Michelle Sacks (SHAC co-chair) called the meeting to order at 5:31pm.

Minutes from meetings on October 4, 2018 were approved, with minor revisions.

**1. LEAD Program at Attucks MS**

Joseph Le and Michelle Sacks described the Law Enforcement-Assisted Diversion (LEAD) Program designed to keep students with behavioral problems in school.

- Quarterly meetings of steering group, in the process of designing assessment tools, procedures, and hiring staff (have hired a social worker);
- Other campuses want to use similar diversion models to keep students in school.

**2. Wellness Policy updates**

Eric Ratliff discussed the latest revisions of the wellness plan.

- SHAC members reviewed outline (handout) showing how the wellness plan Objectives matched the wellness policy Goals which incorporated the latest measures from the Alliance for a Healthier Generation’s (AHG) assessment tool;
- Discussed some of the Objectives about health education.

**3. Program Review: October 2018 meeting**

Sub-committee reviewed three programs: Everfi Health (social-emotional learning & wellness), CVS Health (prescription drug education), Project Adam (heart health). Voting members of the SHAC approved all three for use in the district.

#### **4. Nutrition Services (NS) updates**

Nan Cramer gave a quick update about the progress of community gardens on campuses: have money for five, but they would like to have more applications.

#### **5. Health & Medical Services (HMS) updates**

Lisa Blackmon-Jones provided updates on several programs in the district

- A community organization is currently providing flu shots for students in the district – school nurses coordinate time and space for providers to implement on a specific date;
- City of Houston is funding nurse-family partnership for pregnant students;
- City of Houston is providing buses so students at Washington and Wheatley High Schools can go to clinics on nearby middle school campuses (Hogg and Burbank).

#### **6. School Safety updates**

Michelle Sacks gave a brief update on SB 30 (from 2017 legislative session)

- Houston & Harris County are implementing Peacekeepers Movement in district's high schools (handout), but waiting for further guidance – required for graduation, but uncertain to which graduating class it applies.

#### **7. Health and Physical Education (HPE) updates**

Felicia Ceaser-White talked about several ongoing programs in the district

- Recent camping and fishing outing with students and parents were successful;
- Selecting schools for the new school-based HIV prevention grant from the CDC;
- Preparing to conduct Youth Risk Behavior Surveillance (YRBS) survey in February 2019 – Felicia shared some draft pages from the previous YRBS (handout);
- Additional training and professional development sessions conducted for anti-trafficking;
- Many new socio-emotional learning (SEL) programs coming into the district – need to figure out what the SHAC should be reviewing.

#### **8. Announcements**

- Celebrations for new SPARK parks at three Houston ISD schools in November and December (handout);
- Piney Point ES awarded \$2500 in Yogurt's Got Game competition (from Fuel Up to Play 60 program).
