in 2013, while the enrollment in 2-year institutions increased from 20.5 percent to 24.0 percent during the same period.
- Notably, the percent of students attending a 2-year institution showed an increase of 0.4 percentage points in 2013 compared to 2012 while the enrollment in 4-year institutions declined by 2 percentage points.

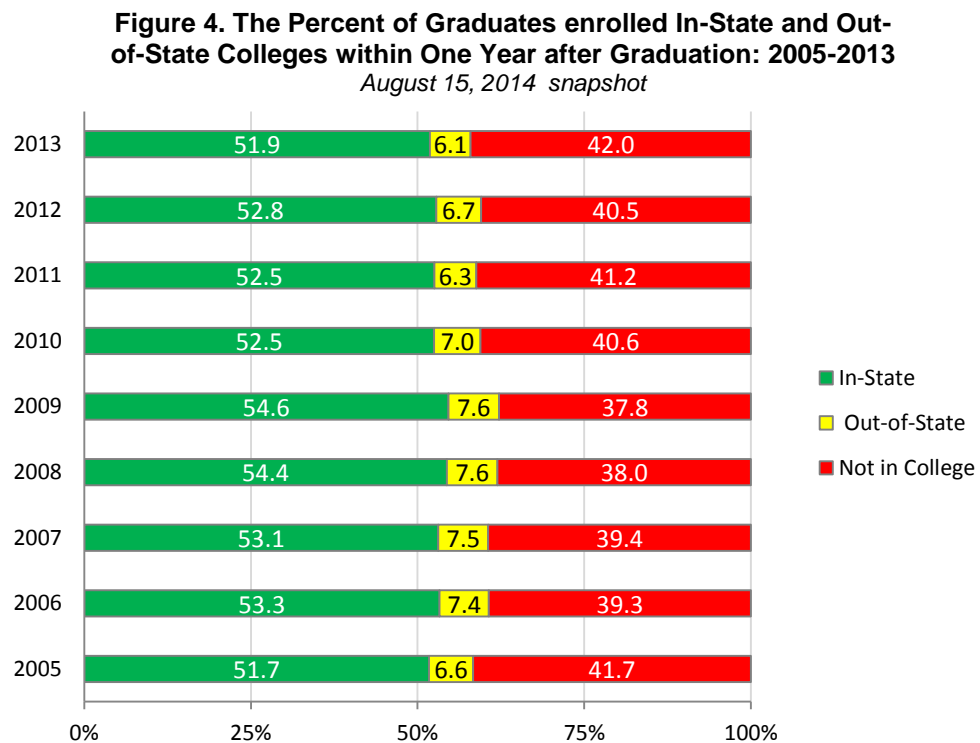


Figure 4 indicates the following:

Figure 4 shows the distribution of the enrollment of graduates by in-state or out-of-state institutions.

- As the number of graduates and the number enrolled in college increased from 2005 to 2013, the HISD graduates enrolled in Texas institutions increased from 51.7 percent in 2005 to 51.9 percent in 2013.
- The enrollment in out-of-state institutions peaked for the class of 2008 and 2009 at 7.6 percent and declined to 6.1 percent in 2013.

