How to Beat the System During Holiday Shopping

Black Friday:

Right after Thanksgiving is **Black Friday**, the day in which businesses have big sales in stores in an attempt to get as much money off of you as they can take. **Black Friday** is the traditional first day of Christmas shopping. The term “Black Friday” was coined in the 1960s to mark the unofficial start of Christmas shopping. Ironically, even though a lot of stores do this almost every year it is surprisingly not an official US holiday. For some stores, they start their deals a bit early. Many stores and malls are open on Thanksgiving Day at about 6:00 in the evening. They have their prices cut down which may vary depending where you get it or who you buy it from. On **Black Friday**, because there are so many deals, most people camp out at the stores as early as week before they even start. Once the doors open, in some instances, it would be like running with the bulls in Pamplona. But be aware because even though the prices are low, the quality of the item *may sometimes be tawdry* (showy but cheap or poorly made).

Ms. Floyd, who teaches engineering and robotics, has went shopping on **Black Friday**. Ms. Floyd commented saying “This year was the first and last year that I will be participating in Black Friday. The lines were extremely to long and there was not enough of the merchandise that they had advertised.”

Cyber Monday:

A few days after the big sale, people then resort to shopping online which is called Cyber Monday which is a term invented by *Shop.org* in order to persuade shoppers to buy online. This started in 2005 which is fueled by mention of **Black Friday** savings. This holiday has caused huge sales making online shopping very profitable for businesses.

Before you order something online, try looking up the same item you are looking for from another retailer who may have it for a lower price. Also try to take advantage of the free shipping by combing it with other stuff in your shopping cart so you can hopefully avoid paying the shipping cost.

As you make your purchases online, be aware of fake shopping app scams that trick you into giving out your private information or downloading malware. Aside from this, one of the biggest problems is your package getting stolen. One of the ways to prevent this includes by having your package delivered to a neighbor you trust, watch your package being delivered, have the package in a facility for pickup, or by having security cameras pointed at the door.

If you order from Amazon, they have a safe place for your package called “Amazon Locker.” According to Amazon, they give you the option to have your package delivered to an Amazon Locker location where it will be stored for you to pick up. **If not picked up within 3 business days, it will be returned for a refund.**

But the good news is that business are open right after Christmas. Places like Walmart, Toys R' Us, Target, and etc. have their prices discounted to usually at about 20% to 75% retail price. They try to get rid of anything they have in storage and off the shelves to make space for more items.*



All you have to do is just answer a few questions, ship it back to them, and you'll get a gift card from them. Although, you may want to check some store's policies for exchanging or refunding items.
