
What Have We Learned in 12 Weeks?

In the first 12 weeks of school, Cadets were introduced to JROTC. The initial shock of what this course was about may have been slightly more than some could handle, but over 175 Cadets remain in the program. So far this year, we have covered individual learning styles, personal skills maps, basic formation movements, uniform standards, the **PUSH UP**, and most importantly, we covered leadership and personal responsibility. Cadets sounded off on what they enjoyed most about the program:



"So far this year, we have talked about discipline, attentiveness and leadership. When in platoon, you have to pay attention and be attentive to the leader to follow along with any and every command the leader may call. The attentiveness that I've learned in JROTC helps me pay more attention in class than I would a year ago in online school because now I respect them and give them my undivided attention so that I can do my work and pass. The discipline I've learned in JROTC by working hard on any team I have been or am a part of helps me apply this an any part of my life, making me more competitive and to not settle for anything but my best. The leadership that I have learned in JROTC by working with my fellow cadets and making sure that they can succeed in the task that must be completed shows me that working with someone is more productive and two heads can do more than just one." So far this year, we have learned about discipline. Every day when we walk in, we say "Good morning, Sir/First sergeant" as well as "ma'am, sergeant." We do it as a sign as respect. WIN WITH INTEGRITY


On October 30, the HISD JROTC district headquarters hosted the annual "Fall Classic" Drill Competition at Scarborough High School, and the Black Knights were up to the task. The primary and Secondary Color Guard, the Flag Folding Team, the Armed Drill Team, and the Physical Training Team stepped up to win an overall 3rd place for the Black Knights program, that's 3rd best out of 27 programs across HISD. The secondary color guard team placed 3rd place earning a trophy. The primary color guard placed 7th place out of 27 schools. The physical training team males placed 10th and the females placed 7th all out of 27 schools. Leading the way, the armed drill team placed overall 1st place and the drill commander, C/SFC Sabrina Obregon, was voted by judges as the #1 drill commander earning an individual trophy for her excellence.