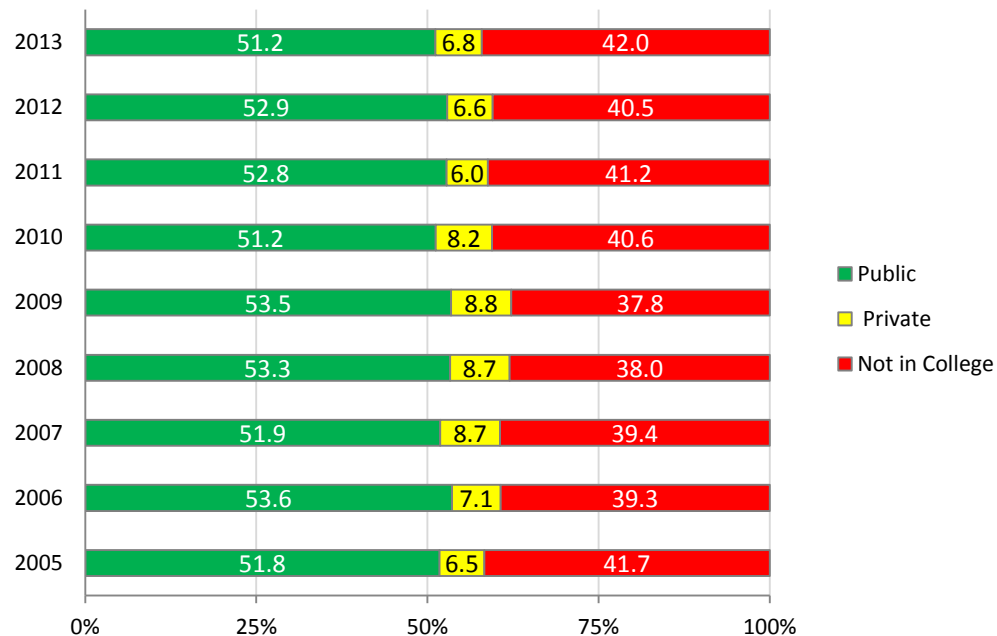


Figure 5 indicates the following:

Figure 5 shows the enrollment distribution of the graduates by public or private institutions.

- As the number of graduates and the number enrolled in college increased from 2005 to 2013, the HISD graduates enrolled in public institutions decreased from 51.8 percent in 2005 to 51.2 percent in 2013.
- The enrollment in private institutions peaked at 8.8 percent in 2009 and declined to 6.8 percent in 2013 although this reflected an increase of 0.2 percentage points from 2012.

Table 1 indicates the following for the combined fall enrollment of the classes of 2005 to 2013:

- The top three institutions, Houston Community College, University of Houston, and University of Houston-Downtown enrolled 40 percent of HISD graduates who entered college in the fall.
- The top six institutions enrolled over 50 percent of the HISD graduates who entered college.

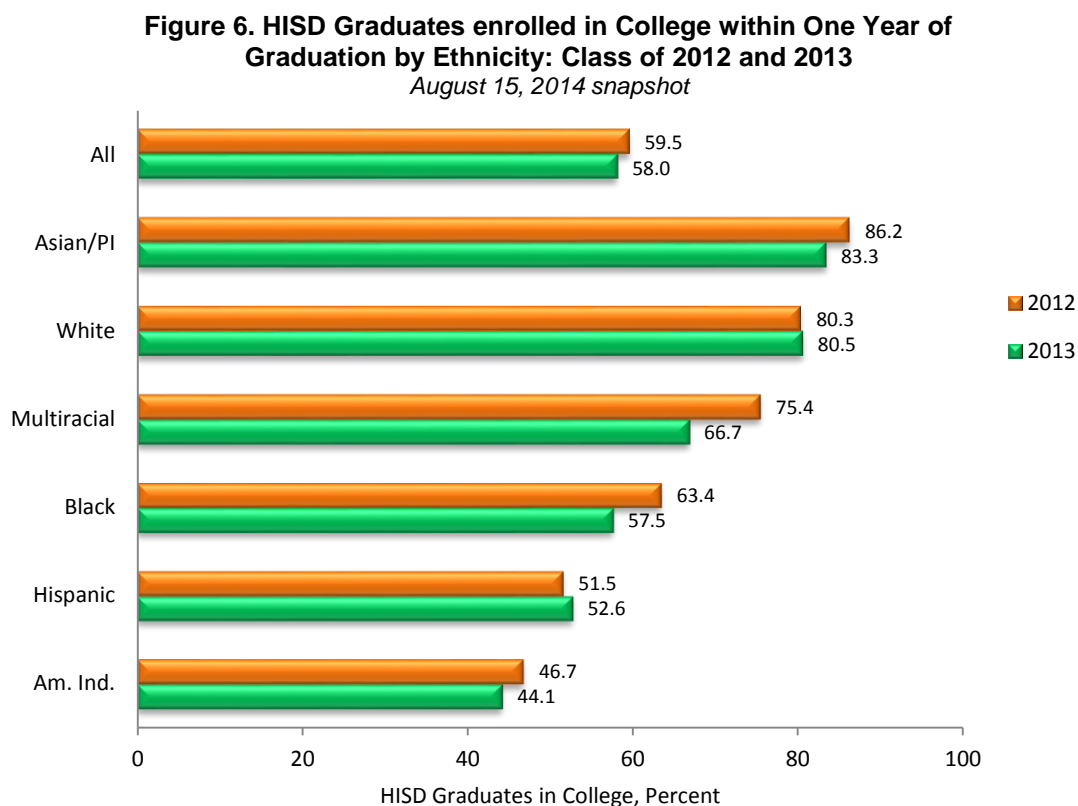


Figure 6 indicates the following:

Figure 6 shows a comparison of the college-enrollment of the various ethnic groups within one year of graduation from high school.

