Definition

The statute *defines* a *magnet school* as a public elementary school, public secondary school, public elementary education center, or public secondary education center that offers a special curriculum capable of attracting substantial numbers of students of different racial backgrounds.

MSAP Regulations in 34 CFR 280

Program Placement

Feeder pattern magnet programs will be distributed throughout the district by quadrants

- this is for program distribution ONLY


Unique magnet schools will be centrally located, when possible, to serve all students




High School Quadrants

ESTABLISHING NEW MAGNET PROGRAMS AND SCHOOLS

- Feeder Pattern Magnet Programs:
 - Schools must have sufficient building capacity for additional students.
 - A full feeder pattern (high school, middle school and elementary school(s)) must apply together with the same/similar theme
 - The number and types of feeder pattern magnet themes should be the same in each quadrant.
- Unique Magnet Schools
 - New schools are established based on student need and/or demand
- New programs will be phased in over three years

PROCESS FOR SUN-SETTING MAGNET PROGRAMS

- All magnet programs shall be evaluated annually.
- Magnet programs may be closed:
 - Inability to recruit students and meet enrollment goals
 - Lack sufficient building capacity to serve all neighborhood students
 - Do not meet standards of quality
- No programs will be sun-setted before the 2018-2019 school year
- No need to reopening the magnet application process

Funding

- 3-5 year recurring allotment for capital purchases, equipment and facility needs
- Annual allotment for materials, supplies, training or annual fees
- Staffing based on number of students in a magnet program
- Shared coordinators
- Limited to one funding source

Program Funding

Fine Arts Programs and Schools

- Quantity 1 Feeder Pattern Program per Quadrant; HSPVA
- Coordinators 1 per Feeder Pattern Program
- Fine Arts Teachers 1:150 magnet students
- Annual Materials and Supplies \$20 per magnet student
- Recurring Capital Funds Eligible facility upgrades, equipment, instruments, uniforms/costumes, etc.

Program Funding

Montessori Programs

- Quantity 1 per Quadrant; 1 central (Wilson)
- Coordinators 1
- Teaching Assistants 1:60 students
- Annual Materials and Supplies \$20
- Recurring Capital Funds Eligible –
 Montessori specific materials

Lottery Priorities

All schools – based on grade span – shall prioritize students in a manner to reflect the demographics of the district and students within the quadrant:

Priority	PK-5	6-8	9-12
Economically Disadvantaged	78.6	73.6	68.5
English Language Learners	42.0	23.1	15.1
Special Education	5.6	8.9	8.5

Quadrant	% of District	Factor	Priority %
North	22.5%	2	45.0%
East	21.1%	2	42.2%
South	28.7%	2	57.4%
West	27.7%	2	55.4%

Transportation

- Provided to all magnet students based on available funding
- Students must live beyond the district's maximum walking distance
- May be limited to a maximum travel radius due to budget constraints
- Acceptance to feeder pattern magnet programs within quadrant and unique magnet schools are transportation priorities

Transfers

- Limit on discretionary transfers
 - Principal agreement
- All programmatic transfers will follow the same application processes and timelines
- Students, once accepted, shall assume annual transfer renewals. Exceptions will be rare.

 - HMW

 - East Field Office

Program Changes

- Spring 2018
 - Evaluate current programs
 - Determine intent for feeder pattern programs
 - Develop quadrant programs
- 2018-2019 school year
 - Programs may remain the same
 - New program development begins
 - Fill in gaps in feeder pattern magnet programs
 - Ensure quadrant equity
 - Sunsetting begins

Recruitment in Fall 2018 for 2019-2020

- All schools set enrollment goals for all choice programs for which they will accept transfer students
- All programs follow same processes
 - Recruitment
 - Application
 - Selection
- New selection/lottery process begin in Spring 2019 for 2019-2020

Funding

- Changes for 2018-2019
 - Recurring capital allocation begins starting with new/under resourced programs
 - New annual allocations
 - New staffing ratios
 - Changes to magnet coordinators

Transfers

- Changes go into effect immediately
 - New programmatic transfers
 - Automatic renewals
