Our Vision is for The Food and Agriculture Literacy Center at Mykawa Farm to serve as an experiential learning environment that helps Houston ISD students, families and the larger Houston community develop more than a consumer relationship with food



Our Work to date: Despite our lack of infrastructure, we have created pop-up field trip experiences and hosted over 3,000 students! Students on field trips engage in hands-on learning activities that connect them to careers in agriculture (horticulture and entomology), nutrition, culinary arts, and environmental science.

Our Need: To adequately serve Houston ISD students and community members, we need following:

- Areas that are accessible to all visitors, regardless of physical ability.
- Restrooms designed for students.
- Electricity for lights and cooking equipment.
- Sinks for washing harvested produce.
- A cold holding area for harvested produce.
- A perimeter fence to keep students safe from unwanted visitors of all species.
- A climate-controlled, enclosed space for lessons to continue during harsh weather.
- Indoor and outdoor demonstration kitchen areas.

Our Plan: The Food and Agriculture Literacy Center sits on the 6.5-acre site of the historic 100-year-old Mykawa School. Structural engineers and architects have determined the exterior walls of the school building are structurally sound, and the building can be renovated to a classroom space for culinary, nutrition, and horticulture education for students and community members.



Our Farming Values

We practice regenerative agriculture. We protect, improve, and restore the health of the soil. We manage our water usage for maximum efficiency. We plant diverse crops and practice crop rotation. We compost plant and food waste to return nutrients and beneficial organisms to the soil. Regenerative agriculture reduces our need for chemical fertilizers and pesticides.