- The college-going rate in 2013 varied from 44.1 percent for the American Indian students to 83.3 percent for the Asian/Pacific Islander students.
- The Hispanic students (52.6 percent) performed significantly below the district average (58 percent) but showed an improvement of 1.1 percentage points compared to 2012. The White students improved by 0.2 percentage points.
- The Black and multiracial students showed a significant drop (5.9 and 8.7 percentage points, respectively) and the Asian students dropped by 2.9 percentage points.

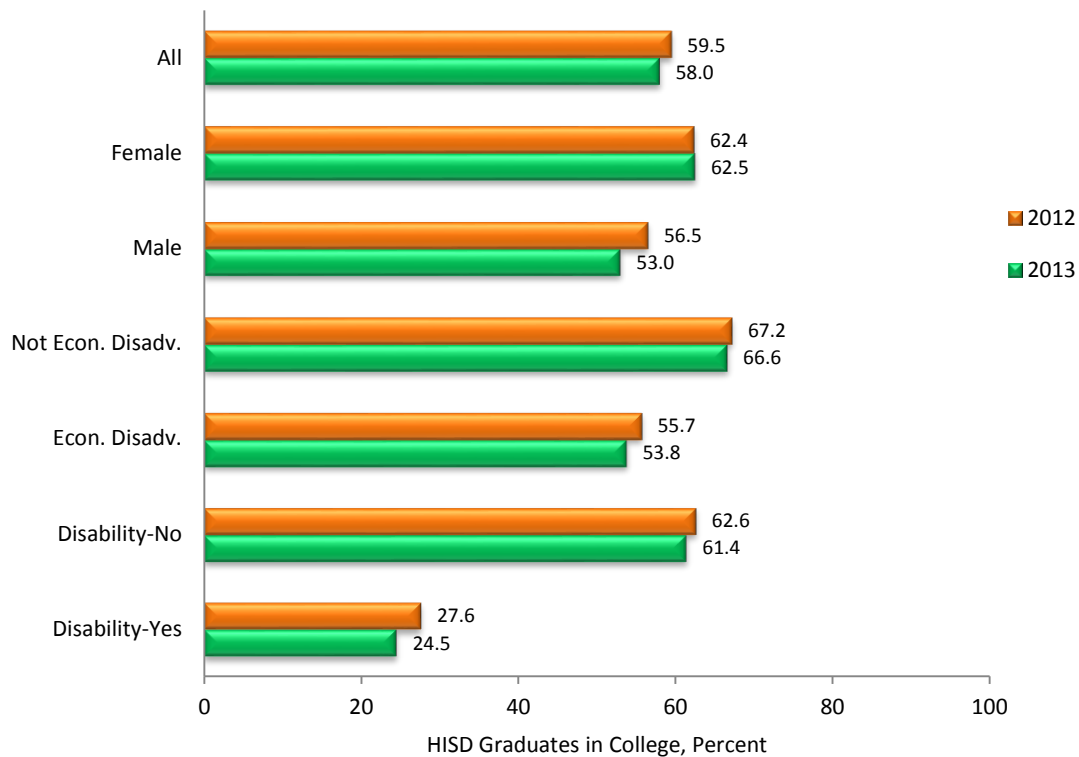
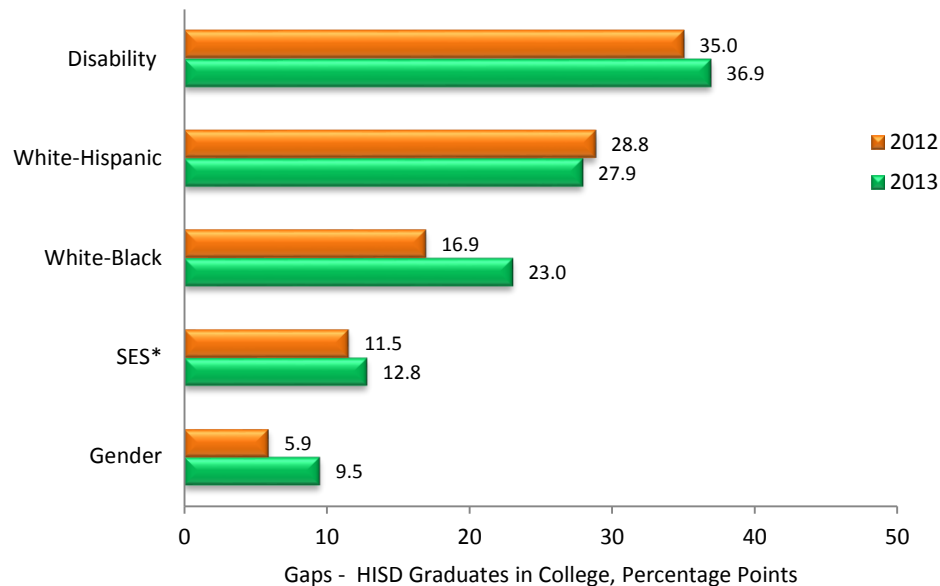


Figure 7 indicates the following:

Figure 7 shows a comparison of the college-enrollment within one year of graduation based on gender, socio-economic status, and disability.

August 15, 2014 snapshot

- In 2013, the groups that performed above district average (58 percent) were students not classified as economically disadvantaged (66.6 percent), female students (62.5 percent), and those who were not classified as students with disabilities (61.4 percent).
- With the exception of female students, all groups had lower rates of enrollment in college in 2013 compared to 2012. The declines ranged from 0.6 percentage points for the group not classified as economically disadvantaged to 3.5 percentage points for male students.

Figure 8 shows the gap analysis based on ethnicity, gender, socio-economic status (SES), and disability.

Figure 8 indicates the following:

- The largest gap in 2013 existed between students without and with disabilities (36.9 percentage points) followed by the White-Hispanic gap (27.9 percentage points), the White-Black gap (23 percentage points), the SES gap (12.8 percentage points, and the gender gap (9.5 percentage points) in favor of the female students.
- The gaps in 2013 for the various groups ranged from 9.5 – 36.9 percentage points and showed increases compared to 2012 in all categories ranging from 1.9 percentage points (the disability gap) to 6.1 percentage points (the White-Black gap) except for the White-Hispanic gap that decreased by 0.9 percentage points.

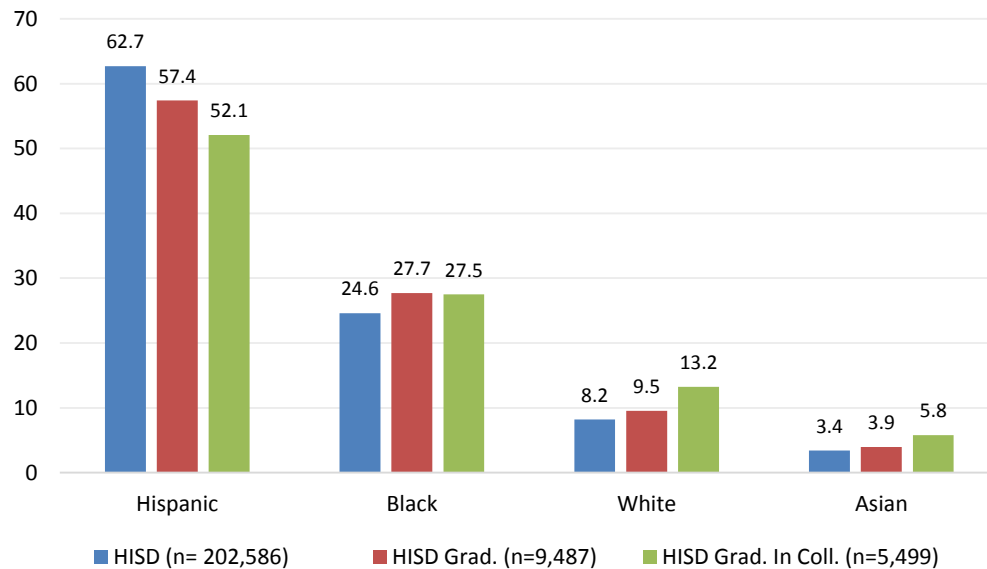


Figure 9a indicates the following:

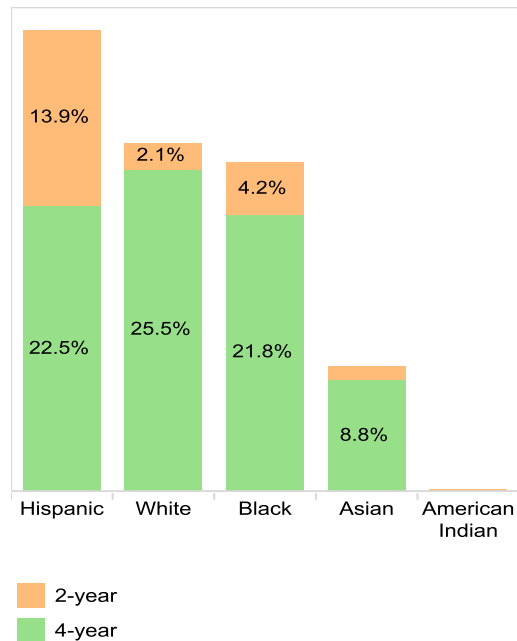


Figure 9b indicates the following for the class of 2008:

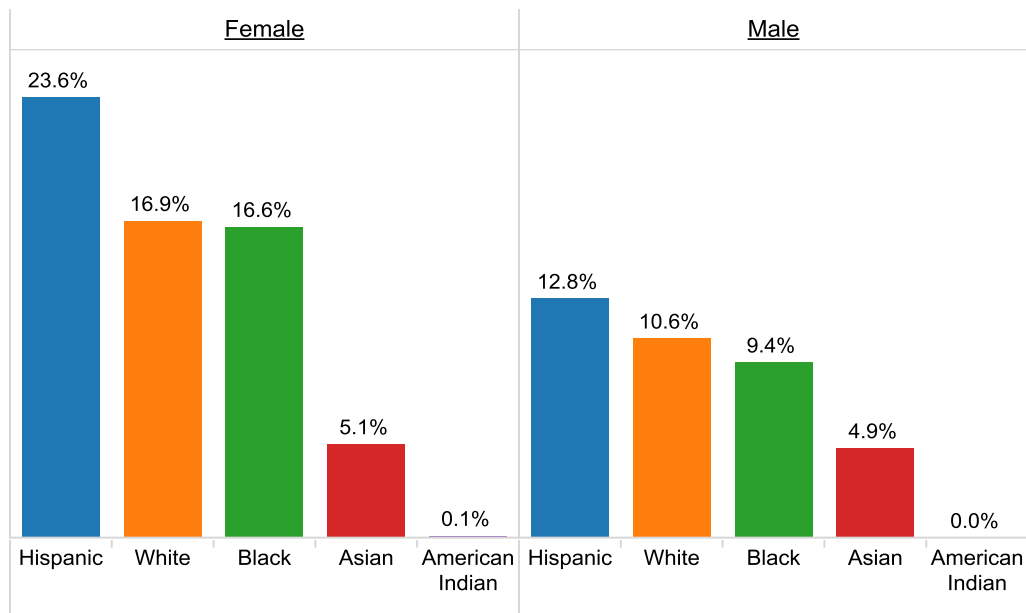


Figure 9c indicates the following for the class of 2008:

Figure 9a highlights the impact of the differentials in the graduation rates and the college-going rates of the various ethnic student groups on the ethnic distribution of the HISD graduates and the college-enrolled students.

- Hispanic students reflected a smaller percentage of graduates and those enrolling in college than they did in the district's enrollment in 2013.
- The White and Asian students reflected a higher percentage of graduates and those enrolling in college than they did in the district's enrollment in 2013.

Figure 9b shows the college degrees earned by the HISD class of 2008 within six years of graduation from high school disaggregated by ethnicity and the institution level.

- Hispanic students earned 36.4 percent of the college degrees followed by the White students (27.6 percent), Black students (26 percent) and Asian students (9.9 percent).
- Approximately 90 percent of the degrees acquired by the White and Asian students were earned at 4-year institutions compared to 80 percent for the Black students and 60 percent for the Hispanic students.
- The White and Asian students were over-represented in the group that earned college degrees by a factor exceeding three relative to the general population in HISD while the Hispanic students were significantly under-represented (36.4 percent) compared to their representation of 60+ percent in HISD.
- White students earned the highest percentage of 4-year degrees (25.5 percent) compared to Hispanic students (22.5 percent) and Black students (21.8 percent).

Figure 9c shows the college degrees earned by the HISD class of 2008 within six years of graduation from high school disaggregated by ethnicity and gender.

- Female students earned 62.3 percent of all degrees awarded compared to 37.7 percent earned by male students.
- With the exception of Asian students, significant female-male gaps exist within the ethnic groups with college degrees: Hispanic (10.8 percentage points), Black (7.2 percentage points), and White (6 percentage points).

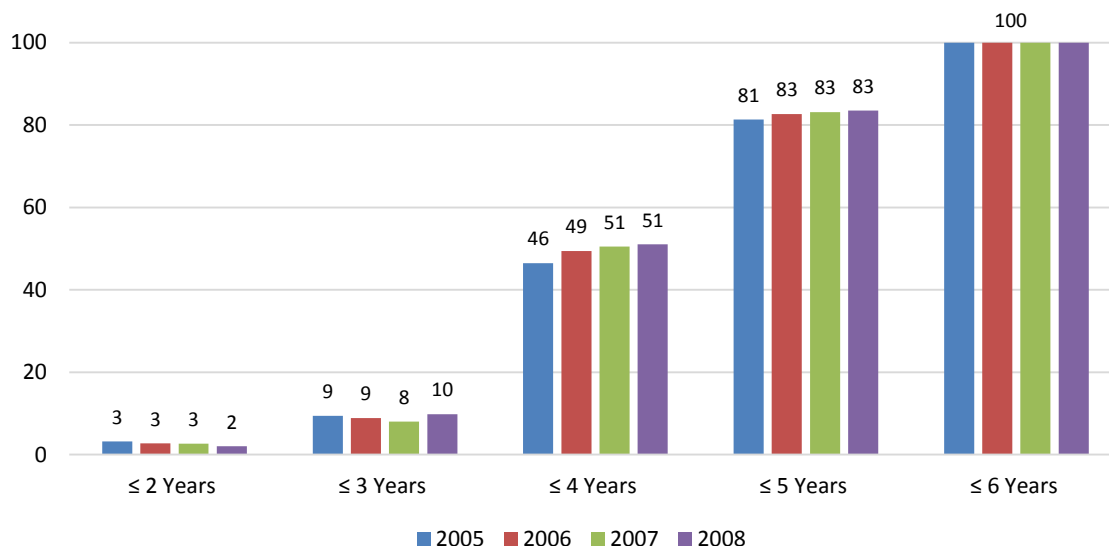
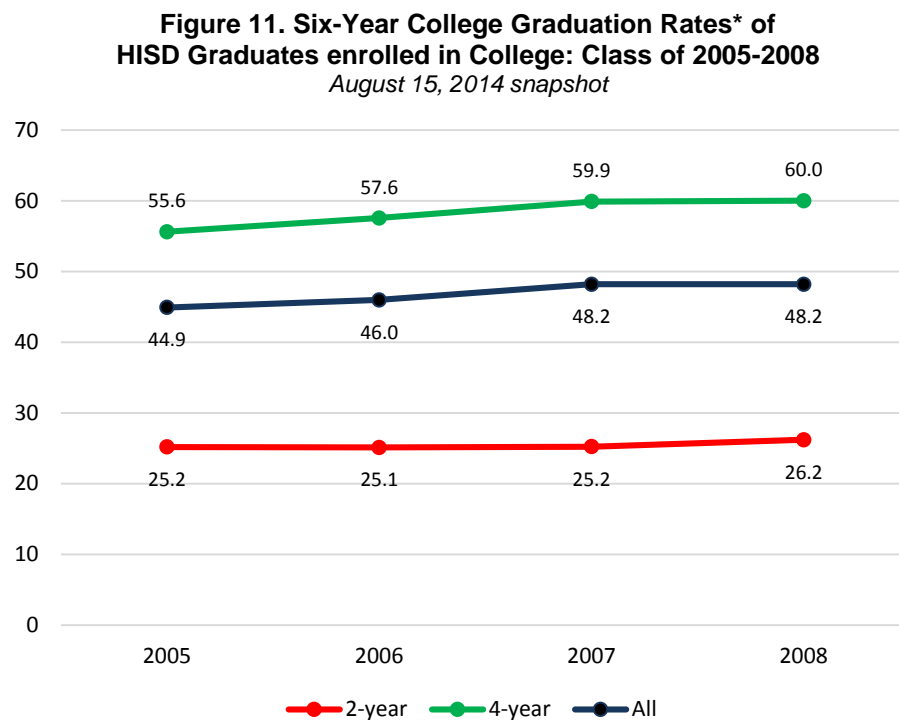


Figure 10 indicates the following:

Figure 10 shows the time to completion of college degrees by the HISD graduates in the class of 2005-2008. The results are shown as the cumulative percent of all degrees awarded within six years. Note that any degrees that may have been awarded beyond six years after graduation from high school are not included. Additionally, any degrees (i.e., associate degrees) awarded concurrently at graduation from high school are not included.

- Fifty-one percent of the college degrees were awarded to the class of 2008 within four years after graduation, an increase of 5 percentage points over the class of 2005.
- Eighty-three percent of the college degrees were awarded to the class of 2008 within five years after graduation, an increase of 2 percentage points over the class of 2005.

Figure 11 shows the college degrees earned by the class of 2005-2008 within six years of graduation from high school from 2-year and 4-year institutions as a percent of the enrollment in college within one year of graduation.



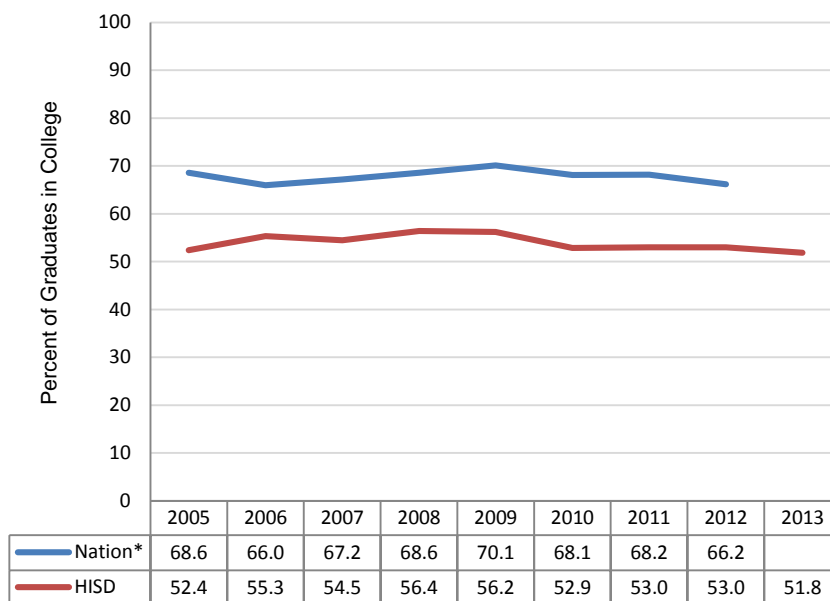
Note that the denominator in **Figure 11 is the number of HISD graduates enrolled in college in contrast to **Figure 2** where the denominator is the number of high school graduates in the class.*

Figure 11 indicates the following:

- The graduation rates of HISD students who enrolled in college in 4-year institutions were more than double the graduation rates from 2-year institutions.
- The graduation rates at 4-year institutions improved from 55.6 percent for the class of 2005 to 60 percent for the class of 2008.
- The graduation rates at the 2-year institutions showed modest improvement (1 percentage point) during the same period.

Figure 12 shows a comparison of the fall college enrollment of HISD graduates and the nation during 2005-2012.

Figure 12 indicates the following for the fall enrollment of high graduates in college:

- HISD recorded an increase of 0.6 percentage points while the nation showed a decline of 2.4 percentage points from 2005 to 2012.
- While a significant gap persists between the nation and HISD, the gap declined from 16.2 percentage points in 2005 to 13.2 percentage points in 2012.

Figure 13a shows the number of graduates and the college-enrollment rates in 2-year and 4-year institutions at the campuses in the class of 2013. **Appendix A** shows the data for prior classes.




Figure 13a indicates the following for the class of 2013:

- The college-going rate for the class of 2013 ranged from 0 to 92.6 percent with a median of 50 percent across the 48 high schools.
- Excluding alternative schools, the enrollment in 4-year institutions ranged from 12.2 percent at Austin HS to 89.8 percent at Carnegie Vanguard HS with the median of the 39 campuses at 31.3 percent.
- Based on 45 campuses with graduates who enrolled in 2-year institutions, the range was 2.8 percent at Carnegie Vanguard HS to 39.1 percent at E-Stem Academy and the median was 21 percent.

Figure 13b compares the class of 2012 and 2013 by campus based on the number of graduates, and the percent who enrolled in college within one year of graduation from high school.

Figure 13b indicates the following based on one-year enrollment:

- The college enrollment in 2013 compared to 2012 increased at 15 campuses with a range of 0.1 percentage points at the High School for Performing and Visual Arts to 16.6 percentage points at Liberty HS.
- The college enrollment in 2013 compared to 2012 decreased at 27 campuses with a range of 0.1 percentage points at Milby HS to 37.4 percentage points at E-STEM West.

Figure 14a shows the number of graduates and the college degrees earned in percent by institution type at the campus level for the class of 2008 within six years of graduation from high school. The data for prior classes is shown in **Appendix B**.

Figure 14a indicates that six schools, DeBakey HS, HS for Performing and Visual Arts, Carnegie Vanguard HS, Bellaire HS, Challenge Early College HS, and Lamar HS had at least 50 percent of their graduates in the class of 2008 who earned a college degree. The median rate of college degrees for the 40 high schools was 15.7 percent.

Figure 14b shows the number of graduates and the number of college degrees earned by institution type at the campus level for the class of 2008 within six years of graduation from high school.

Figure 14b indicates that of the 7,882 HISD graduates, 2,318 graduates (29.4 percent) from six schools, DeBakey HS, HS for Performing and Visual Arts, Carnegie Vanguard HS, Bellaire HS, Challenge Early College HS, and Lamar HS earned 1,287 degrees (54.4 percent) of all college degrees awarded to the class of 2008.

Figure 14c compares the class of 2007 and 2008 by campus based on the number of graduates, and the percent who earned a college degree within six years of graduation from high school.

Figure 14c indicates the following based on the class of 2007 and 2008 with college degrees earned within six years after graduation from high school:

- The college degrees earned by the class of 2008 compared to the class of 2007 increased at 23 campuses with a range of 0.2 percentage points at Yates HS to 15.9 percentage points at Eastwood Academy.
- The college degrees earned by the class of 2008 compared to the class of 2007 decreased at 12 campuses with a range of 0.5 percentage points at Austin HS to 12.6 percentage points at Carnegie Vanguard HS.

Administrative Response

The district is pleased to see that the overall college graduation rate continues to increase. While the overall college enrollment for the class of 2013 decreased slightly, over the past year HISD has placed a strong emphasis on improving college readiness and college access across the district that is expected to increase college access. Some of the initiatives and programs the district has launched or strengthened over the past year include:


- PSAT/SAT access and preparation – The district continues to pay the fees for students to take the PSAT and SAT during the school-day. In addition, the district recently acquired an adaptive online PSAT/SAT program for all 9-12th graders in the district and is also offering an SAT prep class at most high school campuses. Also, the district has launched an initiative to increase the number of National Merit scholars through summer PSAT preparation.
- Counselor/CAC Support – The district is providing monthly training to the district's counselors and college access coordinators. The district is also providing additional resources for Counselors/CACs, such as toolkits and mentors.
- College Exploration – The district is providing students with additional opportunities to explore colleges through field lessons and district events such as Texas College Night & Ivy League Night.
- Naviance – The district has provided much more support and training around Naviance. As a result, student and parent usage levels have increased significantly over the past year and are expected to continue increasing.
- Financial Literacy – The district has placed a stronger emphasis on informing students and parents around the benefits of completing the FAFSA and helping them through the application process. Through a partnership with the City of Houston, the district launched "FAFSA Day" and looks forward to expanding this initiative. In addition, the district has partnered with the University of Pittsburgh on a project to increase FAFSA completion rates through personalized texts.
- EMERGE – Through after-school and summer programming, campus training, college visits, SAT preparation, university engagement and more, the district's EMERGE program is providing students with additional post-secondary opportunities.
- AP – In an effort to prepare more students for the rigor of college, some of the highest performing AP teachers in the district have created "Super Curriculum" in their respective areas. In addition, the district is providing training for AP teachers during early-release days.

In addition to the initiatives shown above, the district has deployed itinerant coaches who are assisting the college center staff as follows:

- Conduct student interviews and facilitating student completion of the Student Transition Input Form and career interest inventories, i.e., Naviance to assist the students in clarifying their post-secondary educational interests.
- Provide campus special education chairpersons and case managers with post-secondary resource information including information on the college application and financial aid processes and information on community agencies that can assist students with disabilities in reaching their post-secondary educational goals.
- As appropriate for the campus, collaborate with the Go Center staff to jointly plan college fairs.
- Plan campus-based community resource fairs that include representatives from local colleges and inviting parents to attend the resource fairs.
- Earlier tracking with HB5 and Endorsement pathways, so students are able to enroll in courses of career interest.
- More targeted training through high school career pathways, so students are better prepared for the college curriculum.

The district is optimistic that these initiatives and programs will result in stronger college access and completion rates for all students.
